

Kiowa Warrior of the Plains


The symbolism includes ten eagle feathers that represent the ten Kiowa Medicine Bundles, deriving power from the Half Boy "Tahlee". The lightening bolt on the front left leg of the horse suggests the voice of thunder heard each Spring and is depicted on the Great Drum of the O-Ho-Mah society as held in the eagle's talons. The bone breast plate and red cape (Spanish Officer Coat), the circular blue of the Great Plains, and the bold red hand print are part of the Koitsenko Warriors' tradition. The shield depicts the sacred Rainy Mountain in southwest Oklahoma the sacred Kiowa Burial Ground at the end of the Great Tribal Journey. The recurring circular patterns represent the Sun or the Moon, both important in the Kiowa ceremonial dance rituals of the Skaw-tow (Sun Dance), the Feather (Ghost) Dance and the Peyote (Native American Church) Service.


KIOWA TRIBE OF OKLAHOMA

Kiowa Jurisdictional Area


KIOWA TRIBE JURISDICTION





Kiowa: The Principle People

- We are a tribe or nation of people with 5 treaties signed with the United States of America. The most known is the Medicine Lodge Treaty of 18
- The Kiowa do not have a reservation like other tribes outside of Oklahoma.
- We live on what is called trust and allotted lands, and are separate from the state of Oklahoma.
- We have tribal sovereignty and direct governmental relations with the US Government.



- The KTEP strives to provide traditional and modern environmental management and protection principles.
- The Earth, water, air are all sacred to our people and we want to ensure that it is clean for future generations of Kiowa people.
- The environmental director is on the EPA National Tribal Science Council and serves as the current National Tribal Co-Chair.

Kiowa Environmental Concerns

- We all are facing common environmental issues such as global warming and climate change, pollution in the air and water.
- One of the more important environmental concerns for the Kiowa is our water: pollution and rights to the water our ancestors have used for centuries.
- Native Americans believe water is sacred, and water is called the 'first medicine' by many Indian people across America.
