Vintage WWII Aircraft to Fly in to Salem

Classic B-17, B-24 and B-25 Coming to McNary Airfield



flying tribute to the air and ground crews of vintage World War II-era bombers will arrive in Salem June 11, 2008 as the Wings of Freedom Tour touches down at McNary Airport.

The aircraft display will be parked near the airport's Flight Deck Restaurant located off of 25th Avenue S.E., at 2680 Aerial Way S.E. Visitors may explore the aircraft, both inside and out, for a \$10 donation for adults or \$5 for children under age 12.

The planes are available to tour on June 11 from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., June 12, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and June 13, 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.

Visitors also may take a 30-minute flight in any of the aircraft. The cost is a tax-deductible donation of \$425 per person to fly in the B-17 or B-24. Flights in the B-25 are \$400 for the nose and \$325 for a ride in the fuselage. The flights are scheduled before or after the ground tour times.

The Collings Foundation sponsors the tour of these rare B-17, B-24, and B-25 bombers. Currently, the tour has made more than 2,000 visits to airports across the United States, and millions of people have seen the traveling aircraft displays.

Legislature Approves Dependents Educational Benefits During Session

Dependents of active-duty service members killed, or 100 percent service-connected disabled after September 11, 2001 may have their undergraduate tuition waived due to a bill passed by the Oregon Legislature during its February supplemental session.

Senate Bill 1066 (SB 1066) provides waiver of tuition and fees at Oregon state institutions of higher education, including Oregon Health Sciences University (OHSU), for eligible dependents.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 1442 testified before the Legislature stating that troops who are being deployed deserve assurance that the education of their families is taken care of should they become severely injured or killed.

Despite tight deadlines, the Legislature passed the bill that directs post-secondary institutions to waive tuition for the child or

Director's Message



n March 27, 2008, Governor Kulongoski signed Executive Order 08-08 that created the Governor's Task Force on Veterans Services. This 27-member task force has members from the Executive and Legislative branches of state government, as well as veterans, private citizens, subject matter experts and State Agency leaders. Mr. Paul Evans, the Governor's Policy Advisory on Military and Veterans Affairs, will chair the Task Force. The Task Force will work in three mains areas: (1) Reintegration Services; (2) Post-separation access to services (36 months or more); and (3) Retirement/senior care.

The Task Force held its first meeting on April 3rd and is scheduled to meet through and including August 28, 2008 with a final report working group to finish their work by the end of 2008. The Task Force will complete the following tasks:

- a. Compile a program inventory;
- b. Prepare a baseline evaluation of programs identified;
- c. Hold public hearings on existing programs associated with the three major policy areas assigned to the Task Force;

- d. Develop a comprehensive list of recommendations:
- e. Prioritize the list of proposals into tiers for legislative and executive consideration; and
- f. Report written findings and recommendations to the Governor on or before December 31, 2008.

During the course of their work, many of the Task Force members will visit existing veteran treatment centers and service locations, as well as hear from those who are working in direct support of veterans and those who provide support services to those programs.

I am convinced that the work of this Task Force will result in the most comprehensive study of veterans programs and services in the history of the State of Oregon. In the end, our veterans and their families will be better served with programs designed to meet their ongoing needs.

On April 9, 2008, my staff and I met with members of the Association of Oregon Counties (AOC), County Veteran Service Officers (CVSOs) and Paul Evans of the Governor's office to discuss veteran service issues important to the Governor's Federal Forest Payment Task Force. The issue before this work group was the threat to veterans' services at the county level caused by a draw down in Federal Forest payments in 32 of Oregon's 36 counties.

After much discussion, a key finding seemed to be that the State should continue to provide pass-through general funds to the counties for veteran services and that a baseline amount should be established to ensure the counties could continue to fund these services. While there is more work to be done, it is clear that

this will be an issue for the 2009 session of the State Legislature and that a sound funding proposal should be agreed upon prior to the session.

I believe it is important to safeguard these important county programs and will continue to work with the AOC and the CVSOs to solve any issues associated with the necessary funding.

On April 10, 2008 Governor Kulongoski signed Executive Order 08-10, determining that a state of emergency existed in Tillamook, Lincoln, Coos, Clatsop and Curry Counties and coastal portions of Lane and Douglas Counties due to limitations on ocean commercial and sport salmon fishing. Further, the Governor directed state agencies to work in a cooperative and coordinated manner in order to mitigate the impacts of this emergency, provide expedited service and resources to persons and businesses adversely affected by the emergency, and focus state efforts in a manner most likely to relieve the unemployment, human suffering, financial loss and other economic impacts of this emergency.

As a result, I have contacted the CVSOs in the impacted counties and asked them for an assessment of those veterans in the fishing and related industries to determine what kinds of services they need so that we can best determine which agencies should respond and where. Just as we did for those veterans in Northwest Oregon who were affected by the flood and wind events during December 2007, the Oregon veteran's community must

Appointed by Governor Ted Kulongoski, the Department's new Advisory Committee members are:

Joseph R. (Ryan) Howell of Albany, an Army National Guard combat veteran of Operation Iraqi Freedom, is a recipient of two Purple Hearts, and the youngest member to ever serve on the Committee;

Eugene J. LaBonte of Grand Ronde, a Native American and Vietnam-era veteran who served in the U.S. Navy as a radioman;

Gerard F. Lorang of Portland, a Vietnamera veteran who served in the U.S. Army as a radio technician and most recently was the Director of the Portland Veterans Administration Regional Office; and

Kevin J. Owens of North Bend, a Gulf War era veteran of the U.S. Coast Guard who served as a electricians mate.

"I'm thrilled to have these new members who not only represent different areas of our state, but add diversity to our Committee," said Jim Willis, Director of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs. "Each of these members brings something special to the Committee and will be great assets for the Department."

The new appointees fill vacancies of four term-limited members of the Committee, each of who have completed two consecutive terms of four-years each.

"This is a bittersweet moment for me as Director," Willis said, noting the contribution the four outgoing members had made during their eight years on the Committee. Paul Evans, Policy Advisor to Governor Kulongoski, presented outgoing members with the Governor's Commendation Award for their service

Advisory Chair Named 2008 Veteran Small Business Champion Of The Year

Small Business Administration Oregon Director Harry DeWolf has announced that Tino Ornelas, CEO of the Ornelas Enterprises, is the Portland SBA Veteran Small Business Champion of the Year for the northwest region and the state of Oregon. Ornelas will receive his award at the SBA Portland's Small Business Week Awards Gala May 22, 2008, 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Oregon Convention Center, 777 NE Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. in Portland.

"For more than 40 years, SBA has recognized outstanding small business owners for their contributions to Oregon's economy and for their personal achievements during small business week. I am proud to honor our true champions of small business whose tireless efforts have provided tangible and significant support to small businesses and their communities," said DeWolf.

Celestino (Tino) Edward Ornelas was born January 5, 1945 in Florence, CO. His grandparents came to this country from Mexico in 1910. They settled in Colorado and became coal miners.

Ornelas joined the U.S. Navy in 1962 at the age of 17. His active duty service included one year in Vietnam. He served as a radar technician until his honorable discharge in 1966 at the rank of petty officer second class

and also served another four years in the inactive reserve. Once he was discharged from the military, Ornelas resided in Seattle, WA. He met and married Joy Lynn Brewster and they have two children.

Ornelas began his career in the private sector with the Boeing Company in Seattle, WA before being hired by the Tektronix Corporation where he worked for 20 years. During this time, he received his Bachelor of Science Degree in business from Marylhurst University. In 1991, Ornelas started his own company as CEO of Ornelas Enterprises, Inc. His company specializes in electronics assembly and has completed work for major high-tech and electronics manufacturing firms. When his business expanded and there was a need to hire additional employees, Ornelas made it a priority to hire qualified veterans and continues to do so to this day.

Ornelas also volunteers as a business mentor for the Portland Community College Small Business Development Center and has assisted veterans interested in starting and maintaining their own businesses. During Ornelas' service on the Governor's Advisory Committee, he has been a strong and continuing voice for veteran-owned small businesses and has encouraged and assisted the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA) and private sector business employees in attending veteran small business development seminars and conferences.

Ornelas has championed the development of a State Veterans Small Business Enterprise program and encouraged the awareness of PL 106-50: "The veterans Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development Act of 1999."

As a result of work by Ornelas and others, a bill was introduced during the 2007 session of the Oregon Legislature to create the Oregon Veterans' Business Enterprise program. The United Veterans Groups of Oregon (UVGO) requested the bill. The bill received the support of the Governor's Small Business Council, the 19 Small Business Development Centers in Oregon, the Governor's Advisory Committee to the Director of ODVA and the UVGO. Approximately 366,000 Oregon veterans are well served by the unselfish advocacy demonstrated by Ornelas.

Ornelas Enterprises has been honored with several awards including The Austin Family Business Award, Minority Business of the Year for the State of Oregon, the Performance Award from Intel Corporation and the Top 100 Fastest Growing Businesses five years running as listed in the Hispanic Business Magazine as well as the Top 10 National Entrepreneurs of the Year from Oregon Business Magazine. Ornelas is the Chairman of the ODVA Advisory Committee.

Veteran of Doolittle Raid, DeShazer, dies at age 95

acob DeShazer, 95, of Salem died March 15, at the Lancaster Village assisted-living facility. DeShazer is best known as a member of the legendary World War II Doolittle Raiders who bombed Japan after Pearl Harbor. DeShazer endured more than three years as a Japanese prisoner of war and later teamed up with his wife, Florence, to serve as a Methodist missionary in Japan for nearly 30 years.

"He passed away peacefully in his sleep at home," according to Ruth Kutrakun, one of DeShazer's five children. Kutrakun characterized her father as a gentle and humble man with a lively sense of humor. His life was centered around faith, family and country, she

"My dad was just an incredible person," Kutrakun said. "He had a sense of honor and duty. He served his country, but more importantly, he served his Lord. He had deep faith, and during his time as a prisoner of war, he was convinced that he needed to forgive his enemy. After that, he spent his life spreading the message of love and forgiveness.

"We're all going to miss him. I think everybody that knew him felt like they knew someone special." DeShazer's fervent faith was forged during harrowing events.


On April 18, 1942, he was among nearly 80 fliers whose bombs struck targets in Tokyo and Nagoya. It become known as the Doolittle Raid — the United States' first air attack on Japan, by Lt. Col. James Doolittle and his Raiders.

Most of the 16 planes taking part in the raid lacked enough fuel to reach the planned refueling point and crashed or were ditched over China. DeShazer and his crew bailed out near the coast of China. Captured and held in a cramped Chinese prison cell, DeShazer withstood 40 months of solitary confinement,

interrogation, torture and threats of execution. He was fortified by a born-again religious experience that came while reading the Bible — the only book his captors allowed him.

"My hatred for the enemy nearly drove me

crazy," DeShazer said during a 2001 interview.
"My thoughts turned toward what I had heard about Christianity changing hatred



between human beings into real brotherly love."

In August 1945,

DeShazer's POW stint ended. He was freed by U.S. troops who parachuted into China shortly after Hiroshima was leveled by an atomic bomb.

Back in the United States, he enrolled at Seattle Pacific College, now Seattle Pacific University, a Christian school, and trained to be a missionary.

He met Florence Matheny in spring 1946, and they married that August. In 1948, the young couple moved to Japan. Initially, they lived in Nagoya, the city DeShazer bombed during the Doolittle Raid.

During three decades as missionaries, the couple helped start 16 churches in cities throughout Japan.

One of those converted to Christianity by DeShazer's testimony was Mitsuo Fuchida, the former Japanese pilot who led the attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. After reading a tract that DeShazer had written, titled "I Was a

Prisoner of Japan," Fuchida began to study the Bible. He became a Christian and spent the rest of his life as a missionary.

Bonded by their experiences, DeShazer and Fuchida met and became friends.

"I saw him just before he died," DeShazer said in 2001, recalling their last meeting. "We shared in that good, wonderful thing that Christ has done."

The DeShazers retired from missionary work in 1977 and, upon returning to the U.S., settled in Salem.

In 2001, DeShazer was a special guest at the premiere showing of the movie "Pearl Harbor." He was invited to view the film aboard a Navy ship moored in Pearl Harbor. In 2005, he was inducted into the Oregon Aviation Hall of Honor. Friends, family and community members celebrated DeShazer's life Saturday March 29, at a memorial service held at the Methodist church on Silverton Road NE and a graveside service at Restlawn Memory Gardens.

At the cemetery, dozens of people gathered around DeShazer's casket and his family. Members of the McChord Air Force Base Honor Guard honored him with a gun salute. A single bugler then played taps as part of the full military honors.

Moments later, the crowd looked up at the sky and cheered as a single B1-B bomber from the 34th Bomb Squadron flew overhead and then disappeared into the clouds. The Doolittle Raiders were part of the 34th, now based at Ellsworth Air Force Base in South Dakota.

Honor Guard members silently folded the American flag that draped DeShazer's casket, which Sgt. Douglas Pecor presented it to DeShazer's wife.

In addition to his wife and their five children, DeShazer is survived by 10 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Commission Approves Grants For War Memorial Projects

The Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission has approved \$250,000 in grants for veterans and war memorial projects.

Seven of the lottery-funded grants will help build memorials in Beaverton, Central Point, Coos Bay, Estacada, Gresham, Irrigon and Scio. An eighth grant will help restore an existing memorial in Roseburg.

The grant amounts, sponsors, project names and specific locations of the new memorials are:

- \$50,400 to Point Man Ministries Outpost 101 for a David Dewett Veterans Memorial Wayside just north of the Conde B. McCullough Bridge in Coos Bay;
- \$15,632 to Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 4750 for a granite memorial and plaza at the Irrigon City Hall;

- \$18,685 to VFW Post 584 for a memorial next to the Thomas Creek Bridge in Scio;
- \$26,000 to U.S. Submarine Veterans of World War II for a USS Albacore memorial in Beaverton's Memorial Park;
- \$40,000 to Gresham United VFW Post 180 for the Heroes Memorial Tribute next to Main City Park in Gresham;
- \$17,076 to the American Legion for a memorial in the Estacada business district;
- \$64,187 to the VFW Rogue River Post 4116 for an Oregon Fallen War Heroes Memorial in Central Point's Don Jones Memorial Park.

An \$18,020 restoration grant to Vietnam Veterans of America will help renovate a rock wall and plaques for the Douglas County War Memorial in Roseburg.

Most of the awards for new construction projects include funds for site preparation, design and engineering, flags and flagpoles, concrete pads, lighting, and landscaping. The sponsors are providing matching funds ranging from 20 percent to two-thirds of total project costs

The 2005 Oregon Legislature created and authorized the grants which can fund up to 80 percent of a project's construction or restoration costs. Organizations eligible for the funding must be based in Oregon, or, like the American Legion and VFW, have chapters in the state.

The Oregon Parks and Recreation Department awarded the program's first grants in January 2007 for projects in Albany and Portland.


Group members met at the Afghan Iraqi Freedom Memorial for a prayer and a few brief remarks.
