In Memoriam: Howard Ramsey

Nation's Last WWI Combat Veteran Passes Away

His life spanned three centuries and nineteen presidents. When Howard Ramsey was born, there were just 45 stars on the American flag, and the United States was preparing to declare war on Spain.

Truly an icon of an era nearly forgotten, Ramsey saw many things throughout his life. Henry Ford's first car was built a mere two years before Ramsey was born. The advent of the motorized vehicle would play a key role in his life.

Born in Rico, Colorado, he graduated from Washington High School in Portland, Oregon in 1916. While in high school, he joined the Naval Militia and served on the naval ship, *USS Marblehead*. After high school, Ramsey wanted to go into the Army with a friend, but he was too young to be drafted, so he waited and enlisted in 1916.

After enlisting, Ramsey traveled to France in September of 1918 to join General John

"BlackJack" Pershing's American
Expeditionary Force. Being one of the few
men who could drive a motor vehicle, he
didn't have to serve on the front lines. He
drove cars, trucks and motorcycles, driving
trucks to the lines where soldiers had been
killed to help transport their bodies back.
Ramsey also chauffeured officers, drove
ambulances and taught men how to drive
automobiles.

He came back to Portland in 1920 and went to work for Hudson-Essex. In 1922 he was employed by Western Electric (later AT&T) as an Engineer. Ramsey met his wife Hilda in Portland, where she worked as a telephone operator. They were married in 1923 in California after being transferred there by the phone company.

Ramsey retired in 1963 at the age of 65. He and Hilda headed south to Arizona becoming "snow birds" during the cold Oregon winters.

It was in Mesa, Arizona that Hilda passed away in 1982.

One of his fondest memories of France was while waiting for an officer on driving duty, a little French girl came by and sat in his car and asked him for a souvenir. He said he didn't have anything, but looked around and gave her an American penny. In exchange, she gave him a little gift wrapped in tissue. As she left, he looked in the tissue and found a lock of her curly hair. He kept that lock of hair his whole life, and he ultimately was buried with it when he passed away on February 22, at 108 years of age.

Howard Verne Ramsey was the last surviving World War I combat veteran in the United States. His story was told in a 2005 speech by Vice President Dick Cheney

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Golf Lessons for Disabled Veterans

The "First Swing" seminar is coming to Wilsonville this summer. First Swing is a program provided by the National Amputee Golf Association (NAGA). Sponsors of the program include the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) and the

Professional Golfers' Association (PGA).

Langdon Farms Golf Club will host the summertime event on Monday and Tuesday, June 4 and 5. The two-day clinic will bring together disabled veterans, veteran advocates, PGA professionals, physical and recreational therapists to teach, learn and enjoy the game of golf.

NAGA President Bob Wilson has extended a free one-year membership to the Golf Association for any veteran of the Global War on Terror who is an amputee. Although the focus of the golf clinic is on amputee injuries, all disabled veterans are invited to attend and learn how to golf.

Golf clubs will be available for use during the event, including special adaptive equipment for disabled veterans. W.C. Fields and Bob Tipton with the National Amputee Golf Association will be the instructors for the event.

Patty Brescia, the Senior Service Manager with the City of Wilsonville, encourages veteran advocates and disabled veterans to become involved with the event. Brescia who is a Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist, says "W.C. and Bob are incredible role models, setting the example for everyone to follow, that they are golfers who just happen to be amputees."

Activities for June 4 are dedicated to teaching golf professionals, therapists and

veteran advocates how to use the adaptive equipment. Tuesday is dedicated to teaching disabled veterans. The Tuesday adaptive golf clinic for disabled veterans has a \$10 fee to cover lunch at the country club and a T-shirt.

The NAGA program was pioneered in Cleveland, Ohio by World War II veteran Dale Bourisseau who received a below knee amputation. He sought out comrades with similar injuries and encouraged them to try golf — as a means of recreation and to reinforce pride. NAGA currently has over 2,000 members in the United States and some 200 players from 17 other countries.

commemorating the 75th anniversary of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

He was awarded the Oregon Medal, the World War Service Medal from the State of Oregon, the 75th Anniversary of World War I Medal, and two Republic Française medals (awarded to U.S. citizens by France).

Ramsey's memorial service was highly attended. A military squad fired a salute; bagpipers played "Amazing Grace" and a bugler played Taps. Tributes came from Jim Willis, Director of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs; Brig. Gen. Ray Byrne Jr. of

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the Oregon National Guard; and Col. Don Holden, a World War II veteran, who recited the poem, "In Flanders Fields."

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Tuskegee Airmen Speak at Milwaukie High School Event

Determined to prove their detractors wrong, nearly 1,000 Black pilots volunteered in 1942 and were trained as fighter pilots in the U.S. Army Air Corps. They would become known as Tuskegee Airmen—a group whose exploits in battle have become legendary. Three combat tested Tuskegee aviators visited Milwaukie High School on March 17.

For several hours, Alexander Jefferson, Richard Macon and Bill Terry told their stories and answered questions about their service as

The Red Tails—so-named because of the red paint on their tail assemblies—lost 66 pilots in aerial combat. Of the 994 Black aviators who were trained at Tuskegee beginning in 1942, fewer than 380 are still living. Macon and Jefferson are the only two surviving Black prisoners of war from World War II. Both were shot down while attacking enemy positions over France, and both survived harrowing experiences in German concentration camps.

members of the Air Corps' segregated 332nd Fighter Group. The three former 1st Lieutenants, now in their 80s, reminded those in attendance that no standards were ever lowered for Tuskegee pilots who trained in numerous officer fields. That also included nearly 19,000 enlisted members and support staff from mechanics to radio repairmen and nurses to control tower operators.

"We were determined to prove all doubters wrong," Macon said. "I was going to learn to fly and fight for my country. Our government was wrong and guilty of prejudgment. They didn't think Blacks could learn to fly."

And fly they did. After their flight training at Tuskegee, Alabama, the men saw action from 1943-45 in North Africa, Italy, France and Germany. By the end of the war, more than 450 pilots from the four pursuit squadrons within the 332nd FG (the 99th, 100th, 301st and 302nd), completed 1,578 missions, 15,553 combat sorties and destroyed 261 enemy aircraft. It has long been reported the pilots never lost an American aircraft to enemy fire in more than 200 combat missions—a record unmatched by any other fighter group. While this has come under some questioning, more research is needed before it could ever be disputed.

Jefferson said their commander, Col. Benjamin O. Davis, ordered his men in every briefing to stay with the bombers. "If just one bomber had been shot down, the military would've killed our unit. We'd have been grounded," he said.

and 102 African-American pilots later faced a military court martial in 1945 when they defied a direct order to not enter an officers' club at a base at Freeman Field, Indiana. Terry was the only officer convicted. Congress later overturned his conviction in 1996.

"I thought being in jail then wasn't worth it, but the guys stuck with me," Terry said, "and later we went on to help desegregate the military."

A former B-24 bomber crewmember thanked and saluted the former pilots for escorting his unit on many safe trips to Berlin. Also, Brigadier Gen. Garry Dean, the Oregon National Guard's first Black general officer, thanked the trio and said, "You've opened many doors for African Americans—doors that I walked through which allowed me to earn the success I enjoy today."

In Washington D.C., on March 29, President George W. Bush presented the highest civilian award conferred by Congress—the Congressional Gold Medal to the surviving Tuskegee Airmen to honor their service. "The Tuskegee Airmen," Bush said, "helped win a war, and you helped change our nation for the better. Yours is the story of the human spirit, and it ends like all great stories do—with wisdom and lessons and hope for tomorrow."

Social Security Clarification

In the March-April edition of *VETS NEWS* an article appeared titled "Social Security Update – Are You Getting All You Should?"

The article created a bit of a stir as numerous veterans contacted the Social Security Administration and received varied responses to their inquiries. The Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA) received approximately 50-60 calls from veterans regarding their experiences and frustrations.

The primary reason that the article was originally printed is because of the fact that the information was recently updated by the Social Security Administration in January and it was information we deemed of interest to veterans.

The employees at ODVA are here to serve and assist veterans, their families and survivors and was in no way put out by the calls received as a result of this article. In order to better serve veterans it is important that these situations are brought to our attention.

The original article was based on information that came directly from the Social Security Administration's website at www.ssa.gov. An electronic fact sheet can still be printed from that same site (go to: http://ssa.gov/pubs/10017.html). ODVA has been working with the Social Security Northwest Regional Office in Seattle in an attempt to better understand the process and get further clarification.

What we have learned as a result is that normally whenever a social security benefit is applied for and a benefit amount is computed, a person's lifetime earnings or 30 highest years of earnings are used. Sometimes the military earnings are not a high year. If military service is used as a high year of earnings, then the veteran would be asked to submit a DD-214. Also, if the veteran receives a civilian federal benefit, such as Civil Service Annuity, and the military service was used to compute the civilian benefit, the Social Security cannot use the same dates of service to compute the Social Security benefits.

As stated earlier, ODVA has been notified of many veterans who followed up with the Social Security Administration and were turned away, told that the information was incorrect and so on. However we are pleased to share that we were also notified of two veterans who contacted the Social Security Administration and their records were checked and Social Security did find that their computation for benefits did not have proper credit for their military service. They have both received an increase to their monthly benefit amount. These veterans were assisted in the Social Security Office in Medford.
