Planning Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands CFDA #16.596

Overview of Planning Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands

The Planning Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands will assist tribes in cost effectively planning facilities associated with the incarceration and rehabilitation of juvenile and adult offenders subject to tribal jurisdiction. This program is authorized under the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994, Title II, Subtitle A, Public Law 103-322, 105 Stat. 1796, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 13701 et seq.

Deadline: Registration

Registering with Grants.gov is a one-time process; however, if you are a first-time registrant, it could take up to several weeks to have your registration validated and confirmed and to receive your user password. It is highly recommended you start the registration process as early as possible to prevent delays in submitting your application package to our agency by the deadline specified. There are three steps that you must complete before you are able to register: 1) register with Central Contractor Registry (CCR), 2) register yourself as an Authorized Organization Representative (AOR), and 3) be authorized as an AOR in your organization. For more information, go to www.grants.gov/. Note: Your CCR registration must be renewed once a year. Failure to renew your CCR registration will prohibit submission of a grant application through Grants.gov.

Deadline: Applications

The due date for applying for funding under this announcement is 8:00 p.m. e.t. on September 13, 2007.

Eligibility

Applicants are limited to federally recognized tribal governments. Eligibility is defined under the Indian Self Determination Act, 25, U.S.C. 450b(e).

Planning Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands Program-Specific Information

All awards are subject to the availability of appropriated funds and any modifications or additional requirements that may be imposed by law.

The Department recognizes the critical role of planning in establishing correctional facilities that are appropriate for the intended population, supportive of cultural and traditional values, safe and secure when completed, and adhere to Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) standards regarding correctional operations, programs, and design. Grantees will be required to:

Plan, develop, and complete a Comprehensive Master Plan that:

- Establishes/enhances (tribal/non-tribal) multi-agency cooperation and collaboration.
- Establishes a multidisciplinary executive-level team, which the tribe will sustain throughout the project period, to plan and monitor the proposed strategy.
- Incorporates a community-wide assessment for the collection and examination of baseline corrections data/information to ensure that fiscal and programmatic resources will be used effectively and that new or expanded facilities are developed only when warranted.
- Encompasses the design, use, capacity, and cost of relevant adult and/or juvenile justice sanctions and services.
- Explores an array of correctional building options including prototypical or quasiprototypical concepts/designs for local correctional facilities, multi-service centers, and/ or regional facilities.
- Applies community-based alternatives to help control and prevent jail overcrowding due to alcohol, substance abuse, and methamphetamine.
- Include team participation in Office of Justice Programs (OJP)/Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA)-sponsored training events that focus on planning correctional facilities on tribal lands.
- Participate in workshops and plenary sessions at national, regional, and other training venues identified by OJP/BJA.
- Share its Comprehensive Master Plan with other tribes to support their planning efforts.
- Develop capacity to mentor other tribes (examining current policies and practices, and identifying strengths and gaps) interested in planning a facility for the incarceration and rehabilitation of juvenile and adult offenders subject to tribal jurisdiction.
- Demonstrate an operational readiness to participate in OJP/BJA training and technical assistance activities within 45 days of receiving the award.

Amount and Length of Award

Applicants may apply for up to \$150,000 for a project period of 18 months.

Match Requirement

A grant made under this program may not cover more than 90 percent of the total costs of the project being funded. The applicant must identify the source of the 10 percent non-federal portion of the budget and how match funds will be used. Applicants may satisfy this match requirement with either cash or in-kind services. The formula for calculating match is:

Award amount = Adjusted Project Costs X Recipient's share = required match.

Example: For a federal award amount of \$150,000, match would be calculated as follows:

\$150,000 = \$166,666 X 10% = \$16,666 match 90%

Performance Measures

To assist in fulfilling the Department's responsibilities under the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA), Pub. L. 103-62, applicants who receive funding under this solicitation must provide data that measures the results of their work. Performance measures for this solicitation are as follows:

CFDA Number: The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) number for this solicitation is 16.596, titled "Correctional Grant Program for Indian Tribes," and the funding opportunity number is BJA 2007-1652.

A DUNS number is required: The Office of Management and Budget requires that all businesses and nonprofit applicants for federal funds include a DUNS (Data Universal Numeric System) number in their application for a new award or renewal of an award. Applications without a DUNS number are incomplete. A DUNS number is a unique nine-digit sequence recognized as the universal standard for identifying and keeping track of entities receiving federal funds. The identifier is used for tracking purposes and to validate address and point of contact information. The DUNS number will be used throughout the grant life cycle. What an Application Must Include

Program Narrative (Attachment 1)

Applicants must submit a program narrative that describes the proposed activities for the grant period and responds to the below Selection Criteria in the order given. The narrative should be double-spaced, using a standard 12-point font (Times New Roman preferred) with 1-inch margins, and must not exceed 20 pages. Please number pages "1 of 20," "2 of 20," etc.

Budget and Budget Narrative (Attachment 2)

Applicants must provide a budget that is complete and allowable. Applicants must submit a budget worksheet and budget narrative in one file. A fillable budget detail worksheet form is available on OJP's web site at www.ojp.usdoj.gov/Forms/budget_fillable.pdf.

Project Timeline and Resumes (Attachment 3)

Attach a project timeline with each task, expected completion date, and responsible person or organization; and resumes for key positions.

Selection Criteria

1. Statement of the Problem (20 points)

Demonstrate a thorough understanding of the corrections issues confronting tribal communities and the planning elements the jurisdiction will address to meet individual needs. Include incident data and information about the number and types of offenses (e.g., youth, adult, family, traffic) addressed by the tribal criminal and juvenile justice system, the cost to incarcerate individuals, and a detailed description of the correctional facility (age, type (local/regional, tribal/BIA-administered)) used by the tribe. Discuss the impact that alcohol, methamphetamine, and substance abuse has on the criminal justice system and what community-based alternatives are/will be implemented to help control and prevent jail overcrowding.

2. Program Design and Implementation (30 points)

Describe the executive-level planning team, including names, titles, and agencies. Identify the project director and planning team members, including tribal leaders, community members, and providers. Providers must represent law enforcement, courts, corrections/probation, medical/treatment, and educational/vocational services. Note any other partners, such as faith- and community-based organizations. Indicate the tribe's commitment to sustaining the team's membership over the grant project period, detailing the nature of the work, frequency of meetings, and how achievements will be documented.

3. Capabilities/Competencies (30 points)

Describe the tribe's management structure and project staffing. Demonstrate the tribe's capability and capacity to plan and effectively oversee the construction of a correctional facility along with securing tribal and other public and private funds to complement the project and sustain facility operations after construction is completed, including staffing, operations, furniture, fixtures, equipment, and maintenance. Note: Constructing a \$10 million correctional facility may take as much as \$100 million over a 30-year period to sustain facility operations.

4. Budget (10 points)

Provide a budget that is complete, allowable, and cost effective. (see Attachment 2).

5. Impact/Outcomes and Evaluation (10 points)

Describe the process for measuring project performance, including meeting timelines and deliverables. Detail who is responsible for collecting corrections data, who is responsible for performance measurement, and how the information will be used to guide the planning process. Outline the steps the team will take to collect and examine baseline corrections data to ensure fiscal and programmatic resources will be used effectively and that new or expanded facilities are developed only when warranted.

Review Process

All applications will be peer reviewed. The BJA Director will then make award recommendations to OJP's Assistant Attorney General, who will make final determinations.
