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
Fire Prevention Week materials still available

aterials supporting this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, *Plan Your Escape*, are still available at no cost to Oregon fire departments.

Available materials include a *Plan Your Escape* flyer and a smoke alarm media campaign toolkit. Materials are made available through grants and a partnership between the Office of State Fire Marshal, the Oregon Life Safety Team and the Oregon Volunteer Firefighters Association.

The smoke alarm media campaign toolkit contains a CD and DVD with radio and television public service announcements, collateral materials, and order forms. A sample of the *Plan Your Escape* flyer will be distributed in 58 newspapers statewide during Fire Prevention Week. More flyers are available to all fire departments.

Collaboration results in government streamlining and taxpayer savings

Our mission in serving Oregonians includes not only protecting life, property and the environment from fire and hazardous materials, but also to work in their best interest to use money and resources wisely. To this end I'm proud of the successful effort by our staff to collaborate with the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (BATFE) to streamline state government and save taxpayer money.

Since the passage of federal legislation in 2002, obtaining explosive materials requires possession of a federal license and mandatory BATFE magazine storage inspections every three years. These requirements duplicated Oregon requirements administered by OSFM's License and Permit Services unit. Having duplicate permitting and inspection requirements placed an undue burden on members of Oregon's explosives industry.

OSFM staff worked with BATFE officials throughout 2006-2007 to align state and federal inspection dates and federal clearances with state certificates of possession making for a smooth transition from two agencies regulating explosives to one. The OSFM will continue to operate the reporting hotline for explosives magazine movement and location in order to maintain the safety of Oregon's first responders.

As a result of this streamlining, the Office of State Fire Marshal will cease to issue certificates for possession of explosives and registrations of magazines as of January 1, 2008. This will reduce the financial and regulatory impact on Oregon businesses and individuals involved in the explosives industry while maintaining public safety.

Oregonians can be proud of this agency's efforts to maintain service and safety while at the same time streamlining state government by reducing costs and eliminating duplicate effort.

Plan review certification requirements effective December 2007

he Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) filed changes, in May 2006, to OAR 837-039 raising the certification standards for fire officials who review plans for new construction, alterations, and specifications from a fire code approved by OSFM. These new rules require fire officials who conduct plans reviews and provide input to building officials to have their ICC Fire Inspector II and ICC Fire Plans Examiner certification by December 2007 in order to continue to provide plans review input. These OSFM requirements are necessary regardless of certifications issued to a fire official by the Building Codes Division.

Fire or no fires reports due monthly

regon fire departments are reminded fire reports and no fires reports are due monthly to the Office of State Fire Marshal's Data Services unit.

A department having no reportable fires for a particular month can report that fact in one of two ways, by sending an email stating **"(department name) had no reportable fires for (month)."** to osfm.data@state.or.us <u>or</u> by filling out the top section of the blue *Data Report Order Form* and mailing it to OSFM Data Services, 4760 Portland Road NE, Salem, OR 97305.

Submitting monthly fire or no fires reports enables the OSFM to meet national database quarterly reporting requirements established by the United States Fire Administration.

Training for Fire Plans Review

he Office of State Fire Marshal is sponsoring Fire Plans Review training November 12-15, 2007, at the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training. Registration deadline is November 5, 2007.

Lunch is provided for all participants. Lodging and all meals are provided for those traveling 50 or more miles to attend the training.

Class size is limited to 25 participants but may be cancelled if fewer than 10 students are registered.

The OSFM is giving priority to members of fire service agencies currently providing fire plans review but who have not met the ICC Fire Plans Examiner certification requirement.

Enrollment is limited to one staff member per department, per training. Invitations for additional staff to attend will be offered if seats are available.

he Oregon Life Safety Team, in partnership with the Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) and Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue (TVF&R), is hosting a train-the-trainer workshop covering TVF&R's Multi-Family Housing Fire Reduction Program. The workshop is scheduled October 25, 2007, 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. at the OSFM building in Salem.

The train-the-trainer program is designed to assist fire departments desiring to provide fire and life safety training for apartment managers and includes:

Smoke alarm recommendations issued by IAFC Fire and Life Safety Section

A smoke characterization study finalized earlier this year is prompting the International Association of Fire Chief's (IAFC) Fire and Life Safety Section (FLSS) to issue recommendations to fire departments concerning the use of smoke alarms.

The study, conducted by Underwriters Laboratories and the National Fire Protection Association's Fire Protection Research Foundation, identifies differences and advantages to the two types of alarms in detecting smoke. Both ionization and photoelectric detectors are currently marketed to the public for residential installation. FLSS recommends that dual alarms using both technologies be installed for maximum protection.

"We recognize that many departments in the United States have residential safety programs where they offer and install alarms at no charge. We suggest departments continue their programs with the alarms they have on-hand, but we recommend that they upgrade to the dualtechnology devices when it's time to restock," said Chief Steven Westermann, IAFC President.

"Life safety is an integrated strategy. Use the information in the FLSS position paper as part of your education plan to your community. Offer this as part of a comprehensive residential fireprotection program that includes integrating family-escape plans, proper usage of smoke alarms and installation of residential sprinkler systems," added Westermann.

FLSS presents its detailed recommendations in a position paper, which was reviewed and approved by the IAFC board of directors during their meeting in August. To view the position paper, go to www.iafc.org/flss.

IAFC warns of possible hazards with fog-emitting burglar alarms

The International Association of Fire Chiefs Fire and Life Safety Section (FLSS) is warning departments nationwide about potential hazards involved with fog-emitting burglar alarms, a new technology gaining popularity in Europe and the U.S.

The new burglar alarms, popularly known as 'Smokecloak,' work by emitting large volumes of fog or smoke when an intruder enters an office or retail building. The smoke eliminates visibility causing intruders to flee since they cannot see.

The FLSS is concerned the release of smoke will activate a fire alarm causing firefighters to respond to a situation in which they may unknowningly encounter a burglary in progress and possible confrontation with an armed perpetrator. In addition, firefighters may be hindered with the building and entranceway full of smoke.

The FLSS also believes devices like these are prohibited by the International Building Code, the International Fire Code and the National Fire Protection Association's Life Safety Code.

Chemical of the month by Alec Carte

Vinyl Acetate $(C_4H_6O_2)$

Description:

- Clear liquid with a sweet, pleasant, fruity odor at low concentrations but may be sharp and irritating at higher levels
- Flash Point: 16°F
- LEL: 2.6%; UEL: 13.4%
- Hazard Class: (3.2) Flammable Liquid (FP between 0°F and 73°F; (4.4) Reactive Materials; (6.3) Acute Health Hazard; (6.4) Chronic Health Hazard
- CAS No.: 108-05-4
- UN/NA: 1301
- EPA Extremely Hazardous Substance with a TPQ of 1000

NFPA Information:

- Health: 2
- Flammability: 3
- Reactivity: 2
- Special: none

Uses and Occurrences:

- Raw material in adhesives, water based paints, inks, films, lacquers
- Monomer in the production of polyvinyl acetate

Reactivity and Fire Risk:

- Hazardous polymerization can occur especially in contact with peroxides and caustic materials resulting in possible explosion and violent rupture of the container
- At elevated temperatures such as under fire conditions polymerization will occur
- Usually inhibited with hydroquinone or diphenylamine
- Vapors form an explosive mixture with air
- Vapors may travel considerable distances to an ignition source and then flash back
- Incompatibles include: peroxides, reducing and oxidizing agents, strong mineral acids and bases

Health Hazards:

- OSHA PEL: None established
- Acute hazards include severe irritation
- Absorption from the skin can result in systemic toxicity

Personal Protective Equipment:

- Emergency responders must wear Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus and full protective equipment
- Wear chemical resistant clothing as appropriate, including boots and butyl rubber gloves
- Wear chemical splash goggles and face shield
- Use appropriate respiratory protection

Inspection and Storage Tips:

- Containers stored more than three months should have the inhibitor level checked
- Keep away from all sources of ignition
- Avoid exposure to heat especially above 96.8° F

IFC Information:

- Maximum Allowable Quantities (MAQ) per S occupancy control area:
 - Unprotected by sprinklers or approved storage cabinets: 120 gallons
 - In sprinklered building, not within approved storage cabinets: 240 gallons
 - In unsprinklered building, within approved storage cabinets: 240 gallons
 - In sprinklered building, within approved storage cabinets: 480 gallons
- For storage of quantities exceeding the MAQ for S occupancy, the storage facility must conform to H-3 occupancy requirements

Incident Reporting and Information:

- There are two facilities in Oregon currently reporting Vinyl Acetate on the Hazardous Substance Information Survey
- There has been one hazardous materials incident reported in Oregon since 1986 involving Vinyl Acetate
