
Safety card prevention tips include:

Move Over – a law your life depends on

since 2003, Oregon law has required motorists to move over to give space for emergency responders stopped along the roadway, yet every year emergency responders and other public safety workers continue to be injured or killed.

As you know, Oregon law requires drivers to move safely over into another lane safely when approaching a stopped emergency vehicle along the side of the road. If a driver is on a road with only one lane in each direction or cannot safely move into another lane they must slow down at least 20 MPH below the posted speed and give the emergency vehicle as much room as possible.

The Oregon Department of Transportation has launched a statewide campaign to educate and remind Oregon drivers of the Move Over law. As members of Oregon's fire service we need to do our part to get the word out. Firefighter safety is always our number one priority and safety on the roadway is just as important as safety on the fireground.

Since the Move Over law was enacted in 2003, 10 emergency service workers in Oregon have been injured while responding to an incident along the roadside. These injuries are avoidable and it's time to do our part to end them.

I encourage all Oregon fire departments and districts to do their part by distributing ODOT Move Over brochures, displaying Move Over posters and placing a web link on their site to the ODOT Move Over campaign page at http://www.oregon.gov/ODOT/TS/Traffic_Enforcement.shtml#Move_Over_or_Slow_Down_Law.

National Response Framework training released

he Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has released the on-line IS-800B National Response Framework (NRF), An Introduction training course. The NRF focuses on response, short-term recovery, and articulates the doctrine, principles and architecture by which the nation prepares for and responds to all-hazard disasters across all levels of government and all community sectors.

The course introduces participants to the concepts and principles of the NRF. Course objectives include:

- purpose of the National Response Framework
- response doctrine established by the National Response Framework
- roles and responsibilities of entities as specified in the framework
- actions that support national response
- response organizations used for multiagency coordination
- how planning relates to national preparedness

The course is intended for government executives, private sector and non-governmental organization leaders, and emergency management practitioners including those with responsibility to provide for effective response. Those who have previously completed IS-800 or IS-800A are not required to complete IS-800B as part of NIMS compliance activities. However, FEMA strongly urges emergency management professionals across the nation to complete the new independent study course on the NRF. Additional information is available at www.fema.gov/nrf.

Trainings available for community door-to-door smoke alarm program

he Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) is hosting workshops on April 17 and May 15, 2008, for Oregon fire service members on conducting community door-to-door smoke alarm campaigns. Each two-hour (10:00 a.m. – noon) workshop will be held at the OSFM office in Salem. It will cover implementation of all phases of the model community door-to-door smoke alarm campaign kit developed by OSFM in partnership with the Oregon Life Safety Team.

These campaigns are an effective method for reaching residents who haven't responded to previous education efforts to change their attitudes and behaviors regarding proper smoke alarm maintenance and home fire safety.

In 2006, of the 18 fire fatalities in Oregon occurred in homes where smoke alarm presence and performance were able to be identified, eight of those (44%), died in homes with no smoke alarm or the smoke alarm wasn't working. These households continue to suffer a disproportionate number of fire deaths in our state.

The workshop and accompanying campaign kit give departments the tools necessary to conduct their own campaigns.

The campaign kit includes step-by-step instructions for campaign planning, recruiting community partners, campaign implementation and evaluation and material templates. Workshop attendees will be familiarized with the elements of the kit, learn to identify steps of a successful campaign and develop an action plan for conducting their own community door-to-door smoke alarm campaign.

The workshop is free. Each attending organization committing to conducting a community campaign can receive 50 free smoke alarms from OSFM.

Medical Springs smoke alarm program results in saved lives

his winter a smoke alarm alerted a husband and wife in Medical Springs to a fire in their home, allowing them to escape with minor injuries. Less than a year earlier, members of the Medical Springs Rural Fire Protection District had installed the alarm during a door-to-door smoke alarm campaign.

During the door-to-door campaign, fire district members visited each of the 60 homes in their jurisdiction and installed two new alarms with 10-year batteries and a kitchen fire extinguisher.

"Without that smoke alarm, they would most likely have died in that fire," says Medical Springs Fire Chief Jim Carter.

Fireworks education and safety training in Auburn, Washington

he non-profit *Fireworks Education & Safety Training, Inc.* has scheduled three days of fireworks training, May 7-9, 2008 at the White River Amphitheatre in Auburn, Washington, (30 minutes south of Seattle).

Training is designed for fire personnel, police officers, BATFE agents, and pyrotechnicians. A separate topic is addressed each day:

- outdoor public displays
- proximate indoor pyrotechnics
- · flame effects

Demonstrations are planned if safety precautions allow.

The training will enhance inspection practices prior to permit approval through an increased understanding and analysis of indoor and outdoor pyrotechnic displays. Training follows National Fire Protection Association 1123, 1126, and 160 guidelines.

VFA/RFA and Ready Reserve grant applications available through ODF

he Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) is accepting applications for Volunteer Fire Assistance (VFA) and Rural Fire Assistance (RFA) grants. **Application deadline is April 25, 2008**.

Added this year is a Ready Reserve (RR) program funded through agencies associated with the United States Department of Interior. The focus of the RR program is to increase rural fire department wildland fire operations safety, effectiveness, and capacity by sponsoring or facilitating local training opportunities.

The VFA and RFA programs are designed to improve the capacity and capabilities of rural and volunteer fire protection districts protecting rural communities, and those districts with a cooperative role in suppressing wildland fires on or near land managed by the Department of the Interior (Bureau of Land Management, Interior Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the National Park Service).

Safety alert - thieves stealing metal parts from fire protection systems

ire officials in Orange County, California, are warning fire services nationwide of a notable fire protection and safety issue regarding standpipe and fire sprinkler systems.

During recent in-service fire safety inspections, fire authorities in Orange County, California, discovered a significant number of sprinkler and standpipe systems with the brass fire department connections missing. Thieves are removing these items for the recycle value of the brass and other material.

Inspections by other California fire departments found many similar items missing from fire protection systems in their jurisdictions. The missing metal and brass parts were either unscrewed or cut from the pipe portion of the systems.

Cities in Arizona, Florida, and Massachusetts have reported similar thefts. Orange County, California, fire authorities recommend departments and districts nationwide survey buildings and systems in their jurisdictions to determine if this is an issue in their area.

Description:

- Synonyms: Hydrogen oxide
- At temperatures below 32° F a clear solid
- At temperatures above 212° F it vaporizes and at temperatures in between is a clear colorless odorless liquid
- CAS No.: 7732-18-5
- UN/NA: Not Regulated by DOT

- Naturally occurring
- Fire suppression
- Building construction

- Gloves, lab coat, and eye protection as appropriate if the dihydrogen oxide is contaminated or in combination with a chemical requiring it
- Under certain conditions specialized personal gear is necessary, such as, goggles, BC with weights

Inspection and Storage Tips:

- Keep container tightly closed
- Keep container in a cool, dry, well ventilated
- Protect against physical damage

Maximum Allowable Quantities (MAQ) per S occupancy control area: Not regulated

Incident Reporting and Information:

- There are no facilities in Oregon currently reporting dihydrogen oxide on the Hazardous Substance Information Survey.
- The number of incidents reported in Oregon since 1986 involving dihydrogen oxide are too numerous to record.
