# More communities focusing on fireworks enforcement

nitial indications are that fireworks-related fires are down this year and stronger enforcement of fireworks laws deserves some of the credit.

Just a few years ago we would rarely, if ever, hear about communities stepping up their enforcement of fireworks laws to combat illegal fireworks and the unsafe use of legal fireworks.

However, in the past few years we have worked to change this and we're seeing positive results. Anita Phillips and her staff from License and Permit Services deserve credit for developing partnerships with local fire and police agencies.

Credit also goes to these communities, specifically Albany, Astoria, Bend, Clackamas, Eugene, Gervais, Gladstone, Gresham, Keizer, Lincoln City, McMinnville, Portland, Salem, Sherwood, and Springfield, who made the commitment to work together to 'Keep it legal, keep it safe.' If you know of others, please let me know. They deserve to be recognized as well.

In its first year of focused enforcement, Keizer Fire District confiscated \$500 worth of illegal fireworks.

Bend Fire and Police Department's July 4th enforcement efforts resulted in three \$1,000 citations and fourteen confiscations of illegal fireworks worth \$600. Bend also recorded a 79% decrease in fireworks-caused fires from last year.

For the second year, Portland Fire & Rescue focused on fireworks enforcement with operation 'Lower the Boom' and saw a 46% drop in fireworks-caused fires from June 23 through July 6.

There's still a long way to go. Since 2005, fireworks-related fires and the associated dollar loss have been increasing. However, with the stronger enforcement efforts fireworks-related fires should continue to drop in 2009.

I encourage more of you to join in and step up enforcement efforts next year.

# State Building Codes Division to develop procedures for sprinkler ordinance requests

fter final recommendations from the Oregon Residential Structures Board in a July, 2008 meeting, the State Building Codes Division (BCD) is developing administrative and application procedures for jurisdictions to request authorization of a local ordinance under ORS 455.040 to require sprinklers in new residential construction.

The new procedures will clarify the steps and requirements jurisdictions must follow when seeking an ordinance approval for any new construction matter from the BCD, including a fire sprinkler ordinance.

Jurisdictions may submit requests for local ordinances after January 1, 2009, the proposed effective date of the new rules.

# Oregon OSHA issues combustible dust hazard alert

he Oregon Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) is warning more than 2,500 companies statewide that dust can create explosions and fire.

In 2006, the U.S. Chemical Safety Board published a major study that identified 281 combustible dust incidents in the U.S. between 1980 and 2005. These incidents killed 119 workers and injured over 700 others. Neither employers nor employees knew that a hazard existed in many of the incidents.

The Oregon OSHA alert also provides tips to businesses on assessing their dust explosion potential along with links to other resources.

# DOT reports errors in the 2008 Emergency Response Guidebook

he U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) has announced printing errors in the 2008 Emergency Response Guidebook. All errors are in the 'Name of Material Index' (blue pages), however not all books contain the errors.

Check your guidebook's blue pages for errors that may include:

- Pages 97 and 98 are duplicated.
- Missing pages after page 98 are missing.
- Pages 97 through 128 are duplicated.
- Missing pages after page 128 are missing.

Some books contain the printing errors and others do not. Review each of your books to ensure the blue pages are sequenced correctly.

If you have misprinted books, notify your Local Emergency Manager. OSFM is working with the DOT and emergency managers to replace misprinted books.

## Save lives - install smoke alarms

he Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) is hosting several workshops for Oregon fire service members and their community partners on conducting community door-to-door smoke alarm campaigns. The 2-hour training covers implementation of all phases of the model community door-to-door smoke alarm campaign kit developed by OSFM in partnership with the Oregon Life Safety Team.

The workshop and campaign kit give departments the tools to conduct their own campaigns. Workshop attendees will learn to identify steps of a successful campaign and develop an action plan for conducting their own community door-to-door smoke alarm campaign.

The workshop is free. OSFM will provide up to 50 free smoke alarms and \$250 to each attending organization committing to conducting a community campaign.

# **Update on firefighter grants**

regon fire departments have done well during early rounds of the federal fire service grant programs. Four Oregon departments received a total of \$321,208 in the first round of awards for safety and operations projects, and in the third round four more Oregon departments received a total of \$643,030, including two vehicles.

The Federal Emergency Management Administration has three major fire service grant programs. The Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG), Fire Prevention and Safety (FP&S), and Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER).

The AFG will continue providing grant opportunities through 2010 under the current legislation. In 2008, the federal government authorized \$560 million to fund the AFG program, up slightly from the \$547 authorized in 2007.

In 2007, 50 Oregon fire departments shared \$4,730,346, including seven grants for vehicles.

# Oregon class graduates from NFA public education training

regon State Fire Marshal Nancy Orr presented graduation certificates to 23 Oregon fire service members July 11, 2008 for completing the National Fire Academy's (NFA) training on *Presenting Effective Public Education Programs* in Salem, Oregon. The weeklong training, delivered at the Oregon Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST), was possible due to a collaboration between the Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal, DPSST, and NFA.

The course provides fundamental knowledge, skills, and attitudes to deliver fire and life safety educational programs in the community. It emphasizes a community-based concept in

developing and delivering educational programs. Students are evaluated through performance on 10- to 15-minute presentations, home community classroom exercises, and a final examination.

Presentation topics included: residential fire sprinklers and their value, illegal apartments, local emergency planning commissions, smoke alarms program, residential addresses and rural addresses, senior fire safety, teenage firesetters, injury prevention to fire personnel, fire escape planning, working with the Hispanic community, importance and use of portable fire extinguishers, water safety, value of and gaining fire department volunteers, and structure ignition prevention.
