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CALIFORNIA PROSPECTIVE PLANTINGS REPORT

SACRAMENTO -- The USDA, NASS, California Field Office today released the forecasts of crop plantings for 2006. These forecasts, of acreage planted and to be planted, are based on a survey of more than 2,500 California farmers, conducted the first two weeks of March. The impact of weather and/or market conditions since the survey is not reflected in this report.

Barley - California farmers had planted or intended to plant 110 thousand acres to barley, 10 percent more than the previous year.

Beans, Dry Edible - Seeding of dry edible beans was planned for 65.0 thousand acres in California, unchanged from last year.

Corn - California farmers were expecting to plant 520 thousand acres of corn for all purposes in 2006, a decrease of 4 percent from last year.

Cotton - California farmers were intending to plant 310 thousand acres to <u>Upland</u> cotton in 2006, down 28 percent from the acreage seeded in 2005 and the lowest planted acreage since 1944. In addition, growers were expecting to seed a record 290 thousand acres to <u>American Pima</u> cotton in 2006, up 26 percent from last year.

Hay, All - California producers intended to harvest hay from 1.65 million acres, up 6 percent from last year.

Oats - Farmers in California had planted or were expecting to plant 250 thousand acres of oats, 7 percent less than in 2005.

Rice - California farmers intended to seed rice on 550 thousand acres, 4 percent above the acreage seeded in 2005. The expressed intentions were to seed 485 thousand acres to <u>medium grain</u> varieties, 4 percent more than a year ago. The <u>long grain</u> rice acreage forecast is 10.0 thousand acres, 11 percent above last season. Short grain rice planted acreage forecast is 55.0 thousand acres, 2 percent more than 2005. Short grain and all rice forecasts include the intended plantings of sweet rice.

Sorghum - Farmers in California were intending to plant 32.0 thousand acres to sorghum in 2006, 23 percent more than the 2005 acreage.

Sugar Beets - California producers had planted or intended to plant 44.4 thousand acres of sugar beets, unchanged from the acreage seeded in 2005.

Sweet Potatoes - California farmers were expecting to plant 11.5 thousand acres of sweet potatoes in 2006, 2 percent less than last year.

Wheat - Acreage seeded to <u>Winter</u> wheat is estimated at 430 thousand acres, 13 percent below last year. Another 70.0 thousand acres have been seeded to <u>Durum</u> wheat, 7 percent below 2005.

The next production forecast will be issued April 10, 2006.
