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Arizona Cattle on Feed Inventory up 11 Percent

On June 1, 2004, Arizona had 294,000 head of cattle on feed for the slaughter market, up 11 percent from a year ago but down 1,000 head from last month. Placements totaled 29,000 head, down 24 percent from May 2003. During May, 28,000 head were marketed, a decrease of 28 percent from last May.

On June 1, 2004, California had 520,000 head of cattle on feed for the slaughter market, up 7 percent from last June and up 20,000 head from last month. Placements totaled 91,000 head, up 10 percent from May 2003. During May, 63,000 head were marketed, a decrease of 5 percent from last May.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States for feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 10.62 million head on June 1, 2004. The inventory was 1 percent above June 1, 2003 but 3 percent below June 1, 2002.

Placements in feedlots during May totaled 2.36 million, 2 percent above 2003 and 4 percent above 2002. Net placements were 2.28 million. During May, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 495,000, 600-699 pounds were 486,000, 700-799 pounds were 772,000, and 800 pounds and greater were 610,000.

Marketings of fed cattle during May totaled 2.03 million, 9 percent below 2003 and 7 percent below 2002.

Other disappearance totaled 79,000 during May, 22 percent above 2003 and 3 percent above 2002.

May Milk Production down 0.1 Percent

Milk production in the 20 major States during May totaled 13.0 billion pounds, down 0.1 percent from May 2003. April revised production, at 12.6 billion pounds, was down 086 percent from April 2003. The April revision represented an increase of 4 million pounds from last month's preliminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 20 major States averaged 1,684 pounds for May, 13 pounds below May 2003.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 20 major States was 7.72 million head, 71,000 head more than May 2003, and 5,000 head less than April 2004.

Red Meat Production Down From Previous Month

Commercial red meat production for the United States totaled 3.60 billion pounds in May, down 9 percent from the 3.94 billion pounds produced in May 2003.

Beef production, at 2.07 billion pounds, was 12 percent below the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.84 million head, down 13 percent from May 2003. The average live weight was down 4 pounds from the previous year, at 1,204 pounds.

Veal production totaled 13.8 million pounds, 13 percent below May a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 64,900 head, down 15 percent from May 2003. The average live weight was 12 pounds above last year, at 355 pounds.

Pork production totaled 1.50 billion pounds, down 3 percent from the previous year. Hog kill totaled

7.58 million head, 3 percent below May 2003. The average live weight was 1 pound below the previous year, at 266 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production, at 13.0 million pounds, was down 14 percent from May 2003. Sheep slaughter totaled 188,500 head, 15 percent below last year. The average live weight was 138 pounds, up 1 pound from May a year ago.

January to May 2004 commercial red meat production was 18.4 billion pounds, down 4 percent from 2003. Accumulated beef production was down 9 percent from last year, veal was down 12 percent, pork was up 3 percent from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 1 percent.

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June Farm Prices Received Index Continues At Record **High Level**

The preliminary All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers in June at 129, based on 1990-92=100, is unchanged from the May Index, but up 22 points (21 percent) from June 2003. The Livestock & Products Index remained unchanged from May while the All Crops Index decreased 1 point (0.8 percent). Producers received higher prices for lettuce, broilers, sweet corn, and cattle. Lower prices were received for milk, soybeans, tomatoes, and grapes. The seasonal change in the mix of commodities farmers sell, based on the past 3-year average, also affects the overall index.

Increased average marketings of wheat, grapes, hay, and cantaloupes offset decreased marketings of strawberries, oranges,

sweet corn, and tomatoes. The Food Commodities Index, at 131, is unchanged from last month. The index stands 24 points (22 percent) above June 2003.

Prices Paid Index Up 1 Point

The June Index of Prices Paid for Commodities and Services, Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates (PPITW) is 135 percent of the 1990-92 average. The index is up 1 point from May and 7 points (5.5 percent) above June 2003. Higher prices in June for feeder cattle, feed concentrates, LP gas, and complete feeds more than offset lower prices for nitrogen fertilizers, feed grains, other machinery, and hay and forages.
