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Arizona Cattle on Feed Inventory Up Slightly From Last Year

On August 1, 2007, Arizona had 341,000 head of cattle on feed for the slaughter market, up 2,000 head from a year ago but down 2,000 head from last month. Placements totaled 32,000 head during July, 1,000 head more than a year ago. During July, 33,000 head were marketed, down 1,000 head from last year.

On August 1, 2007, California had 540,000 head of cattle on feed for the slaughter market, up 25,000 head from last year but down 5,000 head from last month. Placements totaled 51,000 head during July, down 4,000 head from last year. During July, 54,000 head were marketed, down 13,000 head from last year.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States for feedlots with capacity of 1,000 or more head totaled 10.3 million head on August 1, 2007. The inventory was 5 percent below August 1, 2006 but 2 percent above August 1, 2005.

Placements in feedlots during July totaled 1.62 million, 17 percent below 2006 and 3 percent below 2005. Net placements were 1.56 million. This is the lowest placements for the month of July since the series began in 1996. During July, placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds were 360,000, 600-699 pounds were 312,000, 700-799 pounds were 445,000, and 800 pounds and greater were 505,000.

Marketings of fed cattle during July totaled 2.0 million, 3 percent above 2006 and 4 percent above 2005. Other disappearance totaled 61,000 during July, 5 percent above 2006 but unchanged from 2005.

Hired Workers Up 1 Percent, Wage Rates Up 3 Percent From a Year Ago

There were 1,205,000 hired workers on the Nation's farms and ranches during the week of July 8-14, 2007, up 1 percent from a year ago. Of these hired workers, 847,000 workers were hired directly by farm operators. Agricultural service employees on farms and ranches made up the remaining 358,000 workers.

Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$10.04 per hour during the July 2007 reference week, up 32 cents from a year earlier. Field workers received an average of \$9.31 per hour, up 38 cents from last July, while livestock workers earned \$9.80 per hour compared with \$9.49 a year earlier. The field and livestock worker combined wage rate, at \$9.44 per hour, was up 37 cents from last year.

Range and Pasture Conditions Ranged From Poor to Excellent Condition

During July, Arizona's rangeland and pastures received some needed moisture. Rangeland conditions improved significantly since June. Conditions ranged from poor to excellent, depending on location. High elevation conditions were mostly good. Mid elevation conditions were poor to good. Low elevation conditions ranged from poor to excellent, depending on location. Arizona cattle and calves were in fair condition. Stock water supplies and soil moisture were mostly short to adequate. Insect damage was mostly light to moderate.

In Arizona's Northern region, rangeland and pasture condition was poor to good, depending on location. High elevation conditions were mostly good. Mid elevation conditions ranged from very poor to good. Low elevation conditions were poor to fair. Cattle and calves were in fair condition. Stock water and soil moisture were mostly short to adequate. Insect damage was mostly light to moderate.

The Central region's rangeland and pasture condition was poor to excellent, regardless of elevation. Cattle and calves were in fair condition. Stock water supplies and soil moisture were mostly short to adequate. Insect damage was mostly light to moderate.

In the South, rangeland and pasture conditions ranged from poor to mostly good, depending on location. High elevation conditions were mostly good. Mid elevation conditions were poor to mostly good. Low elevation conditions were mostly poor to good. Cattle and calves were in mostly fair condition. Stock water supplies and soil moisture were mostly short to adequate. Insect damage was light to moderate.

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August Farm Prices Received Index Decreased 2 Points From LastMonth

The preliminary All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers in August, at 139 percent, based on 1990-92=100, decreased 2 points (1.4 percent) from July. The Crop Index is down 2 points (1.4 percent) and the Livestock Index decreased 1 point (0.7 percent). Producers received lower prices for onions, corn, broilers, and eggs. Higher commodity prices were received for wheat, cattle, strawberries, and broccoli. The overall index is also affected by the seasonal change based on a 3-year average mix of commodities producers sell. Increased average marketings of cattle, grapes, calves, and sweet corn offset decreased marketings of wheat, hay, milk, and broilers.

The preliminary All Farm Products Index is up 20 points (17 percent) from August 2006. The Food Commodities Index, at 142, decreased 1 point (0.7 percent) from last month but increased 19 points (15 percent) from August 2006.

Prices Paid Index Unchanged

The August Index of Prices Paid for Commodities and Services, Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates (PPITW) is 158 percent of the 1990-92 average. The index is unchanged from July but 9 points (6.0 percent) above August 2006. Higher prices for complete feeds, feed concentrates, feeder cattle, and feeder pigs offset lower prices in August for gasoline, feed grains, feed supplements, and mixed fertilizers.
