## **ORDER OF DISMISSAL**

On June 3, 1993, the Board of Alien Labor Certification Appeals ("Board") issued an Notice and Order indicating that it would review, en banc, the above-styled cases. The Board ordered each Employer, within twenty days of the date of service of that Notice and Order, to file a statement of intent to proceed on behalf of the Alien. Employers were notified at that time that the failure to file such a statement would result in a dismissal of its appeal.
