- 1 Not all Real ID Act requirements are listed. Oregon and most other states already meet some Real ID Act standards, such as placement of a customer's photo on the card and keeping a digital copy of the photo on file, and use of nationally standardized bar codes on the back of the card.
- 2 Oregon has received an extension for partial compliance to Dec. 31, 2009.
- 3 Oregon already meets these requirements as of Feb. 4, 2008.
- 4 Currently, systems exist only to verify Social Security numbers and U.S. Alien Registration numbers.
- 5 Oregon may request an additional extension to May 11, 2011, for these requirements.
