HIGHLIGHTS IN THIS REPORT

November Livestock Slaughter Hog and Pig Inventory Average Prices Received by Farmers Cotton Ginnings

Louisiana Livestock Slaughter

Commercial red meat production in Louisiana during November totaled 0.9 million pounds, unchanged from October but down 10 percent from the previous year.

There were 1,000 head of <u>cattle</u> slaughtered during November, down 100 head from October and the previous year. Average live weight was 868 pounds, up 23 pounds from the previous month and 18 pounds above November 2005. Total live weight, at 871,000 pounds, was 9 percent below the previous month and 8 percent below the previous year.

<u>Calves</u> slaughtered during November totaled 300 head, unchanged from October but 200 head below the previous year. Live weight averaged 491 pounds, up 12 pounds from October and 18 pounds above a year ago. Total live weight, at 158,000 pounds, was down 4 percent from October and 37 percent below the previous year.

The number of <u>hogs</u> slaughtered during November totaled 2,000 head, up 400 head from the previous month and 200 head above October 2005. Average live weight was 166 pounds, down 12 pounds from October and 7 pounds below the previous year. Total live weight was 326,000 pounds, up 16 percent from October and 3 percent above a year ago.

The number of <u>sheep</u> slaughtered during November was 100 head, down 100 head from October but unchanged from the previous year. Live weight averaged 88 pounds, up 6 pounds

from the previous month and 7 pounds from the previous year.

United States Livestock Slaughter

Commercial red meat production for the United States totaled 4.14 billion pounds in November, up 5 percent from the 3.94 billion pounds produced in November 2005.

November 2006 contained 22 weekdays (including two holidays) and 4 Saturdays. November 2005 contained 22 weekdays (including two holidays) and 4 Saturdays.

Beef production, at 2.22 billion pounds, was 7 percent above the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.84 million head, up 6 percent from November 2005. The average live weight was up 7 pounds from the previous year, at 1,291 pounds.

Veal production totaled 14.3 million pounds, 15 percent above November a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 66,800 head, up 18 percent from November 2005. The average live weight was 14 pounds below last year, at 351 pounds.

Pork production totaled 1.89 billion pounds, up 3 percent from the previous year. Hog kill totaled 9.37 million head, 3 percent above November 2005. The average live weight was 1 pound above the previous year, at 273 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production, at 15.3 million pounds, was down 3 percent from November 2005. Sheep slaughter totaled 223,800 head, slightly below last year. The average live weight was 137 pounds, down 3 pounds from November a year ago.

January to November 2006 commercial red meat production was 43.5 billion pounds, up 4 percent from 2005. Accumulated beef production was up 6 percent from last year, veal was down slightly, pork was up 2 percent from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 1 percent.

Louisiana Hog Inventory

Louisiana's total hog inventory for December 1, 2006, at 14,000 head, was unchanged from December 2005. At 2,000 head, the Louisiana breeding hog inventory was the same as the December 1 inventory a year ago. Market hog inventories totaled 12,000 head, unchanged from a year earlier.

The December 2005 - November 2006 Louisiana pig crop, at 26,000 head, was down 1,000 head from the pig crop in December 2004 - November 2005 period. Sows farrowing during this period totaled 3,700 head, up 100 head from the previous year. An average of 7.03 pigs were saved per litter during the December 2005 - November 2006 period.

United States Hog Inventory

U.S. inventory of all hogs and pigs on December 1, 2006 was 62.1 million head. This was up 1 percent from December 1, 2005, but down 1 percent from September 1, 2006.

Breeding inventory, at 6.09 million head, was up 1 percent from last year and up slightly from the previous quarter. Market hog inventory, at 56.1 million head, was up 1 percent from last year, but down 1 percent from last quarter.

The September-November 2006 pig crop, at 26.6 million head, was up 1 percent from 2005 and up 3 percent from 2004. Sows farrowing during this period totaled 2.91 million head, up slightly from 2005 and up 1 percent from 2004. The sows farrowed during this quarter represented 48 percent of the breeding herd. The average pigs saved per litter was 9.13 for the September-November 2006 period, compared to 9.03 last year. Pigs saved per litter by size of operation ranged from 7.60 for operations with 1-99 hogs and pigs to 9.20 for operations with more than 5,000 hogs and pigs.

Prices Received Index Up

The preliminary All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers in December, at 121 percent, based on 1990-92=100, increased 1 point from November. The Crop Index was up 6 points, but the Livestock Index decreased 3 points. Producers received higher commodity prices for lettuce, corn, grapes and broccoli. Lower prices were received for turkeys, cattle, hogs and tomatoes. The overall index is also affected by the seasonal change based on a 3-year average mix of commodities producers sell. Increased average marketings of oranges, wheat, milk and broilers offset decreased marketings of cattle, soybeans, grapes and corn.

The preliminary All Farm Products Index was up 6 points from December 2005. The Food Commodities Index, at 123, increased 2 points from last month and 1 point from December 2005.

Prices Paid Index Up

The December Index of Prices Paid for Commodities and Services, Interest, Taxes and Farm Wage Rates is 148 percent of the 1990-92 average. The index is up 2 points from November and 5 points above December 2005. Higher prices in December for complete feeds, feed concentrates, feed supplements and diesel fuel offset lower prices for nitrogen fertilizers, building materials, feeder cattle and LP gas.
