HIGHLIGHTS IN THIS REPORT

November Livestock Slaughter Hog and Pig Inventory Average Prices Received by Farmers Cotton Ginnings

Louisiana Livestock Slaughter

Commercial red meat production in Louisiana during November totaled 600,000 pounds, unchanged from October but down 33 percent from the previous year.

There were 600 head of <u>cattle</u> slaughtered during November, unchanged from October but down 400 head from the previous year. Average live weight was 798 pounds, up 24 pounds from the previous month but 66 pounds below November 2006. Total live weight, at 463,000 pounds, was 1 percent below the previous month and 47 percent below the previous year.

<u>Calves</u> slaughtered during November totaled 400 head, unchanged from October but 100 head above the previous year. Live weight averaged 500 pounds, down 1 pound from October but 8 pounds above a year ago. Total live weight, at 186,000 pounds, was up 1 percent from October and 27 percent above the previous year.

The number of <u>hogs</u> slaughtered during November totaled 1,700 head, up 100 head from the previous month but 300 head below October 2006. Average live weight was 183 pounds, up 5 pounds from October and 19 pounds above the previous year. Total live weight was 305,000 pounds, up 9 percent from October but 6 percent below a year ago.

The number of **sheep** slaughtered during November was 200 head, down 100 head from October but 100 head above the previous year. Live weight averaged 76 pounds, up 2 pounds from the previous month but down 12 pounds from the previous year.

United States Livestock Slaughter

Commercial red meat production for the United States totaled 4.3 billion pounds in November, up 4 percent from the 4.2 billion pounds produced in November 2006.

November 2007 contained 22 weekdays (including two holidays) and 4 Saturdays. **November 2006** contained 22 weekdays (including two holidays) and 4 Saturdays.

Beef production at 2.2 billion pounds, was slightly above the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.8 million head, down slightly from November 2006. The average live weight was up 9 pounds from the previous year, at 1,304 pounds.

Veal production totaled 10.1 million pounds, 22 percent below November a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 58,900 head, down 12 percent from November 2006. The average live weight was down 36 pounds from last year, at 291 pounds.

Pork production totaled 2.1 billion pounds, up 8 percent from the previous year. Hog kill totaled 10.1 million head, up 7 percent from November 2006. The average live weight was the same as the previous year, at 272 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production at 16.1 million pounds was up 5 percent from November 2006. Sheep slaughter totaled 236,700 head, 6 percent above last year. The average live weight was 136 pounds, down 1 pound from November a year ago.

January to November 2007 commercial red meat production was 44.6 billion pounds, up 2 percent from 2006. Accumulated beef production was up 1 percent from last year, veal was down 5 percent, pork was up 4 percent from last year, and lamb and mutton production was down 1 percent.

Louisiana Hog Inventory

Louisiana's total hog inventory for December 1, 2007, at 11,000 head, was down 3,000 head from December 2006. At 1,500 head, the Louisiana breeding hog inventory was down 500 head from the December 1 inventory a year ago. Market hog inventory totaled 9,500 head, 2,500 head below a year earlier.

The December 2006 - November 2007 Louisiana pig crop, at 20,900 head, was down 5,100 head from the pig crop in December 2005 - November 2006 period. Sows farrowing during this period totaled 3,000 head, down 700 head from the previous year. An average of 6.97 pigs was saved per litter during the December 2006 - November 2007 period.

United States Hog Inventory

U.S. inventory of all hogs and pigs on December 1, 2007, was 65.1 million head. This was up 4 percent from December 1, 2006, but down 1 percent from September 1, 2007.

Breeding inventory, at 6.2 million head, was up 1 percent from last year, and up slightly from the previous quarter. Market hog inventory, at 59 million head, was up 5 percent from last year, but down 1 percent from last quarter.

The September-November 2007 pig crop, at 28 million head, was up 4 percent from 2006 and up 7 percent from 2005. Sows farrowing during this period totaled 3 million head, up 3 percent from 2006 and up 4 percent from 2005. The sows farrowed during this quarter represented 49 percent of the breeding herd. The average pigs saved per litter was 9.24 for the September-November 2007 period, compared to 9.11 last year. Pigs saved per litter by size of operation ranged from 7.40 for operations with 1-99 hogs and pigs to 9.30 for operations with more than 5,000 hogs and pigs.

Prices Received Index Up

The preliminary All Farm Products Index of Prices Received by Farmers in December, at 151 percent, based on 1990-92=100, increased 5 points from November. The Crop Index was up 10 points but the Livestock Index was unchanged. The All Farm Index and All Crop Index are at record highs. Producers received higher commodity prices for tomatoes, corn, soybeans and wheat. Lower prices were received for oranges, turkeys, snap beans and broilers. The overall index is also affected by the seasonal change, based on a 3-year average mix, of commodities producers sell. Increased average marketings of wheat, milk, oranges and broilers offset decreased marketings of soybeans, cattle, corn and grapes.

The preliminary All Farm Products Index was up 31 points from December 2006. The Food Commodities Index, at 158, increased 7 points from last month and increased 37 points from December 2006.

Prices Paid Index Up

The December Index of Prices Paid for Commodities and Services, Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates (PPITW) was 162 percent of the 1990-92 average. The index was up 1 point from November and 13 points above December 2006. This is a record high for the index. Higher prices in December for complete feeds, feed grains, nitrogen fertilizer and feed concentrates offset lower prices for feeder cattle, diesel fuel, gasoline and LP gas.
