2007 Annual Livestock Slaughter Farms & Land in Farms

Louisiana Annual Livestock Slaughter

Commercial red meat production in Louisiana during 2007 totaled 7.5 million pounds, down 16 percent from 2006.

There were 7,800 head of cattle slaughtered during 2007, down 24 percent from 2006. Average live weight, at 822 pounds, was down 3 pounds from the previous year. Total live weight, at 6.4 million pounds, was down 25 percent from the year before.

Calves slaughtered totaled 3,300 head during 2007, down 3 percent from the previous year. Live weight averaged 500 pounds per head, up three pounds from 2006. Total live weight was 1.7 million pounds, down 2 percent from 2006.

The number of hogs slaughtered during 2007 totaled 17,400 head, down 6 percent from the previous year. Live weight averaged 192 pounds per head, up three pounds from 2006. Total live weight was 3.3 million pounds, down 5 percent from 2006.

Sheep slaughtered during 2007 totaled 3,300 head, up 94 percent from 2006. Live weight averaged 83 pounds per head, down six pounds from the previous year. Total live weight was 273,900 pounds, up 81 percent from 2006.

United States Annual Livestock Slaughter

Red meat production for the United States totaled 48.8 billion pounds in 2007, 2 percent higher than the previous year. Red meat includes beef, veal, pork, and lamb and mutton. Red meat production in commercial plants totaled 48.7 billion pounds. On-farm production totaled 135 million pounds.

Beef production totaled 26.5 billion pounds, up 1 percent from the previous year. Veal production totaled 146 million pounds, down 6 percent from last year.

Pork production, at 22.0 billion pounds, was 4 percent above the previous year. Lamb and mutton production totaled 188 million pounds, down 1 percent from 2006.

Commercial cattle slaughter during 2007 totaled 34.3 million head, up 2 percent from 2006, with federal inspection comprising 98.4 percent of the total. The average live weight was 1,269 pounds, down 2 pounds from a year ago. Steers comprised 51.3 percent of the total federally inspected cattle slaughter, heifers 30.3 percent, dairy cows 7.4 percent, other cows 9.4 percent and bulls 1.6 percent.

Commercial calf slaughter totaled 758,100 head, 7 percent higher than a year ago, with 98.2 percent under federal inspection. The average live weight was 303 pounds, down 39 pounds from a year earlier.

Commercial hog slaughter totaled 109.2 million head, 4 percent higher than in 2006, with 99.1 percent of the hogs slaughtered under federally inspected. The average live weight was unchanged from last year, at 269 pounds. Barrows and gilts comprised 96.5 percent of the total federally inspected hog slaughter.

Commercial sheep and lamb slaughter, at 2.69 million head, was down slightly from the previous year with 93.9 percent federally inspected. The average live weight was unchanged from 2006 at 136 pounds. Lambs and yearlings comprised 95.4 percent of the total federally inspected sheep slaughter.

There were 808 plants slaughtering under federal inspection on January 1, 2008, compared with 795 last year. Of these, 626 plants slaughtered at least one head of cattle during 2007, with the 14 largest plants slaughtering 54 percent of the total cattle killed. Hogs were slaughtered at 618 plants, with the 11 largest plants accounting for 51 percent of the total. Six of the 232 plants that slaughtered calves accounted for 63 percent of the total and 4 of the 480 plants that slaughtered sheep or lambs in 2007 handled 68 percent of the total head.

Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska and Texas accounted for 51 percent of the United States' commercial red meat production in 2007, similar to 2006.

United States Farms and Land in Farms: 2007 Summary

The number of farms in the United States in 2007 is estimated at 2.1 million, 0.6 percent fewer than in 2006. Total land in farms, at 930.9 million acres, decreased 1.5 million acres, or 0.16 percent, from 2006. The average farm size was 449 acres during 2007, an increase of three acres from the previous year. The decline in the number of farms and land in farms reflects a continuing consolidation in farming operations and diversion of agricultural land to nonagricultural uses.
