The Ship Strike Committee's paper entitled "Discussion Draft: Right Whales & Ship Management Options" identifies a range of management *options* which would impose operating restrictions on vessels operating in high-risks areas. In the Southeast U.S., high-risk areas include all ports and the area from Port Canaveral, Florida to the Virginia / North Carolina border. In the mid-Atlantic, these areas include all ports from Norfolk to NY/NJ. In the Northeast U.S., these areas include all ports from Long Island and Block Island Sounds, north to Canada.
