This medical examination form is derived from a Job Task Analysis of the entry level Police, Corrections and Parole & Probation officer. It meets the *Americans With Disabilities Act* (ADA) criteria to identify the Essential Functions/Tasks of the position. A panel of physicians developed the medical standards based upon the essential tasks.

POLICE OFFICER ESSENTIAL TASKS

Execute arrest warrants

Conduct frisk or pat down

Retain unruly or violent individuals and remove from court

Execute stop of motor vehicle and approach and talk to occupants

Make traffic arrest (physical custody)

Direct suspect vehicle out of traffic to execute high risk stop

Engage in high speed pursuit driving in congested area

Engage in high speed pursuit driving off road

Engage in high speed response driving on open road

Push open a door with your shoulder

Break up fights between two or more persons

Subdue physically attacking person

Subdue person resisting arrest

Grip person tightly to prevent escape/control movement

Pull person out of a vehicle who is resisting arrest

Use hammer lock to hold person

Pull person through vehicle window or door to effect an arrest

Fire weapon in self-defense at an attacking dangerous animal

Discharge firearm from protective positions

Draw weapon to protect self and third party

Reload firearm under combat conditions

Discharge shoulder weapon, e.g., rifle and shotgun

Administer cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR)

Apply basic first aid to control bleeding

CORRECTIONS OFFICER ESSENTIAL TASKS

Patrol tiers, cell areas, corridors and secure areas

Conduct head or institutional count

Inspect identification of persons entering or leaving the facility

Use chemical agents to quell disturbance/riots

Monitor and control inmate shower and shaving activities

Escort inmates within the facility

Maintain security

Control and/or supervise inmate movement in activity areas

Physically place inmates in, or remove inmates from cells

Supervise inmate activities in housing area

Guard inmates away from the facility

Confront and control hostile groups

Breakup fights between two or more inmates

Carry handgun while guarding inmates outside the facility

Resolve conflict between inmates verbally

Monitor/log incoming inmates administrative segregation

Take action when fellow officer is angry with inmate

Report severe depression or behavior leading to suicide

Verbally reprimand inmate for violation of rules/regulations

Apply "progressive discipline"

Report breaches of security or unsound security practices

Review and comprehend emergency procedures

Identify and observe group agitators, gang members, etc.

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PAROLE & PROBATION OFFICER ESSENTIAL TASKS

Serve arrest warrants on parole violator.

Present subject at the place of detention/obtain appropriate receipts.

Develop/maintain descriptive information files on subject caseload.

Search premises, grounds, vehicle, etc.

Meet regularly with subject to provide counseling, encouragement, etc.

Determine whether there has been a violation.

Clean weapons.

Disarm subject.

Detain a person at gun point.

Discharge a firearm in dark environment while using a flashlight.

Force open a door.

Handcuff a person resisting arrest.

Handcuff more than one person at a time.

Inspect vehicles for weapons and contraband after prisoner transport.

Plan strategy for conducting search of person, premises, grounds, etc.

Plan strategy for making arrest.

Review court orders and papers regarding sentencing of subject.

Provide emergency CPR techniques.

Apply first aid to treat for chemical burns.

Apply first aid to treat for diabetic shock.

Apply first aid to treat for eye injuries.

Apply first aid to treat for heat stroke.

Conduct body search (pat down).

Observe subject to assess mental and physical state.

Administer sobriety tests.

Make criminal arrest for new felony or misdemeanor.

Inspect dwelling units and rooms of subject.

Draw weapon in self-defense.

9. A - EYES AND VISION

A1 VISUAL ACUITY

- Corrected vision shall be at least 20/30 (Snellen) in each eye.
- Applicants whose uncorrected vision is worse than 20/100 shall wear soft contact lenses (SCLs) to meet the corrected vision requirement.
- Applicants with uncorrected vision of 20/100 or better may wear glasses with frames to meet the corrected vision requirement.
- Replacement glasses or lenses (as appropriate) shall be on the person or readily available at all times during each workshift. The employing agency must monitor this compliance.

A2 PERIPHERAL VISION

The Field of Vision shall be at least 140 degrees in the horizontal meridian combined.

A3 DEPTH PERCEPTION

Depth Perception shall be sufficient to demonstrate stereopsis adequate to perform the essential tasks of the job. Recommended test is the Random Stereo Test with 60 seconds of arc.

A4 NIGHT BLINDNESS

A history of night blindness should be evaluated to determine applicant's capacity to perform essential tasks at night or in dark or low light settings.

A5 COLOR VISION

- Red or green deficiencies are not necessarily excludable but should be noted for further examination.
- Correct reading of at least nine (9) of the first thirteen (13) plates of Ishihara Test (24 Plate Edition).
- Applicants who fail the Ishihara test can meet the color vision standard by demonstrating that they can correctly discriminate colors via a field test conducted by the employer and approved by DPSST.


10. B - EARS AND HEARING

B1 *HEARING ACUITY*

- Applicant must have hearing sufficient to perform essential hearing tasks without posing a direct threat to themselves or others.
- Police & Corrections applicants must not have an average loss greater than 25-db at 500, 1000, 2000 and 3000 Hertz (Hz) levels in each ear with no single loss in excess of 40 db or achieve a Speech Discrimination test score of no less than 90% utilizing a standard 50 word presentation at 60 db Hearing Threshold Level (HTL).
- Parole & Probation applicants must not have an average loss greater than 35-db at 500, 1000, 2000 and 3000 Hertz (Hz) levels in each ear with no single loss in excess of 45 db or achieve a Speech Discrimination test score of no less than 90% utilizing a standard 50 word presentation at 60 db Hearing Threshold Level (HTL).
- Amplification device(s) may be used to meet the above hearing requirement.

•	If amplification devices are used, they <i>must</i> be of the type that screens out loud
	sounds, i.e., gun shots, to prevent further hearing loss.
