## Training Rationale:

In 2000, there were approximately 25,000 cases of acute viral hepatitis reported nationwide, including 14,000 cases of hepatitis A (HAV) and 8,000 cases of hepatitis B (HBV). In addition, 1.25 million persons are chronically infected with HBV and 2.7 million are chronically infected with hepatitis C. [source: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)].

About one quarter of HIV-infected persons in the United States are infected with hepatitis C (HCV). Studies indicate that 80 – 90% of active or former substance users living with HIV are co-infected with HCV, and injection drug use continues to play a significant role in the transmission of blood-borne diseases, including HCV and HIV. Co-infection presents unique and challenging needs pertaining to care and treatment for providers and clients, which this training addresses.


