

Weed & Seed IDA Demonstration Project

 - DOJ / Community Capacity Development Office
 - DHHS / Office of Community Services
- Combine the resources of:
 - Weed and Seed sites
 - Assets for Independence grants
 - Other partners





What is an "IDA Demonstration"?







Principle questions...

- Can IDAs help W & S sites to meet homeownership goals and promote neighborhood restoration?
- Can geographically focused IDAs produce community development benefits
- Can W & S partnership strategies contribute to scale, efficiency and sustainability for IDAs
- Can technical assistance help W & S sites to secure AFI funding for IDA accounts





Assets for Independence (AFI)

- AFI is administered by the Office of Community Services (OCS), within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.
- IDA accountholders can save for one of three assets:
 - Acquiring a first home
 - Capitalizing a small business
 - Enrolling in postsecondary education or training
- Asset choice was limited to homeownership for the Weed & Seed IDA Demonstration Project





Assets for Independence (AFI)

 Grantees are required to commit a minimum of 1:1 non-federal match.

 Every dollar in savings deposited into an IDA by participants is matched Federal and nonfederal funds) by the AFI Project.
