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# LAST WEEK

**THREE SPENDING BILLS UNDER CONSIDERATION IN HOUSE --** The House of Representatives currently has three pieces of legislation under development and consideration concerning funding of agriculture programs and emergency activities.

**1. FY 2002 AGRICULTURE APPROPRIATIONS BILL -** On Wednesday, June 13, 2001, the full House Appropriations Committee (Chairman Young, FL) held a markup on Agriculture Appropriations for FY 2002.

**2. FY 2001 EMERGENCY SUPPLEMENTAL BILL** – On Thursday, June 14, 2001, the full House Appropriations Committee (Chairman Young, FL) held a markup on Supplemental Appropriations for FY 2001. The legislation contains a provision for \$22 million in Forest Service funding to assist with

recovery from ice storm damage in Arkansas and Oklahoma. No funding is reportedly included for NRCS emergency-related functions in the House mark.

3. FY 2001 EMERGENCY AID TO FARMERS – The House Agriculture Committee (Chairman Combest, TX) postponed a markup on draft legislation that would authorize emergency aid to farmers. The Committee markup has been rescheduled for 10:00 am, Wednesday, June 20, 2001. The legislation under consideration will be an authorization bill to make available 2001 crop year assistance to cover producers' current financial squeeze from continued declining crop market prices amid escalating energy costs. In a letter to the Committee, Office of Management and Budget Director, Mitchel E. Daniels, Jr. stated that he would recommend the President not sign a bill providing more than \$5.5 billion in additional assistance. He also urged that the Committee to utilize payment methods utilized last year in order to get assistance out to farmers in an expedited fashion.

## WETLANDS RESERVE AND WILDLIFE HABITAT INCENTIVES PROGRAM

On Wednesday, June 13, 2001, Leslie Deavers with the NRCS Wetlands and Watersheds Division, briefed Senate Agriculture Committee staff on the application and funding process for WRP and WHIP. Ms. Deavers provided sample program applications, conservation plans and data demonstrating program enrollment by state for each of the two programs. Committee staff asked numerous questions about how the programs functioned; eligibility requirements; contract requirements; and asked for several pieces of follow-up information including photos of completed projects.

**CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM AND EQIP IMPLEMENTATION** – On Thursday, June 14, 2001, Mark Berkland, NRCS Director of Conservation Operations,

Michelle Gidcumb also with Conservation Operations, and Farm Service Agency staff, briefed staff of the Senate Agriculture Committee on the application and funding process for CRP and EQIP. The Committee staff expressed interest in eligibility requirements, application forms, acceptance of contracts, and oversight of lands enrolled in both programs. Committee staff asked numerous questions about how the programs functioned; clarification of the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI); compatible uses of CRP lands; and requested for several pieces of follow-up information.
