LEGISLATION OF NOTE

The following Bills of significance to NRCS and conservation have been introduced:

Bill	Sponsor	Purpose
Cubin, WY	H.R. 5383	To provide emergency assistance to agricultural producers.

SENATE AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE HEARING - On September 17, Secretary Veneman testified before the Senate Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry Committee (Chairman, Harkin D- IA) to discuss progress regarding implementation of the 2002 Farm Bill, including conservation programs. The Secretary said that the changes in the conservation policy support in the 2002 Farm Bill the Administration’s commitment to a voluntary approach and provide producers with a comprehensive portfolio of conservation options including cost-share, incentive, land retirement, and easement programs. NRCS Chief, Bruce Knight accompanied the Secretary.

Several Members had questions regarding conservation programs. These included the concern regarding technical assistance funding for WRP and FPP, EQIP rulemaking, and the progress to establish the Grassland Reserve and Conservation Security Programs.

PENNSYLVANIA WATERSHED BRIEFING - On September 19, Deputy Undersecretary Mack Gray met with Rep. Greenwood (PA) concerning the progress of the Neshaminy Creek Watershed Protection project in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. Dr. Grey and NRCS Director of Watersheds and Wetlands, Lee Bensey, provided an update on the status of the NRCS small watershed program and a progress report on Neshaminy Creek.

WETLANDS PROTECTION HEARING - On September 19, the Committee on Government Reform, Subcommittee on Energy Policy, Natural Resources and Regulatory Affairs (Chairman Ose, CA), held a hearing concerning wetlands regulations through the Clean Water Act following the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County vs. Army Corps of Engineers (SWANCC) Decision by the US Supreme Court. The SWACC decision involved protecting isolated wetland areas not adjacent to navigable waters. Testimony by the Department of the Army, EPA, and the Department of Justice indicated a new rulemaking process in the future is needed based on the guidance provided in the SWANCC ruling.
