Overview

Established in 1995, the Coastal Program in South Carolina is one of a nationwide network of 22 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Coastal Program offices focused on protection, restoration, and enhancement of fish and wildlife habitat in the Nation's coastal areas.

The coastal plain of South Carolina is a biologically rich landscape that, until recent decades, had escaped the intense commercial and residential development typical of much of the U.S. Atlantic Coast. The Coastal Program in South Carolina works cooperatively



Priorities

Permanent landscape protection using perpetual conservation easements on private lands complemented with strategic feetitle acquisitions by Federal, State, and non-government conservation organizations is a priority. Habitat restoration, technical assistance and outreach projects are also a priority.
