

Endangered Species Day US Fish and Wildlife Service Activities in the Southeast Region

Alabama: Daphne, Alabama Field Office will be holding a school blitz May 16. They will be going to celebrate and talk about endangered species with several local schools in the area. Contact – Rob Tawes

And, Noxubee NWR will participate and are bringing a table top display about the endangered red-cockaded woodpecker and will help at the booth. The museum's scheduled "Creature Feature" programs will focus on endangered species for the day.
