The White Mountain National Forest Heritage Resource Program will conduct a Passport in Time (PIT) Project from October 6-10, 2008, with volunteers from near and far.

We are proud to announce another in our annual projects that focus on cleaning and recording historic cemeteries on the Forest and in neighboring communities. We partner with the Green Mountain National Forest in Vermont, and offer this volunteer opportunity each October (even years on the WMNF, odd years on the GMNF).



In addition to the cemetery work, which will include taking notes and photos to record grave stones, cleaning and straightening gravestones, and brush removal, we will visit the Strawbery Banke Excavations and Archaeology Laboratory in Portsmouth, NH, on Wednesday, October 8.

This year we are hoping to make our project more flexible and available to local volunteers. So if you can come for one or more days, or for the whole week, we hope to see you.

Each day we have room in our government vehicles for 8 volunteers. We will accept folks on a first come-first served basis. Children under 18 should be accompanied by an adult.

We will be outside most of the time, so dress accordingly. Layers are a good idea — you can adjust to changes in temperature. Since there will be a moderate amount of hiking and physical work, sturdy footware like hiking or work boots is a good idea. Waterproof boots are also recommended in New England at any time of year. A day pack to hold your rain gear, lunch, water, and items like hat, sunglasses, coat, gardening/work gloves, insect repellent, camera, etc., is also recommended.

We plan on leaving from the Pemigewasset Ranger Station, Holderness, NH, at 9 AM each morning and will return there around 4 PM. Arrangements can also be made to catch the vans at the Supervisor's Office in Laconia, NH, when they leave for Plymouth.
