Unified Command

RT&M (Readiness)

OPERATIONAL CONTROL of U.S. combat forces is assigned to the nation's Unified Combat Commands. The chain of command runs from the President to the Secretary of Defense to the Unified Commanders in Chief. Orders and other communications from the President or Secretary are transmitted through the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. A Unified Combatant Command is composed of forces from two or more services, has a broad and continuing mission and is normally organized on a geographical basis. The number of unified combatant commands is not fixed by law and may vary from time to time.





ASD(RA)

- Derived from America's early tradition of the colonial militia and the constitutional power of the State
- Responsive to both:
 - Federal government for the national security mission
 - Governor of the State for State missions
- Can be mobilized (Federalized) under federal law
 - Federal government provides >90% of funding targeted at national security mission
- Principle State missions
 - Disaster response
 - Support law enforcement activities as prescribed by State law


Interstate Compacts

- U.S. Constitution, Art 1, Sec 10, Cl 3
 - Requires Consent of Congress for Compacts
 - Legal Agreement Between Two or More States
 - May Be General or Specific in Nature
 - Expedites Interstate Utilization of Emergency Response Assets

- Currently 36 Combat Brigades
- Under Modularity redesign reducing to 34 Combat Brigades:
 - 8 Division Headquarters that will convert to the Modular design
 - 33 Combat Brigades (10 Armor, 23 Infantry) and 1 SBCT programmed
 - CS and CSS forces within the ARNG (57% of ARNG force) will continue reorganization IAW emerging Echelon Above Brigade force designs
- End Strength vs. Force Structure Allowance Today:
 - End Strength authorized at 350K
 - Force Structure Allowance programmed at 367K
 - Over-structured by 17,000 spaces (more spaces then faces)
- Trainee, Transient, Holding, and Student (TTHS) Account Initiative
 - Continuing to reduce over-structure
 - Ultimately will lower Force Structure Allowance to 342K
 - This creates a 8K space TTHS account
- 34% of the Total Army



- Provides 28% of the Army's Combat Support capability, and 21% of the Army's Combat Service Support capability
- Developing 10 Expeditionary Packages over the next five (5) years to provide constant, ready capability for contingency operations
- End Strength verse Force structure allowance
 - Army Reserve Authorized End Strength is 205,000
 - Force Structure Allowance programmed at 222K
 - Over-structured by 17,000 spaces (more spaces then faces)
- Trainee, Transient, Holding, and Student (TTHS) Account Initiative
 - Continuing to reduce over-structure
 - Ultimately will lower Force Structure Allowance to 184K
 - This creates a 20K space TTHS account
- 20% of the Total Army

- Provides 1 Division with Air Wing and Logistics Support
- Provides echelon above division support capability
- Formations identical in structure to Active forces
- Marine Corps Reserve Authorized End Strength is 39,600
- 18% of the Total USMC

Coast Guard Reserve

ASD(RA)

- Defense-related roles include port security, military outload protection
- AC units have assumed responsibility for most reserve training and employment – about 85% of USCG SELRES are assigned to AC units
- Secretary of Homeland Security can call up (14 USC 712)
 USCGR for domestic emergencies
- Coast Guard Reserve Authorized End Strength is 10,000 (8,500 Budgeted)
- 19% of Total Coast Guard (10,000 SELRES + 41,300AD)
