Unified Command

RT&M (Readiness)

OPERATIONAL CONTROL of U.S. combat forces is assigned to the nation's Unified Combat Commands. The chain of command runs from the President to the Secretary of Defense to the Unified Commanders in Chief. Orders and other communications from the President or Secretary are transmitted through the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. A Unified Combatant Command is composed of forces from two or more services, has a broad and continuing mission and is normally organized on a geographical basis. The number of unified combatant commands is not fixed by law and may vary from time to time.





ASD(RA) RT&M (Readiness)

- Derived from America's early tradition of the colonial militia and the constitutional power of the State
- Responsive to both:
 - Federal government for the national security mission
 - Governor of the State for State missions
- Can be mobilized (Federalized) under federal law
 - Federal government provides >90% of funding targeted at national security mission
- Principle State missions
 - Disaster response
 - Support law enforcement activities as prescribed by State law


Interstate Compacts

- U.S. Constitution, Art 1, Sec 10, Cl 3
 - Requires Consent of Congress for Compacts
 - Legal Agreement Between Two or More States
 - May Be General or Specific in Nature
 - Expedites Interstate Utilization of Emergency Response Assets

- Currently 36 Combat Brigades
- Under Modularity redesign reducing to 34 Combat Brigades:
 - 8 Division Headquarters that will convert to the UEx design
 - 33 Combat Brigades (10 Armor, 23 Infantry) and 1 SBCT programmed
 - CS and CSS forces within the ARNG (47% of ARNG force) will continue reorganization IAW emerging Echelon Above Brigade force designs
- End Strength vs. FSA Today:
 - End Strength fixed at 350K
 - FSA fixed at 388K
 - 1.1 to 1 FSA to End Strength ratio
- FY 2004 Force Structure Authorization: 376K
 - FSA under cap due to early ADRS inactivations & delayed activations
 - FSA building to cap through completion of ADRS Phase II in FY 07
 - TAA 07-11 FSA 342K
- 33% of the Total Army

- AC units have assumed responsibility for reservist training and employment
- Secretary of Homeland Security can call up (Title 14)
 USCGR for domestic emergencies
- Coast Guard Reserve End Strength is 9,000
- 19% of Total Coast Guard
