
PROVINCE LANDS VISITOR CENTER

Just two miles from the tip of the Cape, this center features an observation deck with 360-degree views; a small exhibit area; showings of park orientation films on the hour (9-4); staff on duty to assist with trip planning; and sales of books, maps, puzzles, games and other interpretive items. Restrooms are available in the parking area. The Province Lands Bicycle Trail and Race Point Beach are nearby.

September 3 - Kayaking and Seining in Pleasant Bay - What lies beneath the waters of this bay - the jewel of Cape Cod? Bring your own kayak and lifejacket to this program. We will be getting in the water to explore with seine nets, so be prepared to get wet.

September 10 - Great Island Hike - Traverse salt marshes, woodlands, dunes, and the beaches along Cape Cod Bay. Take in the scenic vistas of Wellfleet Harbor, and uncover the rich history associated with this early whaling outpost.

September 17 - Freshbrook Village: Gone But Not Forgotten

- Hike along some of the trails and jeep roads of the Marconi area to explore history, activities, and events of this early Wellfleet village and the surrounding area.

September 24 - Griffin Island Hike - Hike around the edge of Griffin Island in Wellfleet and out to the tall bluffs overlooking Cape Cod Bay.



October 1 - Common Lands to Cows - 2½ hours, 2 miles. At Fort Hill, French Explorer Samuel de Champlain met with, and created some of the earliest records of, native people in the northeast. Pilgrims later settled and farmed there. After a short hike, we will caravan to the Cove Burying Ground and visit the graves of three Mayflower passengers.

October 8 - Great Island Hike - Traverse salt marshes, woodlands, dunes, and the beaches along Cape Cod Bay. Take in the scenic vistas of Wellfleet Harbor, and uncover the rich history associated with this early whaling outpost.

From the autumnal tints that cast a luminous glow over the seashore landscape, to unique community events that capture the spirit of local heritage, fall on the Outer Cape is an experience not to be missed! Community celebrations and ranger-guided outdoor activities and indoor talks illustrate how we all are inextricably linked on this narrow thread of land we call the Outer Cape.

Saturday, September 6: Community Event, Provincetown Swim for Life and Great Schooner Regatta: Accompanied by a flotilla of kayaks and canoes, hundreds of swimmers plunge into the water off of Long Point and splash their way into Provincetown Harbor. Spectators can welcome the swimmers on the beach at 11:30 AM, and then gather on MacMillan Wharf to watch the majestic parade of sail that precedes the sailboat race at noon. The Province Lands talk will include information on projects in Provincetown, and the Salt Pond program will include a discussion on strategies the seashore is employing to reach out to different audiences. Wednesday, October 8 - Seashore Walk - What Condition is Your Site In? - 10:30 AM, 1½ hours, short walk. Free. As custodians of many of the nation's finest archeological resources, the National Park Service has developed parameters by which to assess site condition. Join park archeologist Frederica Dimmick on a short walk to a wooded plateau area close to Nauset Marsh. Prehistoric sites were recorded here during the seashore's archeological survey of the 1980s. Explore the traditions and heritage of Cape Cod's first residents.

October 11: Seashore Beach Campfire Program, Wampanoag Legends - 6 PM, 1 hour. Free. Learn about Wampanoag culture as you enjoy its traditions by the warm glow of a fire on the beach. Educators and youth from local Native American communities will share the story of Moshop, the ancient giant who created Cape Cod, and others. Meet at Ballston Beach, at the end of South Pamet Road, Truro. Sponsored by Friends of the Cape Cod National Seashore.



October 12: Seashore Talk, The Legacy of Corn Hill - 10 am, 1 hour. Free. In 1620 the Mayflower passengers came ashore and explored the hills of Truro.
