A new resource is available for those confused about how military training and education converts to college credit.


"A Transfer Guide: Understanding Your Military Transcript and ACE Credit Recommendations" provides simple, straightforward guidance on understanding military credit recommendations and transcripts and includes definitions of common terms, answers to frequently asked questions and a transfer credit checklist.

The 51-page guide from the American Council on Education (ACE) is available to assist Service members and veterans in understanding how they are potentially eligible to earn academic credit for their military training and occupational experiences.

The guide outlines the factors that affect transfer of military credit, such as institutional policy, alignment with appropriate courses, procedures, requirements and transfer application deadlines. transfer policies/procedures. They also are encouraged to start the transcript review process early.

"Credit earned through military training and experience can provide Service members and veterans with an important jump-start when pursuing higher education," said ACE President Molly Corbett Broad. "Building on ACE's long history of serving as a bridge between the

armed services and higher education, this guide aims to ease the transition from soldier to student."

It is the goal of ACE to implement programs and services to reduce the many obstacles Service members and veterans face as they begin or resume postsecondary education.

"We often hear from Service members who are frustrated to find that the type and amount of credit

awarded for their demonstrated competencies falls short of their expectations," said Jim Selbe, ACE assistant vice president for lifelong learning and 20-year Marine Corps veteran. "We are hopeful this guide will provide information to these men and women who serve our nation so they receive credit, when appropriate, for their military education and training."

The revolutionary electronic-paper display provides a sharp, high-resolution screen (8-10 inches) that looks and reads like real paper. Users flip through a book simply by tapping the edges of the page.

They're simple to use. Some of the digital readers are wireless

requiring no computer, cables or syncing – and they enable you to shop directly from the online bookstore, whether at the beach, airport or home. The book is auto-delivered wirelessly to your device in less than one minute.

The digital readers, with their new sleek, thin design (lighter and thinner than a typical paperback) weigh in at 10 ounces. The portable size make them the perfect travel companion.

They're as thin as 0.36 inches and can store hundreds of books, chosen from over 250,000 different

and \$3.49 per month, and blogs for \$0.99-\$1.99 per month.

Also, users can send documents to a conversion service that will return the specific-formatted file to the device for 10 cents – or to a

personal e-mail account for free.

The long battery life allows you to read for a week or two before recharging and only takes two hours to fully recharge. Special features available include: interactive touch screen display and built-in light; virtual keyboard; page turning with the slide of a finger; bookmarks; highlighted text with a stylus pen; a search feature; adjustable font size (five different sizes); the text-to-speech option allowing you to hear the text read out loud through headphones/ear piece; Wi-Fi; Bluetooth; 3G cell connection; dictionary; fast screen refresh; edit/delete/ export your notes; clip key passages; and even

remembers for you by opening to the last page you read.

Digital readers range in cost from \$300-\$900.



titles. New releases are around \$10; some classics sell for around \$1.99.

Many titles, often classics now in the public domain, are offered for free. The first chapters of many books are offered as a free sample. Subscriptions to newspapers cost between \$5.99 and \$14.99 per month, magazines between \$1.25



Distance Learning News

A snapshot of DETC in 2008

Last year, the Distance Education and Training Council (DETC) had 110 accredited institutions with 2.3 million students enrolled.

More than 50 percent of the 270,000 new students at DETC postsecondary institutions were male, and the average age of students was 37. More than 70 percent of students were employed at the time of enrollment, and the average graduation rate in 2008 was 73 percent. The most popular non-degree DETC programs were real estate, photography, paralegal, HVAC technician and medical programs.

The number of new students

at DETC degree institutions was 240,000, with the average age of students being 37. More than 50 percent were male. Ninety percent were employed at the time of enrollment, and the average degree program graduation rate for 2008 was 57 percent. Some of the most popular degree programs were business administration, health care administration, criminal justice, paralegal and computer science.

Some of the trends seen in DETC-member institutions include:

- * Migration to online learning with fixed program dates
- * More career-related degrees at the associate degree level

- * An increase in Net 2.0 features such as Webcams, i-Pods, blogs, forums, Facebook, etc.
- * More use of open-source learning software, including Moodle.

Michael Lambert, DETC executive director, attributed the increase in online enrollments to:

- Convenience
- Job layoffs or fear of layoffs
- $\ Employer \ endorsement \ of \ online \\ learning$
- Public acceptance of online learning
- Internet availability in homes and more faculty who embrace online learning as being as effective as faceto-face.


DANTES Testing Programs

SAT forms are due June 30, 2009

Test Control Officers are reminded that June 30, 2009, is the last day to administer the current year Scholastic Aptitude Test.

SAT exams administered after this date will not be scored, so potential examinees need to be informed of this deadline.

In lieu of the SAT, use the ACT from July through September. DANTES test sites may continue to use the current SAT exam Form 59 until the June 30 cutoff date. Return all SAT Form 59 exams immediately after June 30. The SAT for use 2009-2010 may be ordered at the same time, but it will not be shipped until all of the test center's old SAT test booklets are received at the testing agency.



The new SAT will be shipped in September 2009 and scoring begins Oct. 1. The 2009-2010 DANTES/SAT Examiner Manual will provide instructions for the SAT Exam. Send questions about the SAT to <code>exams@navy.mil</code>.

Civilians get approval for FAA exams

Recently, the Service Bureau Education Chiefs authorized military dependents, civil servants working on bases and retirees to take Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) exams at activated DANTES/FAA Test Sites.

This new authorization allows these groups to access FAA exams at no cost to them. Commercial testing locations require payments that could be extremely costly.

The USS Ronald Reagan (CVN 76) hosted a college education fair onboard ship last month so Sailors could explore the educational opportunities available to them.




I am personally excited to see the latest innovations in education
