

Mt. Adams District Welcomes New Ranger



A wildlife biologist from Colorado has been named as the new Mt. Adams District Ranger on the Gifford Pinchot National Forest. Nancy Ryke, Forest wildlife biologist on the Pike/San Isabel/National Forests and Cimarron and Comanche National Grasslands in Pueblo, Colo., took over managing the 367,000 acre District in the southern one-third of the Forest, on Oct. 19.

Ryke has worked on three ranger districts and at two national forest headquarters in Colorado and Montana. She has a strong resource background and breadth of experience working on natural resource issues related to forest and rangeland health, endangered species and recreation management. She has served in temporary assignments as acting district ranger and as the regional Threatened, Endangered and Sensitive Species program manager in the Rocky Mountain Region of the Forest Service.

"I am thrilled about moving to this beautiful part of Washington," Ryke said. "One of my first priorities is to learn more about the area by working with the local communities and employees of the Gifford Pinchot National Forest."

Forest Supervisor Approves \$1.9 Million in Forest Projects

Maintaining Forest roads, paving the parking lot at the Flattop Sno-Park, improving fish passages, and enhancements at Forlorn Lakes, are among the \$1.9 million in <u>Resource Advisory Committee</u> <u>projects</u> approved by Forest Supervisor Claire Lavendel recently. These funds are approved for Forest projects under the <u>County</u> <u>Payments law</u>. The projects are under a revised program that requires a portion of federal payments to counties be spent on improving national forest lands.

Pick Up the Pinchot Completes 5th Successful Year



More than 50 volunteers picked up a ton of garbage near Sunset Campground during the Gifford Pinchot National Forest's fifth annual Pick Up the Pinchot (P.U.P.) clean-up day on Saturday, September, 20 as part of National Public Lands Day. A clean-up effort held in the Cowlitz Valley the same day picked up almost another ton of litter along Skate Creek Road. Volunteers worked from 9 a.m. until noon on the roads out of Sunset Campground on the southwest corner of the Forest. They picked up litter as diverse as a battered camper shell, fishing tackle, bottles, cups, diapers, ammo shells, and other assorted

trash. Volunteers included Boy and Girl Scout troops, the C.A.S.E.E. center (Center for Agriculture, Science and Environmental Education) in Brush Prairie, and the Chinook Trail Association along with Forest Service employees.
