

Forest Announces Changes to Mount St. Helens NVM Visitor Services

To meet the goal of delivering visitor services across the Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument, the Gifford Pinchot National Forest announced recently it is restructuring its visitor operations, including the retirement of the Coldwater Ridge Visitor Center (photo right) on November 5, 2007. Additionally, the transfer of Mount St. Helens Visitor Center at Silver Lake from the US Forest Service to the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission culminates a more than six-year partnership between the two agencies. "We continue our efforts to partner with outside organizations and groups to offer rewarding experiences to the visitor who wants



to view the crater from inside Johnston Ridge Observatory, to the climber who ascends the South Crater Rim, and the researcher studying a continuously erupting volcano," said Claire Lavendel, Forest Supervisor. Four other visitor centers enhance visitor experiences on State Route 504, including Johnston Ridge Observatory, just five miles from the crater. Johnston Ridge is open from May through October, providing visitors remarkable views of the crater and the ongoing eruption. "Offering Monument-wide visitor services for recreation, meeting legislated Monument mission work such as encouraging scientific research, and focusing on health and safety of the public and Forest employees are my top priorities," said Tom Mulder Mount St. Helens Monument Manager.

Winter Storm Damage Hampers Visitor Access to the Forest



As spring arrives in the Pacific Northwest, the Gifford Pinchot National Forest is still feeling the effects of a harsh winter. Last November's flood damage and the subsequent windstorm on December 14-15, will affect Forest visitor's ability to access some popular sites this year. As upcoming spring and summer weather brings visitors to the Forest, officials are emphasizing that road and trail damage and repairs will affect some travel routes. Visitors should exercise additional caution this year when venturing out on roads and trails. The hardest hit areas on the Forest were the Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument and adjoining Forest area, and the Cowlitz Ranger District bordering the south side of Mount Rainier National

Park. The Forest officials estimate that more than \$17 million in damage to roads, trails, and campgrounds occurred during the fall and winter. Before traveling to the Forest in 2007, visitors should check the Forest website (www.fs.fed.us/gpnf/news/2006-storm/index.shtml) or contact a local Forest Service office. Several key Forest Roads were damaged and will result in limited access until they can be repaired. These include Forest Road 23 about a mile north of the junction with Forest Road 90 (see photo left), Forest Roads 83 and 81 on the South side of Mount St. Helens and Forest Road 47 north of Randle, Wash. Mount St. Helens Visitor Centers Change to Summer Hours

On Thursday, May 17, the Johnston Ridge Observatory and the Coldwater Ridge Visitor Center will change to extended hours of operation for the summer season. Both centers will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. Friday, May 18, will be a free day at the Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument in remembrance of the 27th anniversary of the 1980 eruption. The Mount St. Helens Visitor Center at Silver Lake, operated by Washington State Parks, will shift to summer hours, and will be open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., starting Tuesday, May 1.

Pedal the Pinchot Marks Tenth Anniversary

The Rotary Club of Woodland, in partnership with the Gifford Pinchot National Forest, are sponsoring the tenth "Pedal the Pinchot" bicycle ride to raise money for Forest and community projects. Four separate rides near Mount St. Helens -- two for road bikes and two for mountain bikes -- are scheduled between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Saturday, July 28. All rides begin and end at Swift Forest Camp, 17 miles east of Cougar, Wash.
