Hemlock Dam Project Revived



The Mount Adams District is seeking your comments, ideas, and suggestions concerning fish passage and aquatic habitat restoration at Hemlock Dam near Stabler, Wash. This project has been inactive for two years. Now, with a new District Ranger and a new interdisciplinary team, we are ready to resume work on an environmental impact statement (EIS). A draft EIS will be available this September followed by a 45-day comment period. We expect the final EIS to be issued in February, 2005. A decision will be made in

March, 2005. If you participated in the public meetings in 2001 or sent us comments in response to a previous scoping letter, dated May 16, 2001, there is no need to send comments again or repeat your concerns and suggestions. Changes to Northwest Forest Pass Program Include Fewer Sites

Beginning May 1, the Gifford Pinchot National Forest reduced the number of sites that require a Northwest Forest Pass and now offer a new, multi-agency recreation pass.

The number of sites on the Forest was reduced from 112 to 54. Fees will be charged only in areas where higher levels of recreation development or services are provided. Rustic camping will no longer be included under a day pass or annual pass. The changes represent a significant reduction from last year in the number of recreation sites where a day-use fee is charged. National forests in the Pacific Northwest will sell the new Washington and Oregon

Recreation Pass. Seven state and federal agencies in Washington and Oregon are now collectively offering a convenient day-use recreation pass which is honored at a majority of agency sites.

Your recreation fees continue to make a difference. Revenues from the passes will continue to go to locations based on use. Eighty percent of the fees are put back into direct services users say they want. On the Gifford Pinchot National Forest last year, recreation fee dollars helped pay for more than \$1.1 million worth of services and improvements.

Gifford Pinchot Receives National Fisheries Award

The Gifford Pinchot National Forest, along with a number of local partners, recently received national recognition for its efforts in stream restoration with the *2004 Riparian Challenge Award* at a conference in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Members of the partnership team were honored for their outstanding efforts to protect and enhance fish habitat. Forest Supervisor Claire Lavendel and project coordinator Brian Bair were on hand to receive this award presented by the American Fisheries Society. The award was given for the Mining Reach Riparian and Stream Channel Restoration Project located in the Wind River watershed, a Southwestern Washington tributary which enters the Columbia River near Carson, Wash.

Cabin Reservations Now Available Through ReserveUSA



Starting this spring, the <u>Peterson Prairie</u> and <u>Government Mineral Springs</u> Guard Stations on the Mt. Adams Ranger District can now be reserved through the national reservation system <u>www.reserveUSA.com</u> or by calling the reservation center at 1-877-444-6777 (toll free).

These two historic cabins are available for rent year-round with a stay limit of seven consecutive days. The cost of rental for the cabins is \$50 per night for Peterson Prairie and \$65 per night for Government Mineral Springs. There is a two-night minimum over the weekends (Fri-Sat). There is also a \$9 fee per reservation.

Smokey Marks 60 Years of Preventing Human-Caused Fires

Upcoming Events:

Summer Hours at Mount St. Helens Visitor Centers: On May 6 the Coldwater Ridge Visitor Center extended hours of operation for the summer season. Johnston Ridge Observatory opened on May 7 for the summer. Both centers are open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. Summer schedules will continue until late October.

Free Days: The Forest Service will waive the need for the Northwest Forest Pass on National Trails Day, June 5 and National Public Lands Day, September 18. Simply visiting a national forest does not require a pass. Access to the national forests is free, and there are many free recreation sites. May 18th will be a free day at the Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument in remembrance of the 1980 eruption.
