These requests are contained in acts enacted by the Legislature or bills passed which have yet to be approved by the Governor. These acts or bills include specific requests for submission of information back to the Legislature excluding annual reports. These requests are also contained in resolutions adopted by the Senate (SR) or House of Representatives (HR) or by the whole legislature (SCR or HCR). Dates by which reports and other responses are expected are indicated when specifically set by the Legislature. The names of the agencies involved in the conduct of a study or the execution of a request are underscored.

For the reader's convenience these legislative requests are also grouped together by agencies (see agency index); as well as by subject matter (see subject index).

CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS, NEW TREATMENT OR SERVICE PROGRAMS FOR EMOTIONALLY DISTURBED. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to expend a minimum of ten per cent of the appropriations out of the general revenue, the child and adolescent mental health special fund, and the behavioral health administration special fund used for any new treatment or service programs to be used to conduct process and outcome evaluations of these programs.

Further requires the Department to submit reports of these process and outcome evaluations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2002, and to the Auditor, at any time, upon request of the Auditor.

Requires the <u>Auditor</u> to monitor the conduct of these process and outcome evaluations and report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature or the Department, or both, whenever or as deemed necessary.

HAWAII STATE HOSPITAL SERVICES, EVALUATION OF NEW INITIATIVES OR PROGRAMS. Requires money to be set aside for process and outcome evaluations of new initiatives or programs in HTH 420 and HTH 430 to be conducted by <u>any agency or agencies external to the Department of Health</u> and be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

NET METERING PROGRAM, FEASIBILITY STUDY ON. Requires the <u>Public Utilities Commission</u> to conduct a study on the feasibility of implementing a net metering program in this State and the <u>Department of Education</u> to assist the Commission in its study by sharing its information on net metering.

Further requires the Commission to submit an interim report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001 and a final report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2002.

INFORMATION PROCESSING SERVICES PROGRAM, CONSULTANT WHO CAUSED A REDUCTION IN REVENUES FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Accounting and General Services</u> to pursue action against the consultant who made an over-collection of federal reimbursements during fiscal years 1996-1997 and 1997-1998, and hold the consultant accountable for the resulting loss.

Further requires the Department to report on the action taken and the results to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III, SECTION 8.1

CHILD PROTECTIVE ACT, GUARDIANS AD LITEM AND COUNSEL FOR INDIGENT PARTIES. Requires the <u>Judiciary</u> to provide a report on the effectiveness and efficiency of this program to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III, SECTION 8.3

JUDICIARY PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT, ON-LINE. Requires the <u>Judiciary</u> to provide a report on implementation and cost-benefit analysis to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

SB 2061, SD1, HD2

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES, GENDER BASED PAY INEQUITIES. Establishes the four-year <u>pay equity task force</u> consisting of <u>one representative from each of the unions serving as exclusive representative of civil service</u> workers, the <u>Director of Human Resources Development</u> and <u>four other representatives of public employers</u>, a <u>representative of the Hawaii Commission on the Status of Women</u>, and <u>three other individuals selected by the Governor representing the public</u>.

Requires the task force to review the 1995 Study of Wage Equity in Public Employee Bargaining Units 1 and 10, and the 1987 study entitled, "A Job Evaluation Study of Selected Classes of the State and Counties of Hawaii", and reports submitted by the Director of Human Resources Development.

Also requires the task force to review the material and, as appropriate, develop recommendations to the Legislature for funds and specific actions needed to correct any gender based pay inequities discovered and provide an annual report to the Legislature of its progress.

LONG-TERM CARE, COST STUDY OF A STATE-SPONSORED UNIVERSAL PROGRAM OF. Requires the <u>Joint Legislative Committee on Long-Term Care</u> to contract for an actuarial study to determine the cost of establishing a state-sponsored program of long-term care that offers comprehensive, protective coverage to the largest numbers of people as reasonably possible through a funding approach that considers factors of expense, ease of administration, and actuarial soundness. Requires the <u>consultants</u> to submit a report of findings and recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature no later than November 21, 2001.

Also requires the Joint Legislative Committee to draft legislation for introduction in the Regular Session of 2002.

SB 2074, SD2, HD2, CD1

FEMALE OFFENDERS, NEEDS OF. Establishes a <u>task force on parity for female offenders</u> within the Department of Public Safety to review all programs currently offered to female adult and juvenile offenders in the custody of the Department, identify inadequacies with the current system, and develop a plan to increase interagency cooperation to address the needs unique to female offenders.

Requires the task force to include:

- (1) The <u>Director of Public Safety or a designated representative</u>;
- (2) The Executive Director of the Office of Youth Services or a designated representative;
- (3) Three female ex-offenders to be appointed by the Director of Public Safety; and
- (4) Members from the criminal justice community, community agencies experienced with the female offender and ex-offender populations and their needs, and the business community to be appointed by the Director of Public Safety.

Requires the task force to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PUBLIC LAND TRUST INVENTORY AND INFORMATION SYSTEM, PROGRESS REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Auditor</u> to initiate and coordinate all efforts to establish a public land trust information system and to identify all of the lands which are to be included in the public land trust inventory.

Further requires <u>all state and county agencies</u> to assist the Auditor in facilitating the establishment of the public land trust information system and to comply with any and all requests that the Auditor may make for any information and services pertinent to the completion of the information system.

Further requires the Auditor to submit a progress report that outlines what needs to be done to complete the public lands trust inventory and the public land trust information system. Requires the report to include any legislation the Auditor deems necessary to facilitate the inventories and systems expeditious completion and support to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2001 and 2002.

FIREARMS, REMOVAL FROM THOSE NO LONGER QUALIFIED TO OWN. Establishes the <u>violent firearm</u> <u>crime coalition</u> within the <u>Department of the Attorney General</u> to clarify and articulate the best process to seize firearms from those individuals who are no longer qualified to own or possess firearms for mental health reasons, and who do not voluntarily relinquish firearms or transfer ownership of firearms.

Requires the coalition to determine the best process to keep firearms from individuals who are no longer qualified to own or possess firearms for mental health reasons.

Further requires the Department in collaboration with the coalition to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2001 and 2002.

SB 2254, SD1, HD2, CD1

HEALTH CARE INFORMATION, ISSUES ON THE PRIVACY OF. Establishes the <u>medical privacy task force</u> within the Office of Information Practices. The task force shall advise and assist the Office in analyzing health care information issues for the purpose of drafting rules to implement the requirements of Chapter 323C, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Requires the members of the task force to be chosen by the <u>Director of the Office of Information Practices</u> and the task force to consist of at least <u>one representative from health care consumer organizations</u>, <u>provider</u>

<u>organizations</u>, <u>hospitals</u>, <u>individual and group medical practitioners</u>, <u>health insurance plans</u>, <u>health care data organizations</u>, <u>medical researchers</u>, <u>employers</u>, <u>pharmaceutical companies</u>, the <u>Department of Health</u>, and the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs.

Further requires the task force to submit a report of findings and recommendations, including recommended legislation, concerning health care issues that need statutory revision to Chapter 323C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

KAUAI COFFEE COMPANY INC., SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> to evaluate the Kauai Coffee Company Inc.'s application for financing through special purpose revenue bonds for a processing plant for freeze dried coffee and report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no less than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

SB 2420, SD2, HD2, CD1

NEW ECONOMY TECHNOLOGY SCHOLAR PILOT PROGRAM, ESTABLISHMENT OF. Establishes the new economy technology scholarship pilot program within the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u>. Requires the Department to publish a report by September 1, 2001, and every year thereafter and submit it to the Governor and Legislature. Act to be repealed on June 30, 2005.

SB 2475, SD1, HD3, CD1

GENDER EQUITY IN SPORTS, DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION COMPLIANCE TO. Establishes an <u>advisory commission on gender equity in sports</u> within the Department of Education. Requires the commission to determine if any school does not exhibit substantial progress toward compliance with Public Law 92-318, Title IX, of the federal Education Amendments of 1972, and section 302A-1001 and may make recommendations to the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Education, and the Legislature.

Requires the <u>Superintendent</u> to submit a report of compliance with Title IX, including a compliance plan with timelines for every public high school, and analysis and assessment of current activities with respect to Title IX compliance, and itemized expenditures for athletics to the Legislature and the advisory commission of gender equity by December 31, 2000.

SB 2486, SD2, HD2, CD1

CIGARETTE STAMP TAX SYSTEM, ESTABLISHMENT OF. Requires the <u>Director of Taxation</u> to submit findings and recommendations on the effectiveness of this Act in reducing the loss of cigarette tax revenue to the State from illegal sales of untaxed cigarettes to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the Regular Session of 2006.

Also allows the Director to submit an interim report on any findings relating to the effectiveness of this Act to the Legislature before 2006.

Requires the <u>Attorney General</u> to report on its activities relating to this Act to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2002 and 2003.

SB 2490, SD2, HD1, CD1

ADULT RESIDENTIAL CARE HOMES AND FACILITIES, STUDY ON REORGANIZING. Requires the <u>Subcommittee on Residential Care of the Joint Legislative Committee on Long-Term Care</u> to conduct a study on reorganizing all adult residential care homes and facilities into a new adult residential care facilities category for regulatory purposes. Requires the study to either:

- (1) Recommend enactment of a new adult residential care facilities model with two facility categories and seven designated entities; or
- (2) Recommend an alternative model with proposed legislation to reduce the fragmentation, increase cost-effectiveness, and improve operational effectiveness of residential care services.

Encourages the Subcommittee to solicit the input of organizations concerned with long-term care and providers of long-term care, including facilities, homes, and hospitals.

Requires the Subcommittee to report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

HAWAII GOLD CACAO TREE, INC., HAWAII, SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS FOR. Requires the Department of Budget and Finance to process applications for special purpose revenue bonds for assisting Hawaii Gold Cacao Tree, Inc., to finance the establishment of facilities in the county of Hawaii to process cacao beans and to manufacture and produce cacao and chocolate products and to report on any progress made with respect to the issuance of bonds to the Legislature twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2001 and 2002.

SB 2838, SD1, HD1, CD1

HAWAII STATE PUBLIC LIBRARY SYSTEM, REPORT ON THE OPERATIONS OF THE PORTAL AND ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO. Establishes the <u>Access Hawaii Committee</u> within the Office of the Governor, on a special and temporary basis until June 30, 2003. Requires that the Committee to consist of:

- (1) The Governor's special advisor for technology development:
- (2) The <u>Administrator of the Information and Communication Services Division</u> in the Department of Accounting and General Services;
- (3) The Administrator of the State Procurement Office;
- (4) The Director of the Office of Information Practices;
- (5) The <u>Directors of not more than three government agencies</u> using or planning to use the services of the portal manager; and
- (6) The Chief Information Officers of the four counties.

Requires the committee to submit an annual report on the operations of the portal and assistance provided to the Hawaii State Public Library System to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each Regular Session.

PART V, SECTION 119

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE POSITIONS IDENTIFIED FOR ABOLISHMENT AND VACATED, REPORT ON. Requires the head of each affected state department who provided a special retirement incentive benefit to transmit a report of every position identified for abolishment and vacated under this Part to the <u>Directors of Finance and Human Resources Development</u> who shall abolish these positions from the appropriate budget and personnel files. Requires the <u>Governor</u> to report this information to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each Regular Session beginning with 2001.

PART V, SECTION 120

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE ABOLISHED POSITIONS AND NEW WORKFORCE STRUCTURE, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Department of Human Resources Development</u> to report to the Legislature on any restructuring or reengineering activities initiated as a consequence of this Part within the various departments of the State Executive Branch no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each Regular Session beginning with 2001.

Further requires the report to include but not be limited to a description of the abolished positions and how the new workforce structure will more efficiently serve the needs of the agency's clients and appropriate criteria by which to measure the new workforce structure's effectiveness.

PART V, SECTION 123

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE ABOLISHED POSITIONS AND NEW WORKFORCE STRUCTURE, STUDY ON. Requires the <u>Auditor</u> to conduct a study on the effects on State Government caused by this Part and to submit a report to the Legislature and the Governor no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2004.

Requires this Part to be repealed on June 30, 2003.

SB 2905, HD2

EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING FUND, AUDIT OF. Requires the <u>Auditor</u> to conduct an audit of the Employment and Training Fund and report the findings and recommendations at least twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

(SSCR 2120, 2483, HSCR 1081-00, 1387-00)

SB 3043, SD2, HD1, CD1

INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR DAMAGE TO REAL PROPERTY, COST OF PROVIDING. Requires the <u>Insurance Division</u> to prepare a study of the feasibility and cost effectiveness of providing insurance coverage for damage to real property suffered by the State as a result of fire, flood, or hurricane, and all other insurance coverage that the Insurance Commissioner deems appropriate through a captive insurance facility.

Requires the <u>Insurance Commissioner</u> to submit findings and recommendations including any proposed legislation to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

SB 3123, SD2, HD2, CD1

BRIDGE TO HOPE PROGRAM, EXPENDITURE REPORT ON. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to submit a report on the expenditure of funds for the bridge-to-hope program to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

SB 3129, HD2

HAWAIIAN HEALING PRACTICES BY HAWAIIAN HEALERS, CERTIFICATION OF. Requires <u>Papa Ola Lokahi</u> to submit a final report and recommended legislation to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the Regular Session of 2002.

(SSCR 2577, HSCR 942-00, 1276-00)

HB 1759, HD2, SD2, CD1

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT, PHOTO SPEED IMAGING DETECTOR AND PHOTO RED LIGHT IMAGING SYSTEMS DEMONSTRATION PROJECT FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u>, in consultation with the county police, to submit an interim report that presents preliminary findings about the effectiveness of the demonstration project and may include any proposed legislation necessary to facilitate mailed traffic citations, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

Further requires the Department, in consultation with the county police, to submit the final report which includes any proposed implementing legislation as may be necessary to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2002.

(HSCR 30-00, 858-00, SSCR 2986, 3199, CCR 151)

HB 1874, HD1, SD2, CD1

EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM, REVIEW FOR RESTRUCTURING AND REALLOCATION. Establishes an interagency educational accountability working group within the Department of Education who shall:

- (1) Review all pertinent statutes, agency rules, policies, procedures, and practices to identify those which are impeding educational system restructuring and reallocation and effective use of educational resources:
- (2) Based on the review required in paragraph (1), enumerate and report to the Board of Education, Governor, and Legislature any statutes, rules, policies, procedures, and practices identified as needing suspension to allow the Department to restructure and reallocate its resources to support student achievement; and
- (3) Submit an annual report to the Legislature during the Regular Sessions of 2001 and 2002 regarding the progress of the working group and any legislative actions necessary to support the reorganization, reallocation, and effective use of educational resources.

Requires the interagency working group to be composed of:

- (1) The Governor or the Governor's designee;
- (2) The Chair of the Board of Education or the Chair's designee;
- (3) The Director of Accounting and General Services or the Director's designee;
- (4) The Attorney General or the Attorney General's designee;
- (5) The <u>Director of Budget and Finance or the Director's designee;</u>
- (6) The Superintendent of Education or the Superintendent's designee:
- (7) The Director of Health or the Director's designee;
- (8) The <u>Director of Human Resources Development or the Director's designee</u>;
- (9) The <u>Director of Labor and Industrial Relations or the Director's designee</u>; and

(10) One representative each from the Hawaii State Teachers' Association, the Hawaii Government Employees' Association, the United Public Workers Local 646, and the Hawaii State Parents, Teachers and Students Association.

Further requires the working group to submit a status report to the Legislature which includes a summary of its activities regarding the review of agency functions and identification of statutes, rules, policies, procedures, and practices recommended for suspension no later than sixty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001, and to submit a final report to the Legislature that includes a summary of the activities undertaken by the Department of Education in response to the suspensions no later than sixty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2002.

OPERATING A VEHICLE WHILE USING INTOXICANTS, AMENDING LAWS RELATING TO. Requires the <u>Legislative Reference Bureau</u> to prepare proposed conforming legislation as necessary to conform and consolidate the varying statutory provisions of Parts I, II, and III of this Act and transmit proposed legislation to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

(HSCR 70-00, 830-00, SSCR 2988, 3347, CCR 25)

HB 1900, HD1, SD1, CD1

PART III (1), SECTION 4

CONVENTION CENTER OPERATIONAL SHORTFALLS, IMPLEMENTATION OF ACTION PLAN ON. Requires the <u>Convention Center Authority</u> to submit a report on the implementation of the action plan to minimize the operational shortfalls of the Hawaii Convention Center and the resulting deficits in the Convention Center Operations Special Fund.

Requires the report to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (9), SECTION 17.1

STD/AIDS PREVENTION PROVIDERS, FUNDING FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to submit a report on all expenditures to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (13), SECTION 21.1

HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION, FOLLOW-UP STUDY ON. Requires the <u>Legislative Auditor</u> to conduct a follow-up study on the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation. Requires that the study include but not be limited to an analysis of information systems operation, procurement practices, cash collections, the maximization of accounts receivables, and the effect of Act 229, Session Laws of Hawaii 1998, on personnel management.

Requires the report to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (14), SECTION 21.2

CRITICAL ACCESS HOSPITALS WITHIN THE PUBLIC HOSPITAL SYSTEM, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Hawaii Health Systems Corporation</u> to submit a report concerning all critical access hospitals within the public hospital system. Requires the report to include:

- (1) An expenditure report per hospital detailing the cost of critical access hospital certification, including, but not limited to, capital improvements projects, staffing needs, and state matching funds for Medicaid;
- (2) An analysis per hospital of all changes in bed space necessary for critical access hospital certification; and
- (3) A comparison per hospital between current profit margins and profit margins after critical access certification.

Further requires the report to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (17), SECTION 21.5

COMMUNITY-BASED ADULT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES, PURCHASE OF. - (3) Assessments of the State's efforts to comply with the Department of Justice settlement agreement stipulations, orders, and benchmarks of the Hawaii State Hospital Clinical/Organization Plan.

Further requires the report to be submitted to the Legislature thirty days after the end of each quarter during fiscal year 2000-2001.

CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS, EVALUATIONS. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to submit evaluations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

LONG-TERM CARE PROGRAM, ACUITY-BASED MANAGED, DEVELOPMENT OF. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to pursue a more complete and permanent solution and submit a status report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (23), SECTION 32.1

SCHOOL PRIORITY FUNDS, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to submit a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (26), SECTION 34

INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES EDUCATION ACT (IDEA) STUDENTS, INSTRUCTIONAL AND PROGRAM SUPPORT TO. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to submit a detailed report on the distributions made to

each school district to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (44), SECTION 49

FELIX V. CAYETANO CONSENT DECREE, ASSESSMENT AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR. Repeals Section 49 of Act 91, Session Laws of Hawaii 1999, which required a report by the <u>Felix Consent Decree</u> <u>Operations Manager</u> to be submitted to the Legislature.

PART III (48), SECTION 55

UNCLAIMED PROPERTY, REPORT ON. Repeals the requirement that the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> submit a report of the number and total amount of deposits of all unclaimed property into the general fund and the number and total amount of expenditures to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2001.

PART III (50), SECTION 59.1

COMPLIANCE RESOLUTION FUND, REPORT ON THE USE OF. Requires the reports by the <u>Department of</u> Commerce and Consumer Affairs on the use of the compliance resolution fund to include:

- (1) Identification of the program source and amounts of all receipts, revenues, or reimbursements deposited or transferred into the compliance resolution fund; and
- (2) Identification of all expenditures or transfers of funds made from the compliance resolution fund, including recipient programs, amounts provided, and the reasons for each expenditure or transfer.

- (2) Provide progress reports on the third grade reading assessment scores to the public in clear, understandable terms on a school, district, and state-wide basis, and disclose the number of third graders reading at each grade-level equivalent across the range from kindergarten through eighth grade:
- (3) Encourage schools to develop a repertoire of instructional approaches, each tailored to different student learning styles;
- (4) Provide information to public schools and school districts regarding organizational and instructional practices of representative schools that are making or exceeding the equal annual incremental improvement toward the reading goal; and
- (5) Discourage a specific instructional approach because the standard for evaluating an elementary school on a district's reading instruction is determined by the annual and incremental growth.

Further resolves that the Superintendent coordinate the activities of relevant professional associations by:

- (1) Meeting and conferring with each relevant professional association regarding voluntary alignment of association resources to support the achievement of the reading goal; and
- (2) Annually reporting to the Senate and House Education Committees on the efforts of professional associations to support the achievement of the reading goal.

Further resolves that each public elementary school principal have the primary responsibility within the building for providing leadership in reaching the reading goal.
