#### **FOREWORD**

This publication sets forth all of the requests made by the Hawaii State Legislature during the Regular Session of 2007 to agencies and officials of the federal, state and county governments and of quasi-public and private agencies. These requests are contained in acts enacted by the Legislature or bills passed which have yet to be approved by the Governor. These acts or bills include specific requests for submission of information back to the Legislature excluding annual and other reports requested on an indefinite basis. These requests are also contained in resolutions adopted by the Senate or House of Representatives or by the whole legislature. Dates by which reports and other responses are expected are indicated when specifically set by the Legislature. The names of the agencies involved in the conduct of a study or the execution of a request are underscored.

For the reader's convenience these legislative requests are also grouped together by agencies (see agency index); as well as by subject matter (see subject index).

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DEVELOPMENTALLY DISABLED OR MENTALLY RETARDED INDEPENDENT LIVING. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u>, <u>State Council on Developmental Disabilities</u> to submit a final report on:

- (1) The number of persons with developmental disabilities or mental retardation who choose to live independently as provided by Act 303, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006;
- (2) The financial impact Act 303, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, has had on the State; and
- (3) Any findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation

to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

Amends Act 303, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, by changing the final report to the Legislature 2008 to be a progress report.

#### **ACT 68**

HB 1338 HD2 SD1

POWER OUTAGES ON OCTOBER 15, 2006, ON OAHU, MAUI, AND HAWAII. Requires the <u>Division of Consumer Advocacy</u> to submit a report providing:

- (1) The date of each expenditure made to investigate the power outages that occurred on October 15, 2006, on the islands of Oahu, Maui, and Hawaii;
- (2) The identity of any recipient of payments for each expenditure; and
- (3) The scope of the consultant contract for which each expenditure was provided

to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### ACT 92

HB 1044, HD1, SD2

IMMUNOSUPPRESSANT MEDICATION FOR QUEST PATIENTS, IMPACT OF. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare an economic impact assessment report including information obtained from insurance providers who provide medicaid and QUEST coverage on the additional costs incurred as a result of providing access to immunosuppressant medication to QUEST patients.

Further requires the Department to report findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2010, 2011, and 2012.

### PART III, SECTION 5

AGRICULTURE EDUCATION PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to submit a report regarding:

- (1) Its activities toward implementation of the agriculture education program;
- (2) Its coordination between the agriculture education and culinary arts programs; and
- (3) Any requests for funding to further implement the agriculture education program

to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

Further requires the first report to include a description of Department activities between July 1, 2006, and June 30, 2007, toward implementing Act 233, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, which established a vocational agriculture education program.

## PART IV, SECTION 8

HAWAII EXCELLENCE THROUGH SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY ACADEMY PILOT PROGRAM. Requires <u>Kauai Community College</u> in collaboration with the <u>Department of Education</u> to submit:

- (1) A progress report on its plans for the pilot program, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008;
- (2) A progress report on its implementation of the pilot program, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009; and
- (3) A final report on the pilot program, including associated costs and any recommendations for the expansion of the academies to other public schools, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2010.

### PART VI, SECTION13

BUSINESS/EDUCATION INTERNSHIP AND MENTORSHIP PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u> to submit a report on the implementation of the business/education internship and mentorship program to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

### PART VII, SECTION 15

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM IN THE SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING, AND MATHEMATICS DISCIPLINES FOR TEACHERS. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii College of Education</u> to submit a report on its program including the number of teachers who have participated in the program to the Legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

#### PART VIII, SECTION 18

TRANSITION TO TEACHING PROGRAM. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to submit a report on the status of program including the number of individuals who have participated in and completed the program to the Legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

## SB 686, SD1, HD1, CD1

EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANT CAREER LADDER PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to submit a report on a career ladder program for educational assistants that includes repricing class levels, the number of affected employees under a career ladder program, and the cost impact of implementing a career ladder program to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### SB 880 SD2 HD2 CD1

MUSEUM OF HAWAIIAN MUSIC AND DANCE. Establishes a <u>museum of Hawaiian</u> <u>music and dance committee</u> that consist of:

- (1) The <u>executive director of the Hawaii Tourism Authority</u>, or the director's designated representative;
- (2) A representative from each of the following:
  - (A) The State Foundation on Culture and the Arts;
  - (B) The Office of Hawaiian Affairs;
  - (C) Kamehameha Schools;
  - (D) Bishop Museum; and
  - (E) The Hawaiian Music Hall of Fame and Museum;
- (3) Three members appointed by the President of the Senate to include at least two practitioners or former practitioners of the arts of Hawaiian music or dance, and at least one member of the Hawaiian Academy of Recording Artists or a kumu hula: and
- (4) Three members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives to include at least two practitioners or former practitioners of the arts of Hawaiian music or dance, and at least one member of the Hawaiian Academy of Recording Artists or a kumu hula.

Requires the committee to investigate and determine:

- (1) The type of institution that would be appropriate for a museum of Hawaiian music and dance:
- (2) The best location or locations for this museum or museums;
- (3) A plan to incorporate the existing Hawaiian Music Hall of Fame and Museum into a museum of Hawaiian music and dance;

(4) The creation of a Hawaiian dance hall of fame to be incorporated into a museum of Hawaiian music and dance.

Further requires the committee to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008, and a final report to the Legislature prior to June 30, 2008.

### SB 896, SD1, HD2, CD1

LIFE SCIENCES RESEARCH COMPLEX, KAKAAKO, OAHU. Requires the <u>High</u> <u>Technology Development Corporation</u>, with assistance from the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, and <u>Tourism</u>, to negotiate with the developers, on terms acceptable and satisfactory to the Corporation's Board of Directors and the Director of Finance, a lease agreement and lease guaranty for a period of 10 years for approximately 66,000 square feet of laboratory and office space in a life sciences research complex in Kakaako.

Authorizes the Corporation to enter into contracts to support the planning and development of a state operated high technology incubator and innovation center in the Kakaako district.

Requires the Corporation to submit a progress report on its plans, agreements, expenditures, and other activities under this Act to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008 and until the expiration of the lease.

## SB 914, SD2, HD1, CD1

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES FOR INMATES. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to report to the Legislature by November 1, 2007, with a detailed mental health plan that addresses the following:

- An assessment of the department's existing resources and staffing, and of additional resources and staffing needed to bring mental health services up to standard and to keep up with future demands;
- (2) The use of alternative services, such as the use of telemedicine, to provide mental health services to incarcerated offenders;
- (3) The completion of a departmental training and policy manual;
- (4) The appropriate type of updated record-keeping system;
- (5) An update on the feasibility study initiated by the Departments of Health and Public Safety regarding the expansion of the Hawaii State Hospital to include an offender wing so as to be able to adequately treat mental health patients who are incarcerated; and
- (6) Any other suggestions or ideas to improve mental health services to incarcerated individuals and to comply with local, state, and federal laws and mandates.

Further requires the written report to be submitted in a form understandable by lay readers and made available to the public.

#### SB 932 SD2 HD2 CD1

PART II, SECTION 6

INMATE TRANSITION AND REENTRY INTO THE COMMUNITY. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety Intake Service Centers and Education Divisions</u> to establish a one-year pilot day reporting center that will be available to two hundred offenders who have six months to one year left to serve on their sentence.

Further requires the Department to submit a written report on:

- (1) The outcome of the pilot project;
- (2) Cost analysis and an accounting of expenses;
- (3) Relevant data on program participants;
- (4) Program and management evaluations; and
- (5) Any other pertinent information, recommendations, or proposed legislation, if any, to determine whether the program should be continued

no later than twenty days prior to the start of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART VII, SECTION 21

INMATE REENTRY INTO THE COMMUNITY. The <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to report on the implementation, progress, and effectiveness of the components of this measure to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening on the Regular Sessions of 2008, 2009, and 2010.

PART VII, SECTION 22

TAX INCENTIVES FOR EMPLOYERS WHO HIRE EX-INMATES. Requires the <a href="Department of Public Safety">Department of Public Safety</a> to report with suggested tax incentives for employers who hire individuals who were formerly incarcerated, developed with the assistance of the <a href="Department of Taxation">Department of Taxation</a> and the <a href="Department of Labor and Industrial Relations">Department of Labor and Industrial Relations</a> to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### SB 1133 SD3 HD1 CD1

HIGHWAY FUND REVIEW. There is a <u>Joint Senate and House of Representatives Task</u>
<u>Force</u>, appointed by the <u>President of the Senate</u> and the <u>Speaker of the House of</u>
<u>Representatives</u>, to conduct a review of the financial requirements of the state highway fund, with an emphasis on the adequacy and equity of revenues generated by one or more

revenues sources pursuant to section 251-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, compared with other revenue sources contributing to or that could be contributing to the highway fund.

Requires the review to include but not be limited to data from the 2000-2001 fiscal year to present and may include any data, information, or conclusions reported by task forces or groups that have discussed or met in the past to evaluate at least in part the fiscal needs or viability of the state highway fund.

Further requires the Joint Task Force to submit a report of its findings to the Legislature twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

### SB 1191, SD2, HD2, CD1

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to submit an interim report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008 and a final report, including accomplishments, findings, future plans, cost estimates, and any proposed legislation relating to pedestrian safety improvements, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

(SSCR 250, 994, HSCR 1434, 1865, CCR 41)

#### SB 1228, SD1, HD1, CD1

WORLD WAR II JAPANESE INTERNMENT CAMPS IN HAWAII, MEMORIAL. Requires the <u>Department of Land and Natural Resources</u>, with the assistance of the <u>Japanese Cultural Center of Hawaii</u>, the <u>Japanese American National Heritage Coalition</u>, <u>Historic Hawaii Foundation</u>, and <u>other organizations</u> as may be appropriate to establish a process to determine the most appropriate means of memorializing the World War II Japanese internment camp experience in Hawaii.

Further requires the Department to report its findings and recommendations no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### SB 1283, SD2, HD2

TOBACCO SETTLEMENT MONEYS, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> and the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a detailed accounting of all revenues and expenditures relating to:

(1) The thirty-five per cent of moneys appropriated to the Department for transfer to the Department of Human Services for children's health insurance program and for the Department's promotion of disease prevention programs including

- maternal child health and child development programs, promotion of healthy lifestyles, and prevention oriented public health programs;
- (2) Moneys appropriated into the Hawaii tobacco prevention and control trust fund;
- (3) Moneys appropriated into the university revenue-undertakings fund; and
- (4) Any moneys used for the operating costs of the medical school facility.

Further requires the information to be submitted to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

## SB 1603, SD2, HD2, CD1

BEACHES, KEEPING OPEN WITHOUT LIABILITY. Establishes a <u>task force within the Department of the Attorney General</u> to examine the effectiveness of, collect sufficient data relating to, and provide to the Legislature information on Act 190, Session Laws of Hawaii 1996, as amended; Act 170, Session Laws of Hawaii 2002; and Act 82, Session Laws of Hawaii 2003. Requires the task force to include:

- (1) The <u>Attorney General</u> or the Attorney General's designee as chair of the task force:
- (2) The <u>President of the Hawaii State Association of Counties</u> or the president's designee;
- (3) The Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu or the Mayor's designee;
- (4) The Mayor of the County of Maui or the Mayor's designee;
- (5) The Mayor of the County of Hawaii or the Mayor's designee;
- (6) The Mayor of the County of Kauai or the Mayor's designee; and
- (7) The <u>Executive Director of the Consumer Lawyers of Hawaii</u> or the executive director's designee.

## Requires the task force to:

- Collect data on and examine the effectiveness of providing lifeguards conditional liability protection for lifeguard services at state beach parks, except for gross negligence and wanton acts or omissions;
- (2) Collect data on and examine the effectiveness and adequacy of warning signs at public beach parks in increasing public safety, reducing ocean-related accidents, and protecting the State and counties from unlimited liability with regard to activities in the ocean and at public beaches; and
- (3) Collect data on and examine the effectiveness and adequacy of warning signs at public recreational lands in increasing public safety, and protecting the State and counties from unlimited liability arising out of recreational activities on public lands.

Further requires the task force to submit its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

#### SB 1614 SD1 HD1 CD1

WAIANAE COMPLEX, TEACHERS. Requires the <u>Waianae complex schools</u> to submit a written report that includes:

- (1) Baseline data on teacher qualifications at each school in the Waianae complex;
- (2) Information on the development and maintenance of a system for measuring the quantitative and qualitative results of its recruitment and retention efforts;
- (3) Assessment of the value and impact of the new human resource management model to students at the elementary, middle, and high school levels; and
- (4) Any other pertinent information, recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to determine the future of the pilot project;

to the Legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2008.

### SB 1672, SD2, HD3, CD1

MEDICARE FEE SCHEDULE. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to report the amount of funding necessary to continue the increased payments for physician services up to one hundred per cent of the current medicare fee schedule applicable to Hawaii and the funds necessary to increase payments up to one hundred per cent of the current medicare fee schedule applicable to Hawaii to all medicaid fee-for-service and QUEST providers to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

### SB 1676, SD2, HD1, CD1

MEDICAL MALPRACTICE AND HOSPITAL PROFESSIONAL AND GENERAL LIABILITY INSURANCE COVERAGE. Requires the <u>Board of Directors of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation</u> to submit a report on the feasibility of establishing a captive insurance company pursuant to provide medical malpractice and hospital professional and general liability coverage for Hawaii Health Systems Corporation facilities and physicians no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### SB 1750, SD1, HD1, CD1

SHAKEN BABY SYNDROME. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to submit a report that includes:

(1) Statistics on the number of hospitals, since this Act took effect, that have provided all parents of newborns with written educational information about the

- dangerous effects of shaken baby syndrome and the different methods of preventing shaken baby syndrome;
- (2) Statistics on the number of cases of shaken baby syndrome to see the results of providing this educational material to parents of newborns; and
- (3) Recommendations, including suggested legislation, on improving methods and policies necessary to provide for the safety of newborn children to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### SB 1792, SD3, HD3, CD2

REGIONAL SYSTEM BOARDS UNDER THE HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION. Requires the <u>Hawaii Health Systems Corporation</u> and <u>newly established regional system boards</u> to report to the Legislature within thirty days of the establishment of the newly created boards.

(SSCR 535, 1019 - filed, FLOOR AMENDMENT 6, HSCR 1451, 1937, FLOOR AMENDMENT 11, CCR 197 - filed, SENATE FLOOR AMENDMENT 26, HOUSE FLOOR AMENDMENT 22)

#### SB 1853 SD2 HD2 CD1

'AHA MOKU COUNCIL SYSTEM. Establishes the 'Aha Kiole Advisory Committee to:

- (1) Explore, examine, and derive best practice models for the creation of an 'aha moku council system that will:
  - (A) Provide advisory input based upon the indigenous resource management practices of each moku to state and county agencies;
  - (B) Aid in the development of a comprehensive set of best practices for natural resources management;
  - (C) Foster the understanding and practical use of knowledge, including native Hawaiian methodology and expertise;
  - (D) Ensure the future sustainable use of the State's marine, land, cultural, agricultural, and natural resources;
  - (E) Enhance community education and cultural awareness; and
  - (F) Participate in the protection and preservation of the State's natural resources:
- (2) Engage in discussion with and participate in meetings and events held by the various moku statewide to gain perspective and develop a consensus on establishing an 'aha moku council system with an 'aha moku council commission;
- (3) Establish an administrative structure for the creation of an 'aha moku council commission to oversee an 'aha moku council system, which shall consist of eight 'aha kiole members, representing each island;

- (4) Establish a standard eligibility criteria and selection process for each 'aha kiole member and the selection of a executive director;
- (5) Establish goals and objectives for an 'aha moku council commission to accomplish, including benchmarks for long-term planning and sustainable objectives: and
- (6) Establish a feasible operational budget for an 'aha moku council commission to conduct meetings, cover administrative expenses, and disseminate information and advice for the creation of an 'aha moku council system.

Further requires the Committee to submit a written interim report of its findings and recommendations no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008, and a written final report of its findings and recommendations no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

### SB 1916, SD2, HD3, CD1

CAREGIVERS SUPPORT. Amends Act 285, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, which establishes a <u>Joint Legislative Committee on Family Caregiving</u>. Adds that the Committee also explore establishing a paid family leave program under the temporary disability insurance law.

Requires the Committee to submit its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

Further requires the Committee to incorporate the completed needs assessment into the report and to submit the completed needs assessment to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

Requires the <u>Executive Office on Aging</u> to research the cash and counseling program and its implementation in other states and prepare a cost benefit analysis of family caregiver refundable tax credits to the Committee by November 1, 2007.

## SB 1931 SD2 HD3 CD2

PART I, SECTION 1

EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE. Establishes an <u>Educational Workforce Working Group</u> within the <u>Department of Labor and Industrial Relations</u> to examine and address:

- (1) How well the workforce needs of Hawaii are currently being met;
- (2) How prepared the State is to meet the workforce needs of the future;
- (3) What recommendations can be made to improve Hawaii's educational system to fulfill the workforce needs of the future;
- (4) What is the current relationship between the public schools and emerging industries;

- (5) What percentage of high school students participate in any form of vocational or professional training outside of the school setting;
- (6) What aspects of high school curriculum, standards, and assessment strategies have a direct relationship to the State's future workforce needs;
- (7) What are the challenges or impediments to creating a more direct relationship between schools and economy-driving industries of the State;
- (8) How might autonomous schools-within-schools, magnet schools, specialized schools, and charter schools be better used to create more direct links between high schools and economy-driving industries of the State; and
- (9) How might the size of public schools, the distribution of discretionary funding, the decentralized authority of school community councils or charter school local school boards, and other organizational reforms be better used to satisfy the workforce development needs of the information and technology age.

Requires the Group to submit a report on its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### PART II, SECTION 3

EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to include plans to ensure optimal use of technology for administration, data collection, and data sharing related to educational and workforce needs, and plans to ensure that personalized student education plans will provide a direct link to economic and workforce needs and to submit a report containing its five-year plan to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### PART III, SECTION 4

HIGHER EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a report detailing:

- (1) The current activities on each of its campuses to prepare students with the skills and knowledge needed to successfully enter and progress in the Hawaii workforce;
- (2) The University of Hawaii's current plans to increase the percentage of Hawaii high school graduates who continue their education by enrolling at a University of Hawaii campus and to increase the percentage of students who earn degrees or certificates within one hundred fifty per cent of the planned length of the degree, particularly in fields where the State is experiencing shortages of qualified employees; and
- (3) Recommendations about additional steps the State needs to consider implementing to increase the number of qualified workers in the State.

Further requires the University to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### HB 34, SD2, CD1

EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM INVESTMENTS. Authorizes the <u>Employees'</u> <u>Retirement System</u> to relax a divestment schedule if the System determines divestment will likely result in the loses exceeding 99.50 per cent and requires the System to submit a report to the Legislature which includes the reasons and justification accompanied by supporting documentation of numerical estimates. Further requires the report to be updated annually thereafter.

Further requires the System to file a public-available report to the Legislature that includes the scrutinized companies list within ninety days after the list is created.

Further authorizes the System to cease divestment, reinvestment, or subsequent ongoing investment and requires the System to submit a report to the Legislature which includes the reasons and justification accompanied by supporting documentation of numerical estimates. Further requires the report to be updated annually thereafter.

(HSCR 7, 312, 1143, SSCR 1179, 1652, CCR 86)

### HB 212, HD2, SD2, CD1

COUNTY OF MAUI HEALTH PLAN. Creates the <u>Temporary Maui Health Initiative Task</u> <u>Force within the State Health Planning and Development Agency</u> to develop a comprehensive strategic health plan for the county of Maui. Requires the Agency and the <u>Department of Health</u> support the task force.

Requires the task force to include:

- (1) The <u>Mayor of Maui</u> shall appoint seven members who are residents of various regions of Maui, including east, west, central, upcountry, south, Molokai, and Lanai;
- (2) The President of the Senate shall appoint four members; and
- (3) The <u>Speaker of the House of Representatives</u> shall appoint four members.

Requires the Task Force to submit its final report to the Legislature, the Mayor of Maui County, and the Agency no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

(HSCR 22, 639, 1025, SSCR 1249, 1683, CCR 201)

### HB 310, HD2, SD2, CD2

BROADBAND ACCESS. Establishes the <u>Hawaii Broadband Task Force</u> comprised of the following:

- (1) Three members of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- (2) Three members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;

- (3) Four representatives of federal, state, and county government entities having a role in infrastructure deployment; management of public rights-of-way, regulation, and franchising; information technology; and economic development; and
- (4) <u>Five representatives of Hawaii's private sector technology, telecommunications, and investment industries, including the incumbent local exchange carrier;</u>

provided that the members in paragraphs (3) and (4) shall be appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

### Requires the Task Force to:

- (1) Identify actions that will produce increased investment in and the availability of advanced broadband capabilities at more affordable costs by using new approaches to broadband deployment, including through increased access to public rights-of-way and shared fiber infrastructure;
- (2) Identify administrative actions that will promote broadband access and usage within the state:
- (3) Make specific recommendations on how Hawaii can leverage federal, state, and international opportunities for and eliminate any related barriers to broadband access and adoption;
- (4) Focus special attention on how broadband can be used to substantially benefit educational institutions, healthcare institutions, community-based organizations, and governmental institutions;
- (5) Consult with public and private stakeholders to coordinate statewide efforts to obtain and maximize loan funding available for broadband deployment and development projects in the state;
- (6) Consult with private sector stakeholders to leverage opportunities to increase investments in state-of-the-art technologies, and new approaches to advancing capabilities at reduced costs;
- (7) Identify best practices to establish a database that identifies current and prospective projects for deploying broadband;
- (8) Encourage all state and county agencies to lead by example by obtaining the necessary equipment for broadband usage and have full access to broadband service; and
- (9) Encourage all state and county agencies to study the feasibility of and utilize various services that broadband provides such as streaming video technologies to broadcast public meetings over the Internet, videoconferencing, wireless Internet access in state and county facilities that are most used by the public, and the deployment of voice over Internet protocol (VoIP).

Requires the Office of the Auditor to provide the research and organizational support.

Requires the Task Force to submit a report of its initial findings and recommendations regarding improved broadband capabilities and services to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

(HSCR 757, 945, SSCR 1318, 1634, CCR 182 – filed, SENATE FLOOR AMENDMENT 24, HOUSE FLOOR AMENDMENT 20)

### HB 487, HD1, SD1, CD1

RENTAL HOUSING UNITS GRANTS. Requires the <u>Hawaii Public Housing Authority</u> to provide grants for rental units set aside for persons and families with incomes at or below thirty per cent of the median family income in any project financed in whole or in part by the fund in proportion of those units to the total number of units in the project between July 1, 2005, through June 30, 2009.

Further requires the Authority to report on the number and use of grants provided and whether the grants were an effective use of the funds for purposes of developing rental housing for families at or below thirty per cent of median family income to the Legislature at the end of the period.

(HSCR 336, 1053, SSCR 1598, CCR 62)

HB 500, HD1, SD1, CD1

PART III, SECTION 4

HAWAII COMMUNITY-BASED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT. Requires the <u>program</u> to submit an expenditure report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 5

HAWAII COMMUNITY-BASED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT REVOLVING FUND. Requires the <u>program</u> to submit an expenditure report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 6

CONVENTION CENTER, EVENTS. Requires the <u>Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism</u> to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) A list of additional events for the convention center that were accepted;
- (2) A detailed list of expenditures that resulted from these additional events;
- (3) The amount of revenue generated as a result of these additional events; and
- (4) A detailed plan for future revenue enhancements.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

PART III, SECTION 7

CRUISELINE INDUSTRY, COSTS AND BENEFITS OF. Requires the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u> to submit a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### PART III, SECTION 9

INVASIVE SPECIES, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Department Agriculture</u> to prepare a report that shall include but not be limited to how well Hawaii is doing in the fight against invasive species, including data, measures of effectiveness, cost breakdowns, and outcomes from its efforts to:

- (1) Inspect and detect greater numbers and percentages of invasive species at airports and harbors;
- (2) Jointly work with other agencies and the community; and
- (3) Control and eradicate alien species established in Hawaii.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 10

BEE MITE INFESTATION, STATUS OF. Requires the <u>Department</u> to prepare a report that shall include but not be limited to the status of the bee mite infestation and steps to control and treat the infestation and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

### PART III, SECTION 15

ELECTRICAL POWER TO PRODUCE WATER FOR AQUACULTURE TENANTS, SUBSIDIZING THE COSTS OF. Requires the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, and <u>Tourism</u> to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) A breakout of the guidelines for the application of these funds;
- (2) A copy of the required report from the tenants indicating how the subsidies have helped the growth and financial stability of their businesses; and
- (3) A statement that clarifies the tenants' understanding that the subsidies will only last for two years and that they will be responsible to pay the current price for the water thereafter.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 16

INTERPRETER REFERRAL SERVICE AND WEBSITE. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report detailing the status of such interpreter referral service and website and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART III, SECTION 18

AIRPORTS SPECIAL REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE PROJECTS. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to prepare a report on planned uses and actual expenditures of all special repair and maintenance appropriations to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 19

AIRPORTS ROUTINE REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE PROJECTS. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to prepare a report on planned uses and actual expenditures of all routine repair and maintenance appropriations to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 21

HARBORS SPECIAL REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE PROJECTS. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to prepare a report on planned uses and actual expenditures of all special repair and maintenance appropriations to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 22

HARBORS SECURITY APPROPRIATIONS, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to prepare a report on actual expenditures of all special repair and maintenance appropriations to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART III, SECTION 24

HARBORS, DISASTER DECLARATION. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to submit a report to the Legislature of the disasters declared and the sums expended no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 25

HARBORS RAISED SECURITY LEVELS. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to submit a report to the Legislature detailing expenditures for the effects of raised security levels of MARSEC II (Maritime Security) or higher, as determined by the Captain of the Port (United States Coast Guard) or the Governor no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 26

HIGHWAYS SPECIAL REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE PROJECTS, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to prepare a report on planned uses and actual expenditures of all special repair and maintenance appropriations to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 28

INVASIVE SPECIES, REPORT ON. Requires the <u>Department of Land and Natural</u> <u>Resources</u> to prepare a report that includes the overall status of the invasive species efforts for Hawaii and all collected data, measures of effectiveness, cost breakdowns, and outcomes from:

- (1) Inspection, detection, and interception of, and percentages of, invasive species at airports and harbors;
- (2) Control and eradication of invasive species currently established in Hawaii and;
- (3) Proactive steps taken for prevention of the introduction of invasive species, education and awareness efforts, and institution of policies and procedures.

Further requires the Department to jointly work with other agencies and the community and submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART III, SECTION 30

DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES CONSERVATION AND RESOURCES ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS. Requires the <u>Department of Land and Natural Resources</u> to prepare a report that includes data relating to the activities by all conservation and resources enforcement officers that denote general locations, dates, and outcomes, and the improvements made due to increased funding for equipment upgrades and clerical staff and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 31

KALAUPAPA RESIDENTS, MOLOKAI, INCREASE IN PENSION. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to prepare a report updating the pension increases for the residents of Kalaupapa who qualify for an appropriate increase and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 32

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE CONTRACTS, REPORT. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to prepare a detailed report which includes a detailed financial report from each county submitted to the Department that includes a detailed breakdown of all expenditures and costs incurred to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 33

AMBULANCE AND EQUIPMENT PURCHASES. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to expend funds to purchase two ambulances and two lifepak 12 defibrillators and for the program to prepare and to submit an expenditure report to the Legislature to account for the ambulances and equipment purchases no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 34

HELICOPTER FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI AEROMEDICAL EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES PROGRAM, PURCHASE. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to submit an expenditure report on the purchase of a replacement helicopter for the county of Maui aeromedical emergency medical services program to the Legislature to account for the use

of funds no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 35

SUICIDE EARLY INTERVENTION AND PREVENTION PROGRAM WITH AN EMPHASIS ON YOUTH, ESTABLISHMENT. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to establish a suicide early intervention and prevention program with an emphasis on the youth population and that the program also include other individual age groups.

Further requires the program to develop strategies that include:

- (1) Identifying and assessing the risk of youth and other individuals referred to the program;
- (2) Creating public awareness by building community networks and providing information to the target groups; and
- (3) Referring the youth and other individuals to resources at the appropriate level of care needed.

Further requires the Department to prepare a detailed report including expenditures and all activities performed and submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 36

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES FOR THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU FOR CENTRAL OAHU. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to expend funds for emergency medical services for the City and County of Honolulu for central Oahu and that the program submit an expenditure report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 37

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES SPECIAL FUND FOR AN EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN TRAINING STIPEND PROGRAM. Requires that funds out of the emergency medical services special fund be expended for an emergency medical technician training stipend program to remedy the shortage of mobile intensive care technicians and paramedics and that the <u>Department of Health</u> prepare a detailed report to include expenditures and all activities performed and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 38

MEDICAID HOME & COMMUNITY-BASED SERVICES, IMPLEMENTATION OF. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to prepare a report on the Medicaid home & community-based services that includes:

- (1) The number of individuals aided by the services provided and the capacity of service provided:
- (2) A performance report of services provided and treatment outcomes; and
- (3) A detailed report on all expenditures.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 39

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES DOMICILIARY HOMES AND APARTMENTS FOR INDIVIDUALS, SUBSIDIZING. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to continue to subsidize residents living in apartments and developmental disabilities domiciliary homes for individuals and prepare a report that includes:

- (1) The number of individuals aided by the services provided and the capacity of service provided;
- (2) A performance report of services provided and treatment outcome; and
- (3) A detailed report on all expenditures.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 40

EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICES PROGRAM PURCHASE OF SERVICES AND SERVICE FOR A FEE CONTRACTS. Requires the <u>Early Intervention Services Program</u> to prepare a detailed report evaluating its delivery of services and specifically focusing on all of the early intervention purchase of services and service for a fee contracts that includes:

- A detailed financial report by each of its purchase of services contract providers including a detailed breakdown of services provided, the number of children served by provider each month, and costs incurred including treatment outcomes;
- (2) A detailed financial report by each of its services for a fee contract providers including a detailed breakdown of services provided and funding levels, the number of children served by provider, and treatment outcomes; and
- (3) An aggregate report by the department to the Legislature accounting for all its purchase of services and services for a fee contracts rendered by each of the program's contract providers.

Further requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to prepare a detailed report that includes a summary of all findings and substantive recommendations to improve operational and cost efficiencies in the delivery of services and its outcomes and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 41

FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES FOR WOMEN'S HEALTH, PURCHASE. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to purchase family planning services for women's health and prepare a detailed report which includes:

(1) A detailed financial report from each of its purchase of services contract providers to be submitted to the Department of Health including a detailed

- breakdown of services provided, the number of clients served each month by provider, costs incurred, and outcomes; and
- (2) An aggregate financial report to be completed by the Department for purchase of services rendered by the providers to include all the above.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 46

PHYSICIANS ON-CALL FOR TRAUMA SERVICES FOR ACUTE CARE HOSPITAL EMERGENCY ROOMS IN HILO, KONA, AND ON MAUI. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to submit a report on the use of the funds for physicians on-call for trauma services for acute care hospital emergency rooms in Hilo and Kona on the island of Hawaii and on the island of Maui to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 48

ADULTS WITH SEVERE AND PERSISTENT MENTAL ILLNESSES, SERVICES FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to expend funds for purchase of service contracts for services for adults with severe and persistent mental illnesses and prepare a report including a detailed breakout of services provided and costs incurred, treatment outcome and performance reports on each service provided and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 49

HAWAII STATE HOSPITAL, SECURITY ENHANCEMENTS. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to support the expansion and integration of the security enhancements at the Hawaii State Hospital and that the program prepare a detailed report of all its expenditures and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 51

STATE LABORATORY, EQUIPMENT FOR. Requires the <u>State Laboratory Services</u> <u>Program</u> to prepare a detailed expenditure report that accounts for all of the laboratory equipment purchases and that the <u>Department of Health</u> submit a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 52

HEALTH CARE WORKFORCE SHORTAGES. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to contract with the appropriate agency to identify and improve healthcare workforce shortages through 2020.

Further requires the agency to develop a plan to improve and to address these workforce shortages and that the agency prepare a detailed expenditure report that includes findings

and recommendations relating to the comprehensive health care workforce map and database and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 53

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES, SELF-ADVOCACY NETWORK FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH. Requires the <u>program</u> to prepare a detailed expenditure report including a progress report on its activities and performance outcomes and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 54

CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to improve the State's federally mandated program improvement plan goals by adding services to recruit, train, license, and support resource families (foster homes).

Further requires the Department to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) The child and family services report;
- (2) The number of children aided by the services provided by this funding;
- (3) The number of new foster homes licensed due to this contract:
- (4) The breakdown of services with attached dollar amounts per service included; and
- (5) The progress being made towards reaching the program improvement plan goals.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 55

FOSTER AND ADOPTIVE PARENTS, CHILD ABUSE AND BACKGROUND CHECKS FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to conduct child abuse and neglect background checks for foster and adoptive parents and that the Department prepare a report that includes:

- (1) Name of agency receiving the contract;
- (2) Breakdown of costs and services related to this contract;
- (3) Number of adults with completed child abuse and neglect clearance checks;
- (4) Number of adults in process for clearance checks as of the date of the report;
- (5) Number of adults anticipated to receive clearance checks for fiscal year 2008-2009; and
- (6) Number of foster homes receiving full licensing (without provisions) as a result of completed child abuse and neglect clearance checks.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### PART III, SECTION 56

CHILD PROTECTION AND TREATMENT ACT, ADMINISTRATIVE APPEALS. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) The number of appeals made in the twelve months preceding the month of the report, wherein the sole issue upon appeal was the findings of an investigation by the Department of an allegation of child abuse or neglect;
- (2) The number of hearings resulting from the appeals for which a contracted attorney was paid to preside; and
- (3) The total expenditures for contracted attorneys presiding over the hearings.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 57

HAWAII YOUTH CORRECTIONAL FACILITY AND DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE SETTLEMENT. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to purchase essential equipment and services contracts for the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility to comply with the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility and Department of Justice settlement and to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) The status of the purchase of the training equipment and contracts broken down by exact dollar amounts;
- (2) The current status of any court mandates to which the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility is subject to;
- (3) The progress being made towards complying with the Department of Justice settlement; and
- (4) The status of the sick leave reduction program, including but not limited to the amount expended and measures of effectiveness.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 58

SAFEHOUSE ON MAUI. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to expend funds for a Safehouse on Maui and prepare a report that includes:

- (1) The number of youth residing at both Safehouses;
- (2) The total cost of operating each Safehouse;
- (3) The cost per youth at these facilities;
- (4) Measurable outcomes of helping these youth re-enter society;
- (5) Present and/or future expansion plans for the Safehouse program;
- (6) Measurable statistics of how the Safehouse program is helping with lowering the population of minor offenders at the Hawaii youth correctional facility;
- (7) For each youth entering the program, an evaluation of what placement would have been made in the absence of the Safehouse alternative; and

(8) A description of all steps being taken towards obtaining Title IV-E funding for the program, including but not limited to steps taken to obtain the cooperation of the family court.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 59

VETERANS, MENTAL HEALTH, MEDICAL AND REHABILITATIVE SERVICES, AND JOB TRAINING AND EMPLOYMENT SERVICES FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Defense</u> to conduct a comprehensive assessment of the adequacy of mental health services, medical and rehabilitative services, and job training and employment services for veterans of the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan who reside in Hawaii, and prepare a report on its findings. Requires that the report include statistics for the current and projected population of veterans in Hawaii, identification of gaps in services, and recommendations on how to fill the gaps in service and that the report includes:

- (1) Projections for average costs per veteran served for each type of service;
- (2) Projections on the number of veterans that will require each type of service;
- (3) Total cost projections for each type of service;
- (4) Projected costs of failing to expand each type of service beyond existing levels due to lost productivity; and
- (5) A discussion on the level of federal funds available for each type of service and in aggregate, and the adequacy of federal funding dedicated to meet the needs of these veterans for services.

Further requires the Department to submit a draft report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008 and a final report no later than February 1, 2008.

### PART III, SECTION 60

ADULT ABUSE, ADMINISTRATIVE APPEALS FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report that includes information on:

- (1) The number of such appeals made in the twelve months preceding the month of the report, wherein the sole issue upon appeal was the findings of an investigation by the Department of an allegation of adult abuse or neglect;
- (2) The number of hearings resulting from the appeals for which a contracted attorney was paid to preside; and
- (3) The total expenditures for contracted attorneys presiding over the hearings.

Further requires the Department to submit a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 61

PUBLIC HOUSING UNITS, RENOVATION OF. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a detailed report that includes information on:

- (1) The number of all type A and B vacant units per housing project;
- (2) The number of days each unit has been vacant;
- (3) The type of work performed to make the unit ready for occupancy;
- (4) The cost to repair each vacant unit; and
- (5) The length of time to complete the repairs and renovations.

Further requires the Department submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 62

HOMELESS, SERVICES FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report identifying:

- (1) The number of homeless persons assisted in the prior two fiscal years and the number of individuals anticipated to be assisted in the current and succeeding fiscal year;
- (2) The full list of homeless services rendered; and
- (3) A detailed financial plan that identifies expenses broken down by cost elements, identified fixed costs, and the average expenditure per client.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART III, SECTION 63

CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT, CASE BASED STRATEGY FOR. Provides funds for a pilot project to test a case-based strategy for child support enforcement and requires the <u>Department of the Attorney General</u> to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) The status of the pilot project;
- (2) An evaluation of the effectiveness of the case-based strategy in resolving deficiencies identified by the State Auditor in the 2003 and 2007 audits of the child support enforcement agency;
- (3) Additional strategies the Department will use in the following biennium to address deficiencies identified by the State Auditor; and
- (4) A list of vacant positions in the child support enforcement agency which as currently described do not support the case-based strategy and which should be replaced by more appropriate positions, and what those more appropriate positions would be.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 64

FAMILY CAREGIVER SUPPORT SERVICES, COORDINATION OF. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to coordinate the family caregiver support services and that the <u>program</u> develop strategies that includes:

- (1) Assessing and identifying caregiver services needed by these individuals referred to the program;
- (2) Referring these individuals to resources at the appropriate level of care needed; and
- (3) Creating public awareness by building community networks and providing information to individuals requiring services.

Further requires the program to prepare a detailed report to account for all of its activities including outcomes measures and for the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 67

WEIGHTED STUDENT FORMULA, TRANSITION TO. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> at the discretion of the Superintendent of Education to assist schools in the transition to weighted student formula funding and that a minimum of \$100,000 of the funds shall be provided to elementary schools who model full inclusion special education programs.

Further requires the Department to submit a report on expenditures made to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, 68

EDUCATION, NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND ACT OF 2001, RESTRUCTURING AND REPORTS. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes evaluations from each educational consultant assigned to each school on the progress of No Child Left Behind restructuring, and a report on spending per school for No Child Left Behind restructuring and to submit both reports to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 73

ELECTRONIC COMPREHENSIVE STUDENT SUPPORT SYSTEM. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes the progress and status of the implementation of the electronic comprehensive student support system and the need for contracted services for the project and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 75

ELECTRONIC STUDENT INFORMATION SYSTEM, STATUS OF. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes the progress and status of the implementation of the electronic student information system and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 76

MENTOR PROGRAM, PARA-EDUCATOR TRAINING PROGRAM, RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION SUPPORT CENTER FUNDS TO SUPPORT. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a detailed report identifying the program expenditures and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 77

SCHOOL FOOD SERVICES. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes cost saving measures for school food services and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 78

STUDENT TRANSPORTATION. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes yearly projections on revenues and expenditures as well as cost saving measures being implemented for student transportation and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 79

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION'S EXPENDITURES. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes current and projected usage as well as current and projected costs of electricity, sewer, and water services and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 80

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROJECTS. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes a summary of the various energy efficiency projects and the corresponding change in energy usage as a result of these projects and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART III, SECTION 81

HAWAII 3R'S. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to submit a progress report on the Hawaii 3R's to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART III, SECTION 86

HAWAII STATE PUBLIC LIBRARY SYSTEM MAINTENANCE AND ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROJECTS. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes monthly energy usage of the public libraries and tracking decreases in usage

corresponding to efficiency projects and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 87

HAWAII AIDS RESEARCH PROGRAM AND OPERATIONAL COSTS. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a report on planned uses and actual expenditures that illustrates progress of the Hawaii AIDS research program and associated research efforts which occur and are initiated as a direct result of the allocated funds and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 91

IMILOA HAWAII ASTRONOMY CENTER, HAWAII. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a report of all current expenses, utility costs, maintenance and repair contract costs, and motor vehicle and related repair and maintenance costs and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 93

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII NEW CLASSES. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a report that includes new classes started on each campus per semester as a result of funds, the number of students in these classes, and the amount of funds expended and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 101

INMATE APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to implement an apprenticeship program for inmates and to prepare a report that includes information on:

- (1) Measures of effectiveness of the program;
- (2) Following their release, whether former inmates are employed part-time or fulltime and whether they are placed in the job sector for which they received their job training; and
- (3) Overall success rates of the program, focusing on recidivism rates.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 102

INMATE RE-ENTRY PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to implement a re-entry program assigning one case worker to each intake service branch to ensure that offenders have housing and employment upon release and to prepare a report that includes information on:

- (1) Measures of effectiveness of the program;
- (2) A description of the types of programs and providers that re-entry programs have assigned to inmates;
- (3) Following their release, whether former inmates who were served by the intake services center are employed part-time or full-time and whether they have obtained housing; and
- (4) Overall success rates of the program, focusing on recidivism rates.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 103

INMATE TRANSITIONAL WORK FURLOUGH SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to prepare a report on the activities that includes information on:

- (1) Measures of effectiveness of the programs;
- (2) Following their release, whether former inmates are employed part-time or full-time and whether they are placed in the job sector for which they received their job training; and
- (3) Overall success rates of the programs, focusing on recidivism rates.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART III, SECTION 104

INMATE TRANSITION AND JOB DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to support the inmate transition and job development program to ensure that offenders have gained housing, employment, and other support services and that the Department prepare a report that includes information on:

- (1) Measures of effectiveness of the program;
- (2) Following their release, whether former inmates who were served by the intake services center are employed part-time or full-time and whether they have obtained housing; and
- (3) Overall success rates of the program, focusing on recidivism rates.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 105

INMATES MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to expend funds for staffing and equipment for mental health services at the Oahu Community Correctional Center, Halawa Correctional Facility, and the Women's Community Correctional Center and that the Department prepare a report for each facility that:

(1) Appropriate measures of effectiveness;

- (2) Inmate care based on per-inmate hours of individual and group-based mental health treatment programs;
- (3) Level of medical management of mental health section inmates;
- (4) Amount of involuntary treatment, including the use of seclusion, restraints, forced medications, and involuntary hospitalization; and
- (5) The tracking of inmate mental health improvements or regressions while in the corrections system.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 107

DISASTER RECOVERY ASSISTANCE. Requires the <u>Department of Defense</u> to submit a report detailing all expenditures to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 108

HAWAII NATIONAL GUARD'S READINESS TO RESPOND TO NATURAL DISASTERS. Requires the <u>Department of Defense</u> to prepare a report on the status of the Hawaii National Guard's readiness to respond to natural disasters, including:

- An assessment of equipment and supplies on hand;
- (2) Adequacy of staffing for disaster recovery assistance, including the number of personnel trained to respond to disasters by type of disaster; and
- (3) Adequacy of training for disaster recovery assistance personnel.

Further requires the report to contain assessments of the National Guard's recruitment efforts, including statistical and demographic information for new recruits and reenlistments and that the Department submit a draft of this report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008 and a final report no later than February 1, 2008.

Further requires the Department to submit to the Legislature quarterly updates to this report no more than three weeks after the end of each fiscal quarter.

PART III, SECTION 109

NATIONAL GUARD PERSONNEL DEPLOYMENT. Requires the <u>Department of Defense</u> to prepare a report on all deployments of national guard personnel for the previous six years in support of overseas missions, including:

- (1) A listing of the number of personnel deployed for each mission;
- (2) The duration of the deployment;
- (3) The cost for the unit for each deployment, including the cost of replacing supplies and equipment; and
- (4) The adequacy of federal support to re-supply and re-equip the Hawaii national guard following deployments.

Further requires the Department to submit a draft report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008 and a final report no later than February 1, 2008.

Further requires the Department to submit to the Legislature quarterly updates to this report no more than three weeks after the end of each fiscal quarter.

#### PART III, SECTION 110

EMERGENCY WARNING FAILURES. Requires the <u>Department of Defense</u> to conduct a comprehensive assessment of the state's disaster warning system, including:

- A compilation of all system failures experienced during emergency warnings in the past five years;
- (2) An explanation of the cause of each system failure; and
- (3) An explanation of what the department has done to rectify the causes of each system failure.

Further requires that the assessment include the identification of areas without disaster warning device coverage and the Department's plan to provide emergency warnings in those areas over the short and long term.

Further requires the Department to prepare a list of all needed improvements to system infrastructure, including cost estimates and projected federal funding available and state funding requirements to make the improvements and that the Department prepare a multi-year plan to seek the federal and state funding and a work schedule to make the improvements.

Further requires the Department to submit a draft report of the above information to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008 and a final report no later than February 1, 2008.

Further requires the Department to submit to the Legislature quarterly updates to this report no more than three weeks after the end of each fiscal quarter.

### PART III, SECTION 111

STATE INSTITUTIONAL NETWORK (INET), EXPANSION OF. Requires the <u>Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs</u> to submit a report to the Legislature detailing the expenditure of the funds for INET no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 112

PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION, RESTRUCTURING. Requires the <u>Public Utilities</u> <u>Commission</u> to prepare a report on the status of hiring the positions for restructuring and that the report detail the progress made towards implementation of the restructuring.

Further requires the Commission to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART III, SECTION 113

GOVERNOR'S CONTINGENT FUND. Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report to the Legislature on all expenditures made from the "contingent fund" for the preceding twelvementh period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 119

CONTRACTOR'S FOR INCOME, GENERAL EXCISE, AND OTHER TAX AUDITS. Requires the <u>Department of Taxation</u> to submit an annual report to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2007, and on December 1, 2008, detailing the use of these funds and the amount and type of additional taxes assessed resulting from the work of the contractor.

PART III, SECTION 120

REVENUE FORECASTING ACCURACY FOR THE COUNCIL ON REVENUES. Requires the <u>Department of Taxation</u> to submit a report to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2007 and December 1, 2008, on efforts to improve revenue forecasting.

PART III, SECTION 121

COUNTY SURCHARGE TAX, COST OF. Requires the <u>Department of Taxation</u> to prepare a report detailing the level of staffing and funding necessary to administer county surcharge collection and that the report describe the total workload related to collection, provide a listing of staff that support the, the budgeted annual salary for each position, and the approximate percentage of time each position spends on the task.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART III, SECTION 122

TELEPHONE SERVICE CONTRACTS. Requires the <u>Department of Accounting and General Services</u> to prepare a report detailing:

- (1) The actual contract rates for telephone service;
- (2) The projected annualized cost of telephone contract costs using the rates for the current and upcoming fiscal year; and
- (3) The amount over or under the amount budgeted for this purpose.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

PART III, SECTION 123

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PURCHASES. Requires the <u>Department of Accounting and General Services</u> to prepare a detailed report on the equipment purchased including a list of items purchased, cost of each item, life expectancy of each item, cost savings provided by each item, and overall space saved.

Further requires the Department to submit this report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

### PART III, SECTION 124

TECHNOLOGICAL ENHANCEMENTS, USE OF. Requires the <u>Department of Accounting</u> <u>and General Services</u> to prepare a report on the feasibility and cost of establishing a team of specialists to assist departments in the review of business processes and procedures to identify areas that could benefit from the application of technological enhancements.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

### PART V, SECTION 127

HONOLULU INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT, OAHU. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to submit a report on the progress of the conceptual planning and design for items no. C-2, C-3, C-7, and C-8 and that the report:

- Address the coordination and phasing of all modernization projects at Honolulu international airport;
- (2) Identify the transportation system(s) and technologies being considered for the people mover project;
- (3) Outline plans to mitigate the impacts of construction on travelers and other users of the airport;
- (4) Include preliminary drawings and maps showing the proposed changes to the airport;
- (5) Explain how the updated master plan for the Honolulu International Airport accounts for the proposed modernization projects;
- (6) Any other information necessary to explain the details of the Department's plan for the aforementioned modernization projects.

Further requires the report to be submitted to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2007.

### PART V, SECTION 128

KONA INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT AT KEAHOLE, HAWAII. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to submit a report on the progress of the conceptual planning and design for item no. C-14, and that the report:

- (1) Address the coordination and phasing of all modernization projects at Kona international airport at Keahole;
- (2) Outline plans to mitigate the impacts of construction on travelers and other users of the airport;
- (3) Include preliminary drawings and maps showing the proposed changes to the airport;
- (4) Explain how the updated master plan for the Kona international airport at Keahole accounts for the proposed modernization projects;
- (5) Provide any other information necessary to explain the details of the Department's plan for the aforementioned modernization projects.

Further requires the report to be submitted to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2007.

PART V, SECTION 129

CRUISELINE INDUSTRY, COSTS AND BENEFITS OF. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to work with the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u> as well as other state departments to produce the study and that one department submit a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

PART V, 130

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION HIGHWAYS DIVISION PROJECTS STAFF COSTS. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to submit a proposal to convert a portion of the positions currently funded with capital improvement program funds to operating funds and that the proposal to convert positions reflect the true costs of the highways division's capital program versus operating costs.

Further requires the proposal to be submitted to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2007.

PART V, SECTION 131

HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION PROJECTS. Requires the <u>Hawaii Health</u> <u>Systems Corporation</u> to submit a report to the Legislature identifying the projects funded or intended to be funded no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

PART V, SECTION 132

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM APPROPRIATIONS. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to submit a quarterly report on the progress made towards implementation of all of the Department's capital improvement program appropriations and that the Department provide:

- (1) A narrative account of the progress made since the last report, or in the case of the first report, a narrative account of the current status of the project;
- (2) The percent of total work completed and the anticipated completion date;
- (3) For each cost element: the total appropriation amount, lapse amount to date, expenditures to date, unallotted amount, allotment balance, encumbrance claim amount, and encumbrance contract amount.

Further requires the first report to be due to the Legislature no later than November 15, 2007 and subsequent reports to be due ninety days after the previous report was due.

PART VII, SECTION 149

BOATING SPECIAL FUND, BOND PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST REIMBURSEMENT. Authorizes the Governor to use the boating special fund to finance the respective public undertaking, improvement, or system.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 150

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, INADEQUATE FUNDING. Authorizes the Governor to make supplemental allotments from the special fund or revolving fund responsible for cash or debt service payments for the projects, or transfer unrequired balances from other unlapsed projects in this Act or prior appropriation acts which authorized the use of special funds, general obligation bond fund with debt service costs to be paid from special funds, revenue bond funds, or revolving funds.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 152

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDS. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to supplement funds for any cost element for a capital improvement project authorized under this Act by transferring such sums as may be needed from the funds appropriated for other cost elements of the same project by this Act or any other prior or future act which has not lapsed and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 153

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, EXTRA FUNDS. Provides that after the objectives and purposes of appropriations made in this Act from the general obligation bond fund for capital improvement projects have been met, unrequired balances shall be transferred to the project adjustment fund appropriated in part II and described in part IV of this Act and shall be considered a supplementary appropriation thereto and requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 154

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, SUPPLEMENTAL ALLOTMENTS FROM THE PROJECT ADJUSTMENT FUND. Authorizes the Governor to make supplemental allotments from the project adjustment fund appropriated in part II and described in part IV of this Act to supplement any currently authorized capital investment cost elements; provided further that such supplemental allotments from the project adjustment fund shall not be used to increase the scope of the project.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 158

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, REDUCTION OF SCOPE. Empowers the <u>Governor</u> to authorize a reduction of project scope and requires the Governor to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 160

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, DELEGATION TO OTHER AGENCIES. Allows designated expending agencies for capital improvement projects authorized in this Act to delegate to other state or county agencies the implementation of projects when it is determined advantageous to do so by both the original expending agency and the agency to which expending authority is to be delegated.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 161

NATURAL DISASTER RELIEF, USE OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUNDS. Allows the Governor to authorize the expenditure of funds for capital improvement projects not previously authorized in this Act to cope with the effects of natural disasters or unforeseen emergencies, when the effects of the natural disasters or unforeseen emergencies create an urgent need to pursue a course of action that is in the best interest of the State.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 162

NATURAL DISASTERS RELIEF, USE OF PROGRAM FUNDS FOR. Authorizes the Governor to transfer savings or unrequired balances as may be available from the appropriated funds of any program in this Act to supplement the appropriation for any other program in this Act to cope with the effects of natural disasters or other unforeseen emergencies; provided further that the effects of such natural disasters or emergencies create an urgent need to pursue a course of action which is in the best interest of the State.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve

month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 166

FEDERALLY-FUNDED STATE PROGRAMS, CUTBACKS OF FUNDING FOR. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to utilize savings as determined to be available from other state programs for the purpose of maintaining such programs until the next Legislative Session.

Requires the Governor to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 167

FEDERAL FUNDS IN EXCESS OF LEVELS AUTHORIZED BY THE LEGISLATURE. Allows the Governor to approve the expenditure of federal funds which are in excess of levels authorized by the Legislature only in the event that the expenditure is made for the benefit of the public and allows the Governor to allow for an increase in the federal fund authorization ceiling for the program to accommodate the expenditure of such funds.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report to the Legislature; provided further that the report shall include the date when the program to receive the federal funds was first notified that additional federal funds may be available, the date that additional federal funds were known to be available, and the reasons why additional federal fund appropriations were not sought during the preceding legislative session, and an explanation of the public benefit.

Provides that in the event that federal funds are received as the result of a natural or manmade disaster, the Governor shall submit notification to the Legislature within five days after the Governor's approval to expend funds has been granted and the Governor shall submit a summary report of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 168

PRIVATE FUNDS OR PROPERTY. Provides that where an agency is authorized to secure funds or other property from private organizations or individuals to be expended or utilized in connection with any authorized program, the agency, with the Governor's approval, may enter into such undertaking, provided that the provisions of the undertaking comply with applicable State constitutional and statutory requirements.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### PART VII, SECTION 171

APPROPRIATIONS, TRANSFER OF OPERATING FUNDS BETWEEN. Authorizes the Governor to transfer operating funds between appropriations within the same fund, within an expending agency, for operating purposes.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report to the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit to the Legislature a summary report containing the aforementioned information for each use of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 172

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES, TRANSFER OF. Authorizes each department or agency to transfer positions within its respective authorized position ceiling for the purpose of maximizing the utilization of personnel resources and staff productivity; provided further that all such actions shall be with the prior approval of the Governor.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report to the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso; and that the report include the date of the transfer, the position transferred, the program from which the position was transferred, the program to which the position was transferred, responsibilities of the position prior to transfer, the responsibilities of the position after the transfer, and the manner in which the transfer maximizes the utilization of personnel resources and staff productivity; and the Governor shall submit to the Legislature a summary report of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 173

APPROPRIATIONS BASED ON POPULATION AND WORKLOAD DATA. Requires agencies having appropriations which are based on population and workload data to reduce expenditures below appropriations under procedures prescribed by the Department of Budget and Finance in the event actual population and workload trends are less than the figures projected.

Requires the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> to notify the Legislature within five business days of each application of this proviso and to submit a report of all applications of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 174

AUDIT SERVICES, TRANSFER OF FUNDS FOR. Authorizes agencies that use appropriations for audit services to delegate that responsibility and transfer funds to internal post audit.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit to the Legislature a summary report of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

### PART VII, SECTION 175

REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE, TRANSFER OF FUNDS FOR. Authorizes expending agencies that use appropriations authorized in part II of this Act for any planning or land acquisition-related work, and design, construction, and equipment for repair and alterations may delegate responsibility and transfer funds to public works - planning design and construction (AGS 221) for the implementation of the repair and alterations, when it is determined by the agencies that it is advantageous to do so.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit to the Legislature a summary report of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 177

HEALTH CARE FOR INDIGENTS, TRANSFER OF FUNDS FOR. Authorizes the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation to transfer to the Department of Human Services funds appropriated to the Corporation for the care and treatment of patients, whenever the Department can utilize such funds to match federal funds which may be available to help finance the cost of outpatient, acute hospital, or long-term care of indigents or medical indigents in designated critical access hospitals.

Requires the <u>Director of Finance</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 178

HEALTH CARE FOR INDIGENTS, TRANSFER OF FUNDS FOR. Authorizes the Department of Health to transfer to the Department of Human Services funds appropriated to the Department for the care and treatment of patients, whenever the Department can utilize such funds to match federal funds to finance the cost of outpatient, hospital, or skilled nursing home care of indigents or medical indigents.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 179

HEALTH CARE FOR INDIGENTS, AGREEMENTS TO FURNISH. Authorizes the Department of Human Services to enter into agreements with the Department of Health to furnish outpatient, hospital, and skilled nursing home care of indigents or medical indigents and to pay the Department of Health for such care.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this proviso and to submit a report to the Legislature of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve

month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART VII, SECTION 181

BOND RATINGS AND SALES, PROTOCOL ACCOUNT FOR IMPROVING. Authorizes the <u>Director of Finance</u> to establish a protocol account for the promotion and improvement of state bond ratings and sales and to submit a detailed report of all expenditures made from the protocol account to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART VII, SECTION 187

CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE. Provides if the amount of settlements and judgments of claims against the State exceeds program allocations a department is authorized to utilize allocated savings determined to be available from any other program within the department and the Governor is authorized to transfer funds between allocations of appropriations within a department for the purposes of paying settlements and judgments of a program.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART VII, 188

MUNICIPAL LEASE PAYMENTS, FUNDS FOR. Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit to the Legislature a summary report of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART VII, SECTION 191

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE POSITIONS NOT AUTHORIZED BY THE LEGISLATURE. Requires the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> to submit to the Legislature a summary report of all uses of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

PART VII, SECTION 193

CHARTER SCHOOL FUNDING FORMULA. Requires representatives from the Office of the Governor, Charter Schools Administrative Office, and the Board of Education to hold work sessions and meetings that are open to the public for the purpose of developing a charter schools basic funding formula at a level that is comparable to funding for regular public schools; provided further that the issue of providing funding for facilities for charter schools shall also be addressed by the group, but handled as separate from the basic funding formula, and shall recognize the differences between conversion charter schools and start-up charter schools and that the proposal be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the start of the Regular Session of 2008.

#### PART VII, SECTION 196

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE AND CONSUMER AFFAIRS 'S EXPENDITURES. Requires the <u>Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs</u> to prepare a detailed report on how the department's expenditures will be aligned with its special fund revenue collections and submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 200

TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES PROGRAM, PURCHASE OF SERVICE CONTRACTS. Requires the Department of Human Services to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) The names of the contracted providers selected to provide the above services;
- (2) Amounts expended to each contracted provider;
- (3) The number of individuals served under each contract; and
- (4) Measures of the benefits achieved under each contract.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 209

TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES PROGRAM, FINANCIAL PLAN FOR FUNDS. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report that includes a detailed financial plan for federal TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) funds to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## PART VII, SECTION 210

TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES PROGRAM, Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report on the TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) program that includes:

- (1) Its outcomes and measures of effectiveness with regards to the TANF program;
- (2) Work participation rates for two-parent families and all families included in calculation of the federal work participation rate; and
- (3) A listing of contracts funded by the TANF program and how these contracts will help the State's TANF program fulfill federal requirements.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

(HSCR 1215, SSCR 1586, CCR 93)

#### HB 531, HD3, SD2, CD1

EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICES, EXPANSION. Establishes a <u>Hawaii 3-5 Transition Task Force</u> to study the feasibility of expanding Hawaii's early intervention section to continue services for children three years and one day up to five years of age.

Requires the Task Force to include representation from the neighbor islands, rural Oahu, and underserved populations and shall include at least two parents of children who may require these services and one representative from each of the following:

- (1) The Department of Health;
- (2) The Department of Education;
- (3) The Department of Human Services;
- (4) The Office of the Governor;
- (5) The Board of Education;
- (6) The Hawaii Early Intervention Coordinating Council;
- (7) The Special Education Advisory Council;
- (8) The Hawaii State Council on Developmental Disabilities;
- (9) The Department of Education's Section 619 State and District Coordinator;
- (10) The Good Beginnings Alliance;
- (11) Early intervention service providers;
- (12) Head Start providers;
- (13) The American Academy of Pediatrics, Hawaii Chapter;
- (14) The University of Hawaii, College of Education, personnel preparation faculty;
- (15) The Hawaii Association for the Education of Young Children;
- (16) Kia'i ka 'ike;
- (17) Early childhood special education professional development programs:
- (18) One member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
  - (19) One member of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate.

Requires the Department of Health to convene the task force and the Department and the Department of Education to provide staff support.

Requires the Task Force to submit a report that includes:

- (A) Recommendations regarding the feasibility of expanding Hawaii's early intervention section to serve children between three years and one day up to five years of age with developmental delays;
- (B) If deemed feasible, recommendations as to eligibility and service models for the expansion of the early intervention section, taking into consideration the identified needs, recommended best practices, resources and cost projections, service payment (e.g., continuum of payment options from no cost to families to partial payment by families), and procedural safeguards without adversely affecting the implementation of Part C program services;
- (C) If recommended, additional information, including eligibility criteria and programmatic, financing, and evaluation requirements to implement an array of appropriate service models for children between three years and one day up to five years of age with developmental delays in natural and least restrictive environments;
- (D) An implementation plan; and

(E) A timeline to begin services.

to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

## HB 598, HD1, SD1, CD1

ONLINE LEARNING, ACCESS TO STUDENTS. Establishes an Online Learning Task Force attached to the Department of Education to develop a systematic plan to expand opportunities for online learning, to enhance the learning experiences of students across the State.

Requires members of the task force to include:

- (1) The <u>Assistant Superintendent of the Department's Office of Curriculum,</u>
  <u>Instruction, and Student Support</u> or the Assistant Superintendent's designee;
- (2) The <u>Assistant Superintendent of the Department's Office of Information and Technology Services</u> or the Assistant Superintendent's designee;
- (3) The Vice Chancellor for students of the University of Hawaii at Manoa;
- (4) A representative from the Hawaii Educational Networking Consortium; and
- (5) A representative from the Myron B. Thompson Academy.

Requires the Task Force to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

(HSCR 72, 982, SSCR 1232, 1517, CCR 133)

## HB 791, HD1, SD1, CD1

GASOLINE WITHOUT ETHANOL, AVAILABILITY. Requires <u>all distributors</u> to report to the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u> their distribution and availability of gasoline that does not contain ethanol and requires the Department to report its findings to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

(HSCR 374, 995, SSCR 1251, 1666, CCR 69)

#### HB 833, HD2, SD2, CD1

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES, PERSONS WITH, SERVICES FOR. Requires the <u>Department of Labor and Industrial Relations</u> to submit a report to the Legislature on the financial impact and consequences of the exclusions from the employment related laws established under this Act for service providers who provide medicaid home and community-based services for persons with developmental disabilities and mental retardation no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

(HSCR 138, 1163, SSCR 1282, 1668, CCR 142)

## HB 855, HD1, SD1, CD1

WORKERS' COMPENSATION RULES. Requires the <u>Director of Labor and Industrial Relations</u> to submit any proposed adoption, amendment, or repeal of rules under the Worker's Compensation Law to both houses of the Legislature for approval before submitting to the Governor.

(HSCR 626, 849, SSCR 1583, CCR 141)

## HB 869, HD1, SD2, CD1

ENERGY-EFFICIENT TRANSPORTATION STRATEGIES. Requires the <u>Hawaii Energy Policy Forum at the University of Hawaii at Manoa</u> to conduct a study on energy-efficient transportation strategies in conjunction with the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, and <u>Tourism</u>.

Further requires the Forum to submit a report on its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

(HSCR 200, 1107, SSCR 1180, 1474, CCR 98)

## HB 1003, HD3, SD2, CD1

ENERGY SYSTEMS DEVELOPMENT SPECIAL FUND AND BIOENERGY MASTER PLAN. Requires an evaluation to be conducted at the end of the third year after the effective date of this Act, and every three years thereafter by a <u>two-person panel of independent energy and environmental technical experts</u> who shall be appointed by the <u>Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism</u>, of the projects and activities funded by the energy systems development special fund. Further requires the panel to submit a report of the results of each evaluation to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the following Regular Session. Repealed on June 30, 2012.

Requires the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to develop and prepare a bioenergy master plan whose primary objective shall be to develop a Hawaii renewable biofuels program to manage the State's transition to energy self-sufficiency based in part on biofuels for power generation and transportation.

Further requires the Department to submit an interim report of its progress, including any proposed Legislation to facilitate the finalization of a master plan or support preliminary findings to accelerate the implementation of a bioenergy future for Hawaii, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008, and to submit a final report, including the bioenergy master plan no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

## HB 1008, HD2, SD2, CD1

HEALTH CARE SERVICES TO UNINSURED NEWBORN CHILDREN. Establishes the Hawaii Infant Health Care Program as a temporary three-year pilot program to provide continuous, quality health care services to uninsured newborn children who are 1 day, but not more than 30 days of age, up to 10,000 dollars of health care assistance per eligible child, subject to the appropriation of general funds for the program.

Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to report on:

- (1) The number of children who were provided services through the Program;
- (2) A list of health care providers or managed care plans participating in the Program;
- (3) The annual cost of the Program; and
- (4) Any proposed legislation necessary to improve the Program to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## HB 1200, HD1, SD2, CD1

OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS FUNDS, TRANSFER OF OPERATING FUNDS. Authorizes the <u>Office of Hawaiian Affairs</u> to transfer sufficient funds and positions between programs for operating purposes and report these transfer of funds to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

(HSCR 734, 1213, SSCR 1296, 1587, CCR 95)

## HB 1212, HD2, SD2, CD1

PART III, SECTION 7

INTERAGENCY COUNCIL ON INTERMEDIATE SANCTIONS, FUNDS FOR. Requires the <u>Judiciary</u> to prepare a detailed report that includes:

- (1) A detailed breakdown of expenditures;
- (2) A detailed breakdown of treatment services provided;
- (3) Costs incurred and treatment outcomes;
- (4) Results of the evaluation performed; and
- (5) An analysis of the effectiveness of the project.

Further requires the report to be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

SECTIONS 8, 9, and 10

SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT. Requires a progress report on medically targeted substance abuse treatment for drug addicted offenders – integrated approach supervised

by physicians to be provided to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### **SECTION 11**

COURT INTERPRETING SERVICES. Requires the <u>Judiciary</u> to submit a report on all revenues and expenditures from the court interpreting services revolving fund as of December 1, and that the report be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

#### SECTION 12

COURT INTERPRETER PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Judiciary</u> to prepare a report that includes to the following information on the status of the program and an evaluation of the service provided and that it be submitted to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2008 and 2009.

## HB 1352, HD1, SD2, CD1

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF STATEHOOD CELEBRATION. Establishes a temporary commission to be known as the <u>Fiftieth Anniversary of Statehood Commission</u> placed within the <u>Office of the Governor</u>.

Requires the Commission to be composed of:

- (1) Six members to be selected by the President of the Senate;
- (2) Six members to be selected by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (3) Five members to be selected by the Governor;
- (4) One member to represent each county, to be selected by the mayor of the respective county;
- (5) One member to represent the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, to be selected by that organization;
- (6) One member to represent the Hawaii Tourism Authority, to be selected by that organization;
- (7) One member to represent the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, to be selected by that organization; and
- (8) One member to represent the military, to be selected by the Commander, United States Pacific Command.

Requires the Commission to develop, plan, and coordinate various program activities to be scheduled to celebrate and commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the admission of Hawaii to statehood, including a series of events scheduled for August 2009, and submit a written report to the Legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009.

Further requires the written report to include a detail plan on how to execute its recommendations and to identify and recommend procedures for the disbursal of public funds.

# HB 1631, HD2, SD2, CD1

HIGH TECHNOLOGY BUSINESS INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT. Requires the <u>Department of Taxation</u> to prepare and submit a report to the Legislature by October 31, 2007, summarizing the data submitted by qualified high technology businesses on form N-317 for all previous years available and to include a summary descriptive statistics regarding the nature of qualified research activities, job creation, and salaries paid by high technology businesses.

Further requires the Department to study the effectiveness of the tax credit and report on the amount of investment made into qualified high technology businesses, the number of qualified high technology business in each industry sector, jobs created, compensation levels, qualified research activities and report the results to the Legislature by December 1 of each year.

Act to be repealed on January 1, 2011.

## SCR 3, SD1

WATER SYSTEMS, PRIVATE, USED TO FURNISH WATER FOR AGRICULTURAL AND RESIDENTIAL PURPOSES. Requests the <u>Public Utilities Commission</u> to study the rate and fee structures of private entities statewide that furnish water used for agricultural purposes in areas zoned for agricultural use and to:

- (1) Perform an inventory of all privately owned water systems statewide that are used for agricultural purposes;
- (2) Examine the water rate structures established by the local county board of water supply;
- (3) Examine and distinguish between the rate and fee structures for privately owned water systems used for agricultural purposes and for residential purposes;
- (4) Determine the factors that distinguish the water rate for agricultural purposes and for residential purposes; and

  - (d) Urges swift conclusion of the Inter Governmental Authority on Development (IGAD) peace talks and indicates a willingness to support a fully comprehensive government / Sudan People's Liberation Army (SPLA) peace agreement; and
  - (e) Mandates a United Nations (UN) enforced No Fly Zone (NFZ) over Darfur for the purpose of protecting humanitarian assistance flights and preventing further air strikes against Darfur inhabitants;
- (2) To the <u>United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees</u>: ensure that refugees and internally displaced persons can return to their original villages and towns and coordinate international funding and assistance for their repatriation and resettlement:
- (3) To the <u>European Union</u>: sponsor and provide full logistical and personnel support, including both manpower and units, for the full implementation of a UNSC mandated NFZ over Darfur;
- (4) To the Government of Sudan:
  - (a) Commit to internationally facilitated political negotiations with the Darfur rebels, the initial aim of which would be an internationally monitored ceasefire;
  - (b) Order an immediate end to attacks by government forces and militias on civilians and civilian targets in Darfur;
  - (c) Submit to a UN NFZ over Darfur;
  - (d) Cease all assistance to the Janjaweed and other militias, begin a transparent peace process aimed at disarming them, and prosecute those who continue to attack civilians;

- (e) Order government security forces to protect civilians against armed groups;
- (f) Allow full humanitarian access to the affected populations for the delivery of emergency relief and reconstruction assistance and accept international observation of the use of that relief and assistance;
- (g) Ensure the safe return of villagers displaced by the conflict to their original locations and assist them in rebuilding their villages;
- (h) Negotiate establishment of a Neutral Resettlement and Claims Commission composed of representatives of the government, the Darfur rebels and civil society representatives known for their integrity, chaired by a UN representative, and with a mandate to:
  - (i) Record criminal complaints against groups or individuals for injuries, wrongful deaths, and material losses such as livestock and household and commercial goods looted;
  - (ii) Create mechanisms for restitution, compensation, and investigation of charges by victims; and
  - (iii) Collaborate with investigations by responsible 3rd parties such as the Civilian Protection Monitoring Team (CPMT) into violations of international law; and
- (i) Allow the CPMT to begin immediately investigating allegations of attacks against civilians in Darfur;
- (5) To the <u>Janjaweed Militia</u>: cease all attacks on civilian targets and respect international humanitarian law;
- (6) To the <u>SLA</u> (Sudan Liberation Army) and <u>JEM</u> (Justice Equality Movement):
  - (a) Commit to internationally facilitated political negotiations with the government, the initial aim of which would be an internationally monitored ceasefire; and
  - (b) Allow full humanitarian access to the affected populations for the delivery of emergency relief and reconstruction assistance; and
- (7) To the <u>SPLA</u> (Sudan's People's Liberation Army): accept the link between the two conflicts and help in efforts to promote a peaceful settlement in Darfur while negotiating in good faith the remaining issues at the IGAD peace talks.

WAIMEA VALLEY, OAHU, REPORT. Request the <u>Office of Hawaiian Affairs</u> to report to the Legislature at its earliest convenience on the status of the future operation and maintenance of Waimea Valley.

## HR 158, HD1

AIRCRAFT NOISE ABATEMENT. Urges the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to do everything within its authority to protect the public interest, health, and welfare by working with federal agencies to alleviate aircraft noise impacts on the general public and to immediately implement an aircraft noise abatement community master plan and program for the close and distant vicinities of Honolulu and Hilo International Airports, and subsequently for any qualified state airports as determined in the future.

Resolves that the Department develop comprehensive aircraft noise abatement rules, standards, and procedures to protect the public health, welfare, and quality of life in the close and distant vicinities of state-owned and operated airports including:

- (1) Identifying aircraft noise impact areas and designating aircraft noise abatement zones in the close and distant vicinities of each airport;
- (2) Establishing community noise equivalent levels for urban residential land uses with typical Hawaiian construction and cross ventilation, with reference to community reaction, including interference with speech and loss of sleep;
- (3) Establishing community noise equivalent levels for national and state landmarks and monuments and local public parks, with reference to community reaction, including disruption of the experience and enjoyment of the public resource;
- (4) Using single event noise levels instead of day plus night sound averaging to determine community noise level impacts;
- (5) Using a threshold noise level ten decibels below the numerical value of the community noise equivalent level for implementation of the aircraft noise standards; and
- (6) Recognizing unique geographic features in measurement plans for locations where community noise equivalent level monitoring is impractical, such as 45 decibel locations where aircraft noise is amplified by mountain slope walls.

Further resolves that the Department establish a process for verifying that tour helicopters operate in compliance with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Special Federal Aviation

Regulation (SFAR) No. 71, Special Operating Rules for Air Tour Operators in the State of Hawaii, Section 6(a) and (b).

Further resolves that the Department establish a "Fly Quiet" program that encourages aircraft owners and operators to use noise abatement procedures and promotes participatory compliance by monitoring aircraft noise in real time and grading performance with published scores in quarterly public adherence reports and consider establishing a nominal airport passenger ticket fee solely for furthering aircraft noise abatement.

Further resolves that the Department maintain in good and consistent operation the airport noise and operations monitoring system at Honolulu and Hilo International Airports, and any state airports determined in the future to be qualified for the airport noise and operations monitoring system, and that this monitoring system become more extensive and technically improved over time.

Further resolves that the Department request and work with the <u>FAA</u> and the <u>Air Traffic Control Center work shift supervisors</u> to accomplish noise abatement procedures to minimize aircraft noise impacts.

Further resolves that the Legislature requests that aircraft noise abatement procedures include:

- (1) Effective noise abatement departure profiles combined with preferential runway use selections and flight path techniques;
- (2) Effective noise abatement departure and arrival flight paths vectored over water; and
- (3) Effective minimum altitudes and climb and descent procedures for noise abatement.

Further resolves that the Department encourage and work with aircraft owners and operators and the military to accomplish the following:

- (1) Restrict the use of Stage II and noisy Stage III aircraft flights to daytime hours with night time noise abatement hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m., except in emergencies: and
- (2) Phase out use of Stage II and noisy Stage III aircraft with replacement by aircraft classes with lower noise level characteristics, including cleaner, quieter Stage IV aircraft technology.

Further resolves that the Department immediately convene for the purpose of aircraft noise abatement, an advisory committee for both Honolulu and Hilo International Airports comprising representatives of the following:

- (1) <u>Each affected community in the close and distant vicinities of both the Honolulu</u> and Hilo International Airports;
- (2) Each interested environmental organization;
- (3) The FAA's Air Traffic Control Center;
- (4) The FAA's Flight Standards District Office;
- (5) Each of the local commercial airlines;
- (6) Each local tour helicopter owner or operator;

- (7) The Airline Transport Association or similar air carrier association; and
- (8) The DOT's Airports Division.

Further resolves that the aircraft noise abatement advisory committee meaningfully participate in the development, acceptance, and implementation of a comprehensive aircraft noise abatement master plan, including aircraft noise abatement policies and objectives, assessment of aircraft noise impacts on close and distant areas surrounding the airport, and a compliance verification process to be reviewed quarterly.

Further resolves that the Department establish, in conjunction with the present aircraft noise complaint hotline, an aircraft noise abatement web site to provide for new levels of community awareness relative to airport and aircraft noise abatement operations.

Requests the Department to submit the aircraft noise abatement community master plan and program and any proposed legislation to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.

Resolves that the Legislature requests that aircraft operating procedures and air traffic patterns reduce and control the effect of aircraft noise impact on communities within the proximity of airports and aircraft flight paths to include, but not be limited to, the following:

- (1) Effective noise abatement departure profiles combined with preferential runway use selections and flight path techniques;
- (2) Effective noise abatement departure and arrival flight paths vectored over water; and
- (3) Effective noise abatement altitudes and climb and descent procedures for commercial jet aircraft.

Further requests the FAA to work with DOT to establish a process for recorded verification that tour helicopters operate in compliance with Special Federal Aviation Regulation (SFAR) 71, and Special Operating Rules for Air Tour Operators in the State of Hawaii, Section 6(a) and (b).

- (6) Projected changes in student test scores on national standardized exams; and

(7) Suggestions for establishing a research project at the University of Hawaii at Manoa College of Education to study the reasons why standardized test results may be affected by exposing students to the technology.

- (6) Make an earnest effort to identify other transportation options to fill the potential loss of less than container load interisland cargo service; and
- (7) Consider any other matters necessary to fully evaluate and develop solutions to Young Brothers' plans to discontinue its less than container load interisland cargo service.

Resolves that the Department submit its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2008.
