I am writing because I believe that downed animals could be prevented with better care and handling. I do believe these animals should be removed from market. A farmer would rather get money for a downed animal brought to market to be slaughtered, but I also believe a farmer should be responsible raising animals for slaughter to know that when an animal is sick, or injured that animal would not qualify for being slaughtered. That animal should be euthasized instead and the farmer should consider this a loss that sometimes happen. Not every animal ends up on the dinner table. There is an increased risk for bacterial infection and possible "Mad Cow Disease" with downed animals. I understand $90 \%$ of downed animals can be prevented, with better care and handling. It is time for the farmer that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration make into law Document 98P-0`51/CP1 to remove the market for downed animal.
