2	6	Would like to see the Forest Service have their whole toolbox back, e.g. if you only have a match, that is what you will use. Vegetation management.
2	6	FS to facilitate the productive use of thinning materials, such as stewardship contracts used on the Apache-Sitgreaves NF.

2	8	Would like to see more access to a diverse population.
2	8	Consideration should be given to historical cultures. ie: cowboy culture, pioneer culture.
2	8	Would like to see a discussion on separate socio-economic analyses that focuses on NK. Europeans and worldwide especially appreciate rural, Native American, pioneer cultures and land uses. Intense interest worldwide about Mormons, pioneers. Don't want to lose historic uses. Any population values ranching.
2	8	Concerned about areas fenced to keep people out; want to know what I can/cannot do.
2	8	People love the forest but feel they are being ignored. Can't understand FS information materials, care about what happens to the forest, feeling of oppression by gov't and FS. Felt oppressed/frustrated even before Warm Fire. Reinforced feelings already present--culture being extinguished.

2	8	Thought more people would be here, the fact that they aren't should tell us not to forget those folks. Don't forget your customers especially the Riches, your key customers.
2	8	Would like to feel welcomed.
2	8	Manage the forest for sustainability and quality of life.
2	8	Like a forest that can be used by grand kids, family.
2	8	Like camping wildlife scenery overlooks (Oak Creek, the Peaks, etc.)
2	8	Love the forest, it is where our lives are focused.

5	17	Need stronger fines and penalties for violations.
5	17	Don't have the staff to keep the lakes open year round. If you do not have the staff to protect from vandals why build the facilities.
5	17	It is a free for all without an LEO. District staff is not large enough to provide sufficient enforcement.
5	17	Have lost law enforcement that has local knowledge. Cooperation among agencies needed for law enforcement.

5	18	Want to see increased volunteer opportunities that include limbing, pruning, and piling.
5	18	Individual forest need to have a volunteer coordinator.
5	18	Concern over length of time to enact protection measures to ongoing natural resource damage, develop a process to utilize volunteers.
5	18	Game management, cooperation with Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation is very important.
