Mr. Miles, of South Carolina, introduced a bill for the arrest of soldiers absent from their commands without leave, and providing compensation for their captors. Ordered to be printed.
The following bills and resolutions were re-ferred; a bill relative to the transfer of troops and repealing a former act on the subject; resolutions of inquiry touching the losses of commissary stores in the evacuation of Nashville, Clarksville, Bowling Green, &c.; a resolution relative to the Emperor of the French, the resolution repeat-
ed and rescripts the language of the President's Mes-
sage on the subject of the French note, as far as it conveys the assurance of the friendship of this Government to France, &c., &c.
Resolutions were introduced on the subject of retaliation upon the enemy, upholding the policy of the Executive, &c., which were laid on the table, and the House went into secret session.

Transportation Notice.—OFFICE GEORGIA RELIEF AND HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION, AUGUSTA, Dec. 13, 1862.—By a late act of the Legislature, it is made the duty of this Association to employ every means within its power for FORWARDING PRIVATE PACKAGES OF CLOTHING or other necessities, intended for Georgia soldiers in any portion of the field of war; and to use all diligence for securing their reception by the parties to whom they may be addressed. I do, therefore, give notice that the Association will cheerfully undertake the discharge of this duty, and perform it to the best of its ability. We have already made arrangements for despatching regular and careful messengers, two or three times every week, whose office requires them to accompany the packages entrusted to their care until they are actually delivered into the hands of our Agents in Richmond. We have other employees who are similarly engaged in conveying goods to Chattanooga, intended for Georgians in the Army of the West. From Richmond and Chattanooga they will be distributed to the parties whose names they bear, by persons there employed for this purpose; or they will be stored in our warehouses in those cities until called for, if no means shall exist for transporting them further, or if the consignees cannot be found.
Entrust each package to the care of "Georgia Relief and Hospital Association," Augusta, and be careful to mark dis-
tinctly thereon the name of the party to whom it is to be sent, the Regiment to which he belongs, and the Company of which he was a member.
Packages will all be sent at the expense of the Association.
