Born: February 7, 1838 Green County, Ohio Died: August 20, 1901 Gueydan, Louisiana

MARGERY ANN (CALDWELL) McCOY

Born: February 19, 1846 Marcer County, Illinois

Died: December 8, 1910 Dallas, Texas

Margery Ann Caldwell and John W. McCoy were married on December 22, 1869. They were the parents of five children, including one set of twins. John was a truck farmer. He moved his family from Ohio to Kansas and then to Jennings, Louisiana. During the Civil War John served as a Sargent, Co. C. 36 Ill Inf. After John's death in 1901, Margery resided for the last three or four years of her life in Welsh, Louisiana at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Gertrude Lawson. She had a large circle of friends in Welsh. Margery died at the home of her son, Rev. R. C. McCoy, in Dallas, Texas, and her remains were sent to Jennings, Louisiana, for internment. John and Margery are buried in Greenwood Cemetery, Jennings, Louisiana, Section E, Block 60, Quarter F.

Tracing John W. McCoy

Enlisted at Young America, Wassen County, Illinois, on August 1, 1861, to serve 3 years in the 36th Regiment of Illinois Volunteers in the War of 1861 (Civil War) also known as the War of the Rebellion, as a Private in Company C, commanded by Captain E. B. Baldwin.

Mustered into service on August 23, 1861 at Camp Hammond.

November 25, 1863, Battle of Missionary Ridge near Chattanooga, Tennessee, John received a flesh wound in his right shoulder. He returned to duty Sept. 29.

On May 17, 1864, near Adairville, Georgia, while advancing in line of battle through a dense thicket of small pines his gun was accidentally discharged, wounding him in the left hand and taking away the third finger of the same. He didn't know how it was done unless it was by the branches striking the gun and causing it to go off. He received treatment in a hospital in Nashville (name and number unknown) and a hospital in Jeffersonville, Indiana May 25 – Sept. 28, 1864.

John W. McCoy fought in the battles of Pea Ridge, Perryville, Stone River, Chickamauga, Mission Ridge, and Resaca.

Honorably discharged at Springfield, Illinois, on October 6, 1864

Married Margery Ann Caldwell Dec. 22, 1864, North Henderson, Mercer County, Illinois, Rev. J. A. Edie presiding.

Resided mostly at or near Benton County, Iowa.

April 8, 1876, John W. McCoy, age 38, resident of Eugene, Ringold County, Iowa, he applied for an Invalid Army Pension, #217578. – granted \$2 monthly (at the time of his death this pension amounted to \$12 monthly).

At age 52 John was a farmer living in Bayneville, Kansas.

At age 53 lived in Tingley, Ringgold County, Iowa – applied for pension increase f or additional disabilities – hernia, and back pain.

John Died August 20, 1901 - parabiosis (fusion) of bowels caused from strangulated hernia.

Sept. 23, 1901 Margery A. McCoy 55, living in Gueydan, Louisiana, applied for widow's pension.

Witness signatures on Affidavits given for Margery McCoy were:

Sarah A. Caldwell 59, living in Wichita, Segwick County, Kansas (sister or in-law of Margery?)

Charles S. Caldwell 64, living in Wichita, Segwick County, Kansas (Margery's brother)

Mary E. Porter (related to Margery - a cousin I think)

Mrs. D. W. Rankin (Alice Olivia) living in Gueydan, Louisiana. (Our great grandmother on our mothers' side)

D. W. Rankin (David Wilmot) 54, living in Gueydan, Vermillion County, Louisiana. (Our great grandfather on mothers' side)

Margery A. McCoy was granted a widows pension of \$12 a month until she died on December 8, 1910.

January 1920 Robert C. McCoy wrote the Commissioner of Pensions concerning the eligibility of his sister, Mary Leota McCoy, deaf since the age of 13 and blind since the age of 39. Her eyes had been removed when she was 43.

February 1920 – under existing laws there was not available pension, but there was a bill pending in Congress that, if passed, could possibly have provisions covering her.

November 17, 1920 Mrs. Robert C. McCoy again wrote the Commissioner stating that Leota had been completely dependant since the age of 13 and asking for further consideration.

November 24, 1920 - request denied

September 18, 1922 – under Special Act, a pension in the amount of \$20 a month was granted to Mary Leota McCoy through a duly appointed guardian.

December 27, 1922, Emma F. (McCoy) Huff, Leotas' sister, living in Mutual, county of Woodward, Oklahoma, was appointed Guardian of Mary Leota McCoy. Emma had to file a report biennially with a county judge accounting for Leotas' pension.

December 13, 1936 Mary Leota McCoy died.
