## MCDONALD JAMERSON (NO. 24)

(Jemmerson, Jimmerson, Jamieson)

McDonald Jamerson, son of William and Nancy Jimerson (#48 & #49), was born in 1836, probably on his father's plantation in what is now Upson County, Georgia. This plantation was probably on John B. Gordon Road, 4 2/10 miles south of Thomaston, Georgia on Highway 19, 2 9/10 miles off Highway 19 south, near where Good Hope Cemetery is located.

The census of 1850 shows him as 14 years old living with his father, William Jimmerson (#48), who was 77 years old at that time. He is mentioned in his father's Will which was dated January 6, 1851.

He was married to Julia Cox, in Upson County, Georgia on January 12, 1860. The marriage was performed by B. G McKinney, J. P., and they had a son born in 1860 (see Dr. Andrew McDonald Jamerson #12). It is not known if there were other children. THE 1880 CENSUS SHOWS A MACK TIMMERSON KAMED AS "BROTHER" LIVING WITH ANDREW M. JAMERSON JULIS WIFE NETTIE.

He enlisted in the Army of the Confederacy on May 15, 1862, at Cornish,

He enlisted in the Army of the Confederacy on May 15, 1862, at Cornish, Mississippi, as a private in Company "B", 2nd Battalion of the Georgia Sharpshooters. This company was organized in the spring of 1862 and made up largely of members of Company "K", 5th Georgia Regiment. The Officers were:

Brown, W. H. - Captain Vining, F. J. - First Lieutenant Sandwich, W. O. - Second Lieutenant Cauther, B. F. - Third Lieutenant

His Army records show the spelling of his last name in several ways: Jemmerson, Jamieson and Jamerson. He was killed in action during the battle near Murfreesboro, Tennessee, on December 31, 1862, at the age of 26. He appears on a list of killed and wounded of Jackson's Brigade, Army of Tennessee dated at Chattanooga, Tennessee, January 12, 1863.

## **JULIA COX JAMERSON (NO. 25)**

Julia Cox Jamerson, wife of Mcdonald Jamerson (#24), applied for a Confederate Widow's Pension on March 17, 1863, showing her husband as having been in Cox's Battalion, 2nd Georgia Sharpshooters. After the death of her husband in the Civil War, she married again to William Slaughter on September 17, 1873, performed by the Rev. John W. Atwater, in Upson County, Georgia.
