our battery after being finally equiped broke camp Sept 9th 62 at Camp Douglas and started for Louisville from there to Bowling Green and went into Camp.

Capt Stokes wired ROSECRANS AT Nashville for permission to get to the front Request granted the Cannoneers were furnished with muskets and marched to Nashville with out escort it was rather a daring Exploit—and Rosecrans complimented the Battery very highly on Dec. 20, 1862 the Battery was attached to the pioneer Brigade an organization formed of 2 men from each company of the Army of the Cumberland under command of Capt St. Clair Morton on Dec. 26

62 we started on our march fron Nashville and met Brags army at stone River this was my first Battle the world knows the history of that Battle. Our Battery was kept in reserve 2 hours or more after the engagement began. It would be impossible for me to describe my feelings during this interval the roaring of cannon the rattle of musketry and the rapier movements of troops into position made the suspense dreadfull, Finally old Rosey appeared

on the scene and ordered our command into action this was somewhat of a relief to me and yet I didnt relish the Idea of going up to the front to be shot at. Now for the first time our Battery was under fire. My position was No. one on the Gun and after we got in to position and commenced firing I had no further fear of being shot as it took all my time and attention to load and sponge out the gun The order was to Load and fired will with terrible effect as the enemy fell within 30 yards of our guns and although many comrades fell dead and wounded all around me was I was so completely exausted that I did not realize my position or care anything about Bullets whistling over my head ? the Battle contued with unstaled fury until darkness compelled both Armys to cease firing and under the cover of darkness we buried our dead, and slept or rested that night on the frozen corn field and renewed the conflict on the early morn of the new Year Jan 1st 63 about 4 p m while in the act of loading the Guns I was hit in the abdomen with a spent ball. I fell forward to the ground I heard the Lieut say another man gone and I thought so myself for I was in great pain and at the time I was taken to the field hospital by comrades I thought I was shot through the body, while I was waiting myturn for examination I took Courage and thought I had better examine the wound myself. I did so and to my great surprise found the bullet in my clother and lonly a flesh wound I applied some salve to the wound and immediately returned to the Battery and assumed my position on teh Gun, that evening while changing position on the field I was sitting on the ammunition chest of the Guns when the wheel struck a stump and threw me up into the air it would take to much time and space to tell all my thoughts while in mid air sufice it to say I did not think that I would ever get down to the Earth alive but fortunately I hit on my feet and recognized the

voice of one of our postillions I yelled to him he recognized my voice and the 3 stopped, I mounted one of the Guns, got in to position on our left and spent another night on the field of Stone River Jan 3/63 Have had continuous fighting all day and every reader of our history knows how desperate Gen Bragg fought to hold Murfreesboro but without avail as on the night of Jan 3/63 he evacuated Murfreesboro and ended the Battle of Stone River with our knowledge the fowling dispatch was sent to Chicago Nashville Tenn Jan 3 1863 Murray " Nelson and Co. Chicago Murfreesbor is ours Terific fighting Friday no more casual ties in the Battery it has won Glorious Distinction. Battery remained in camp at Murfrreesboro Tenn from Jan 6 to June 23/63 the only notable event during our encampment was the changing of our Battery from field to horse Artillery and attached to the 2nd Division of Cavalry Army of the Cumberland commanded by Brig Gen John B. Turchin and were the only Battery of flying Artillery in the western Armies. June 24/63 broke camp and advanced with the Army through tullahoma and winchester to McMinnville and Pikesville crossing the Tennessee river on the left of the army and at Ringold Ga fired the first gun which opened the Battle of Chickamauga Sept 19th/63 from Sept 23 to Oct the 1st the Battery with the 2nd Division of Cavalry and in Brig Gen George Crook was guarding fords above Chattanooga on the 1st the Rebel Gen Wheeler crossed at Washington 40 miles above with 6000 men 2 othe columns were preparing to cross below one at bellfonte the other at countland Ala. intending to form a junction with Gen. Wheeler on Oct 3 we decended the Cumberland Mountains
