

## Title 14 CFR Section 91.417 Maintenance Records

The owner or operator shall present Form 337 upon the request of any law enforcement officer. When a fuel tank is installed within the passenger compartment or a baggage compartment, the owner or operator shall keep a copy of the FAA Form 337 on board the modified aircraft.

## Aircraft Identification

Aircraft Registration or “Tail Number”

U.S. tail numbers begin with the letter “N”

U.S. tail numbers are five or less digits in length following the “N” (letters I and O are not used, to avoid confusion with numbers).



## Aircraft Data Plate

Are required to be affixed to the air frame

Contain aircraft make, model, and serial number information.

- *United States Code (USC)*: The United States Code is the codification by subject matter of the general and permanent laws of the United States based on what is printed in the Statutes at Large.
- *Code of Federal Regulations (CFR)*: The Code of Federal Regulations is the codification of

the general and permanent rules published in the Federal Register by the executive departments and agencies of the Federal Government.

- *Federal Aviation Regulations (FAR)*: The Federal Aviation Regulations are rules prescribed by FAA governing all aviation activities in the United States. The FARs are part of the Code of Federal Regulations.

## Drug Enforcement Assistance Act of 1988

Directs the FAA to provide assistance to Law Enforcement agencies in the enforcement of Laws relating to the Regulation of Controlled Substances.

## LEAP Mission Statement

### Title 49 United States Code:

44710B(1) Convicted of drug offense, an aircraft was used, and served as an airman or was on board the aircraft.

44710B(2) “No conviction,” “If the administrator finds that the individual carried out the activity, A/C was used, & individual served as an airman, or was on board the aircraft in connection with the activity.”

### Title 14, CFR 67.403 Falsification of Applications

Question 18V & W.

Conviction and/or Administrative History – See Instructions Page

Letter (V) of this subheading ask if you have had (1) any conviction(s) involving driving while intoxicated by, while impaired by, or while under the influence of alcohol or a drug; or (2) history of any conviction(s) or administrative action(s) involving an offense(s) which resulted in the denial, suspension, cancellation, or revocation of driving privileges or which resulted in attendance at an educational or a rehabilitation program.

Letter (W) of this subheading asks if you have ever had any other (nontraffic) convictions (e.g., assault, battery, public intoxication, robbery, etc.) If so, name the charge for which you were convicted and the date of the conviction in the EXPLANATIONS box.

### History of nontraffic conviction(s) (misdemeanors or felonies)

## TEMPORARY AIRMAN CERTIFICATE

Expires 120 days from date of issuance.

Issued by Flight Standards District Office when obtaining a new certificate or changes are being made to a previous certificate.



## Student Pilot Certificate

Medical Certificate/Student Pilot Certificate is Yellow in color and begins with two alpha characters (currently FF).

## Title 14 CFR Section 61.3 Certificate Requirements

Requires physical possession of airman’s certificate or readily accessible in aircraft.

Requires photo identification in conjunction with airman’s certificate. Must be valid state drivers license, government ID card (Federal or State), Military ID, Passport, Valid Airport ID authorizing unescorted access to secure areas of airports.

## Title 14 CFR Section 61.51 PRESENTATION OF LOGBOOK

A pilot must present his logbook for inspection upon reasonable request by the Administrator, authorized representative of the NTSB, or any *Federal, State or local law enforcement officer.*

## Certificate of Aircraft Registration

Aircraft are required to have one of the below items on board during operation Aircraft Registration Certificate, Dealer’s Aircraft Registration Certificate, Aircraft Registration Application (Pink Slip), or a telex certificate (wire) from the FAA.
