

IMPACT TO FEDERAL AGENCY RECORDS

Federal Agencies Fared Okay Overall

Examples:

- FBI "Records SWAT Team" captured their records early
- Finance Center had some 15,000 cf damaged (now at NARA)
- US Corps of Engineers had some records damaged
- Social Security Administration lost some records

What Worked (Agencies)?...

Federal Agencies Went to COOP Sites and Were Back in Business Quickly

- Most Federal Agencies had Disaster Plans (and tested them)
- Updated their Websites (very helpful)
- Worked well with Headquarters, NARA, Press, etc. (good communication)

What Worked (Agencies)?...

- Some agencies moved records away from harm:
 - Up state
 - To more secure buildings or off the first floor or off the top floor (NASA and VA)
 - Away from windows
 - Clean desk policies
 - Backed up data and moved offsite

WHAT DIDN'T WORK **FOR FEDERAL AGENCIES?**


What Didn't Work (Agencies)?...

- Some tried to dry out their own records for weeks and even months
- Some stored back up data (tapes) with nearby data storage companies
- Some found that they needed more information at their COOP site (want to digitize records in future)
- SF-135's (transmittal of records sent to FRC's) don't keep them with the records. One agency had thousands of boxes damaged – including the SF-135's – so it was difficult to figure out what they had. Now they scan them.
- Only keep needed records onsite and move inactive but needed records offsite.

What Worked (NARA)?...

- Post Katrina we quickly developed close relationship with FEMA and GSA – and it continues to this day. "FEMA now says that they have discovered records and understand that they are important."
- Increased contacts with Federal Executive Boards in Region (share information – meet with them at least once a year)
- Developed closer relationship with Document Recovery Companies (terrific source of information)
- Numerous telecons sometimes with the White House kept us focused
- Developed spreadsheets (23 pages long) that summarized the situation at all Federal agency locations. Later expanded to include state and local. GSA was helpful – since they also tracked the condition of the buildings.


What Didn't Work (NARA)?...

- Really needed more information on our Federal agencies, i.e., address, POC, telephone numbers (including alternate numbers), e-mail addresses
- Often NARA didn't know what records the agencies had at a given location, i.e., permanent, vital, computer information, etc.

MEANWHILE... STATE & LOCAL RECORDS AND THE ORLEANS PARISH RECORDS RECOVERY

- Not Under NARA's Responsibility but....
 - NARA took on FEMA Mission Assignment to help Orleans Parish (Coroner's Office; District Attorney; and Clerk of the Criminal Court)
 - 5 Truck Loads of Wet and Moldy Records Vacuum Dried
 - NARA committed 4 staff members to 18 staff days in Orleans Parish





Wet, moldy records on the floor. Paths had to be cleared to start work.



Wet or damp and very moldy records everywhere



Records were often found in heaps



Contractor pulls records from Courthouse for triage.



Computer records were also salvaged in this project



WHAT IS NARA-SOUTHWEST **REGION** (FORT WORTH) **DOING** TO HELP?

- 1.4 million cubic feet of records of Federal agencies in Region
- 100 Federal agencies store records here
- We have moved to a new facility in Fort Worth 205,000 s.f.



- Electronic Records Storage Vault (ERV) for media storage (backup tapes, tape rotation, etc.)
- Environmental monitoring
- FM200 Fire Suppression System
- Secure (each item is tracked)





(Scanning Federal Agency records – New Service)



- One of the 1st scanning locations for NARA in the Regions
- DOE, DOJ, Indian Tribes, NAVY, Courts, etc.
- New facility has a large, well-equipped 2,000 s.f. lab

(Shredding Computer Records – New Service)

- All records e-mail, historical, etc. (how long to keep, etc.)
