CALIFORNIA FIELD CROP ACREAGE REPORT

SACRAMENTO -- The USDA, NASS, California Field Office today released the field crop acreage estimates for 2005, showing the following changes from the 2004 acreage.

COTTON: California's cotton growers planted 500 thousand acres of <u>Upland</u> cotton and 230 thousand acres of <u>American Pima</u> cotton in 2005. Upland acreage is down 11 percent, while American Pima acreage is up 7 percent from 2004.

CORN: As of June 1, total planted acreage of corn for all purposes is estimated at 570 thousand, a 6 percent increase over last year. California farmers expected to harvest 165 thousand acres of corn for grain in 2005, 10 percent above 2004

OATS: Oats were seeded on 280 thousand acres for 2005, up 17 percent from 2004. Acreage expected to be harvested for grain totaled 20.0 thousand acres, 20 percent below 2004

WHEAT: California's <u>Durum</u> wheat planted acreage is estimated at 80.0 thousand acres, 33 percent below last year. The 73.0 thousand acres for <u>grain</u> harvest are down 27 percent from 2004. California's seeded <u>Wheat other than Durum</u> acreage is 485 thousand acres, down 13 percent from 2004.

RICE: California's seeded rice acreage is estimated at 521 thousand acres, 12 percent below last year. The acreage planted to <u>long</u> grain rice totaled 7.00 thousand acres, unchanged from 2004. Planted acreage of <u>medium</u> grain rice decreased 13 percent from last year to 470 thousand acres, while acreage planted to <u>short</u> grain rice decreased 8 percent from 2004 to 44.0 thousand acres.

BARLEY: In California, an estimated 100 thousand acres were seeded to barley for all purposes this year, down 9 percent from 2004. A total of 65.0 thousand acres is expected to be harvested for grain, 13 percent below last year.

SUGAR BEETS: California growers have planted and intended to plant 47.0 thousand acres to sugar beets, down 5 percent from last year's total planted acreage.

DRY EDIBLE BEANS: An estimated 60.0 thousand acres in California were seeded to dry edible beans for the 2005 season, unchanged from last year's total.

SAFFLOWER: California safflower growers planted 45.0 thousand acres in 2005. This is the first year safflower acreage has been published for California.

ALL HAY: On June 1, California growers expected to harvest 1.54 million acres of <u>all hay</u> in 2005, down 1 percent from 2004. Of the total, <u>alfalfa</u> is expected to be harvested from 1.02 million acres, 3 percent below last year. All <u>other hay</u> is estimated to be harvested on 520 thousand acres, up 4 percent from last year's total.
