DECEMBER FRUIT COMMENTS

Seasonal cultural activities such as pruning, grafting, cultivating, and dormant spraying continued in orchards and vineyards. Some older variety trees and vines have been removed in preparation for planting replacements. Brush was shredded and disced, or piled for removal. Harvest of table grapes intended for fresh consumption was nearly completed by mid-December. Persimmons and Wonderful variety pomegranates were picked. Walnuts were delivered to drying facilities. A few pecans were harvested in the San Joaquin Valley. Picking of Navel oranges continued throughout December, with approximately 20 percent of the crop harvested by month's end. Cool evening temperatures during late December helped with fruit coloration. Pummelo and Oroblanco grapefruit harvests were active in the desert with overall quality reported as very good. Picking of lemons was active in the desert, central valley, and south coast areas. Quality was reported as very good with normal shaped fruit. Harvest of Satsumas, Mineolas, and Fairchilds was active during December. Fruit size was reported as larger than normal, and quality was also reported to be very good.

FLORIDA CITRUS

Florida's Citrus Belt was very dry during December and rain is needed in all Growers irrigated to maintain good tree and fruit condition. areas. Temperatures the first half of the month were warm and above normal, but then the last ten days of the month were cool with a few cold nights in the low 40's. The early and mid-season fruits are generally well colored on the trees. Some tangerines are so brightly colored on the trees that they only need to be washed before packing. Harvesting crews have been very active moving large quantities of early and mid-season oranges to the processors. Fresh fruit packing houses worked long hours up until the weekend before Christmas to try to fill most of their orders. Caretakers were busy during the month mowing, chopping, and discing cover crops for fire protection prior to harvest. Growers are continuing to push and burn their dead trees. Due to the unseasonably warm temperatures during December, some of the cleanup sprays have been applied to a few of the mid and late season fresh crops. A few young tree groves in the northern part of the citrus belt have been banked for cold protection. Heaters have been placed and fueled in some of the coldest locations.

The Raisin Industry Diversion Program (RID) had zero acreage enrolled for 2000, but 41,000 acres were enrolled for 2001.

Forecast carried forward from June 2001.

Grapefruit -- 33.5 lbs. per carton; Lemons -- 38.0 lbs. per carton; Oranges and Tangerines -- 37.5 lbs. per carton.

Oranges - The 2001-02 California Navel orange forecast is 64.0 million cartons, unchanged from October, but 11 percent below last season's crop. Harvest of the Navel orange crop is continuing with approximately 20 percent of the crop harvested by January 1. Late in 2001, cool evening temperatures helped with fruit coloration. Fruit sizes are reported to be greater than last year, and may be the largest on record since the 1984-85 season. The 2001-02 Valencia orange forecast is 44.0 million cartons, unchanged from October, but 4 percent below last season's crop.

Grapefruit - The 2001-02 California grapefruit forecast is estimated at 12.4 million cartons, up 3 percent from October, but down 5 percent from last year. Pummelo and Oroblanco grapefruit harvests are active in the desert with overall quality reported as very good.

Lemons - The 2001-02 California lemon forecast is 44.0 million cartons, down 4 percent from October and 3 percent below last year. The season is progressing with no major problems to date. Harvest is active in the desert and the Central Valley with very good quality reported.

Tangerines - The 2001-02 California tangerine crop is forecast at 4.60 million cartons, down 8 percent from October, but up 10 percent from last year. Harvest of Satsumas is nearly done, while harvest of Mineolas and Fairchilds remain active. Harvest of Mandarins is expected to begin in February. Fruit size is reported as larger than normal. Quality is also reported to be very good.
