Helping Veterans Through Creative Arts – Maureen Harvey, Creative Arts Therapist Oklahoma City VA Medical Center 2006 Shirley Jefferies Memorial Award Recipient

What does selling swimming pool supplies, arranging display cases in clothing stores, selling sewing notions and zippers, making study furniture for mental institutions

and working as a civilian logistician for the U.S. Air Force have in common? Simple - they are all part of Maureen Harvey's career path prior to her 1997 decision to join VA and serve veterans. As this year's Shirley Jefferies Memorial Award recipient, we are all glad she made that decision.

"Maureen did her internship here and fell in love with VA," said Kristy Doyle, her supervi-

sor at the Oklahoma City VA Medical Center where she has works as a creative arts therapist. "She developed art therapy programs with groups that include acute psychiatry, substance abuse, the day treatment center and the extended care unit. Along the way, she heard about the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival and started the local contest here.

According to husband Scot, "Maureen was fortunate enough to do her internship at the VA Medical Center and everything just clicked. People could sense her deep concern about the well-being of this country's veterans and her desire to do something about it. Her own memories of how the Vietnam War affected her friends increased her resolve to heal those around her."

Harvey earned her fine arts degree from the University of Houston and later received her master's from the University of Oklahoma. After attending the National Festival as a team leader for several years, she was determined the Oklahoma City facility could host the Festival, which it did successfully in 2003. According to Doyle, Harvey was the driving force behind getting the event there, serving as the host site coordinator with distinction.

Besides being active in art therapy at the VA Medical Center, Harvey is often a guest speaker at conferences and works with several special groups. Locally, she continues to plan and implement the facility's creative arts competition and attends the National Festival as a team leader. (This week she worked with performing arts Team VI – Sturgis.) In addition, she has also represented VA's national rehabilitation special events at two American Legion Auxiliary national conventions. Known for being an active energetic and passionate advocate for veterans and for the creative arts, Harvey's philosophy matches that of the late Shirley Jefferies, for whom the annual memorial award is named. Festival Director Liz Mackey is just one member of the choir singing Harvey's praises. "Maureen's creative talents and warm way with people are perfectly suited for her chosen career in art therapy," Mackey said. "Her enthusiasm, sense of humor and genuine interest in making a positive difference draw others in and make them feel right at home. The creative arts and recreation therapists who annually review the Shirley Jefferies Award candidates selected Maureen unanimously. Congratulations Maureen!"

The Shirley Jefferies Memorial Award

Shirley Jefferies was a recreation therapist and former chief of recreation therapy service at the Knoxville, Iowa VA Medical Center. She served as Advisor to the National Veterans Creative Arts Competition and Festival until she died of cancer in 1994. Jefferies was a vital influence to the beginning of the program and the drive behind many of its changes and growth. With a heartfelt love for the arts and their therapeutic value in life, Jefferies made a lasting impact on many veterans as well as staff members who became involved with the event.

The Shirley Jefferies Memorial Award began in 1994. Each year, it is presented to an individual who demonstrates true dedication to the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival, its goals and philosophy. By recognizing an individual who has displayed such dedication, we are able to pay tribute to Shirley Jefferies each year, while carrying on the therapeutic message she wished to convey.


