



REPORT OF THE GUARDIAN AD LITEM

COMES NOW Edith Kawai, court-appointed guardian ad litem herein, and hereby submits the following report to this Court.

On the day of the last review hearing, March 30, 1995, I was able to visit the Kema home in the company of [REDACTED]. We found [REDACTED] to be quite animated, happy, and totally at ease. They spoke very freely. We played games and visited rather noisily while also carrying on a conversation with Jaylin and Peter Kema. Also present at that time was Peter's brother. The visit was very pleasant. I hope that Jaylin and Peter were able to see that there were no ulterior motives in the visit.

[REDACTED] were returned home shortly after the school year closed in June. [REDACTED] have joined their younger brother, Peter, [REDACTED]

The family lives in the Nanawale Estates area which is located near Pahoa. The home is a three-bedroom, ranch-style house. There is more than enough room to accommodate all of [REDACTED] and parents comfortably in the home. [REDACTED] share one bedroom while Peter and [REDACTED] share the other. The rooms are filled with toys and kids' gear. It's clear that [REDACTED] are able to play freely in the home and that they have really settled in.

I have made one visit to the family home since the [redacted] return. During that visit, [redacted] of the [redacted] were taking afternoon naps. The house was very warm and [redacted] were sleeping very deeply. [redacted] was very busy playing all by herself while the other snoozed.

Peter, Sr. and Jaylin were using the childrens' nap time to their benefit by working on the family car. When I arrived, Jaylin was under the front end of the car and Peter was dealing with some chaos under the hood. Jaylin has said that she has been working on cars for some time with Peter.

I asked Jaylin about school forecasts for [redacted] [redacted] are registered to attend the elementary school at Pahoa this coming Fall. She has requested that Kahakai Elementary send [redacted] records as soon as possible. Jaylin expects that classroom and teacher assignments will be published by August 24, 1995. All seems to be ready for the Fall. In the meantime, [redacted] are staying at home for the summer. [redacted] were not yet returned when sign-ups for summer programs were available. The family takes walks in the area or goes to the park just down the road for outings.

[redacted] have friends in the area. It's rather hard to believe that there are people in the area because Nanawale Estates is very thickly wooded. Nonetheless, the [redacted] have found friends in a couple of different directions within close walkin distance from the house.

Some concerns have been raised regarding visitation again. [redacted] contacted me regarding visits. She said that she'd tried to set something up but wasn't getting cooperation from Jaylin. She also stated that they hadn't heard from [redacted] by phone either for several weeks. I raised this issue with Jaylin during my visit. [redacted] have a right to visit. I am fully aware that [redacted] need to settle in now but they need to be able to visit and talk story with [redacted]. They lived with [redacted] for almost four years. It would not be in their best interests to cut off contact or to make contact difficult.

I do not believe that the guardian ad litem, the worker, and attorneys should not have to become involved at this juncture on the issue of visitation. We have beaten this horse to death!! Dr. Barthel has worked on this issue with the Kemas and [redacted]. Each side has professed that visitation is in the best interests of [redacted]. And then there are hang ups, calls left unreturned, answering machine woes. I would like to see smooth and easy communication for [redacted] with [redacted]. I would [redacted] and dad reminding [redacted] that it's talk

story time with [REDACTED]. I would like to see straight communication about visitation. "Yes, this weekend's ok." "No, we have other plans then."

I believe that this family is well on its way to success. There have been many, many changes in the past four years. There have been no end of trouble and challenges. Although there have been difficulties between the adults, they have all worked for the best interests of [REDACTED]. There has been a concerted effort which has put this family back together. [REDACTED] provided a safe haven for [REDACTED]. The Kemas have struggled with living arrangements, no work, house changes, and much, much more. I believe that this situation could very easily have taken a very different direction had it not been for the joint efforts of both [REDACTED] and the parents. They have all gained by their efforts. The family is intact.

I would support family supervision to continue for Peter, Jr. I would support revocation of foster custody for [REDACTED] with a change to family supervision. I would look forward to a stipulation in late September or early October, revocation of family supervision and termination of court jurisdiction.



I spoke with [REDACTED] today regarding the current state of visitation and contact between [REDACTED] and the [REDACTED] Kema children. As [REDACTED] discussed with you and Edith, Jaylin and Peter Kema are resorting to the same acts of preventing [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] from seeing or speaking with each other. [REDACTED] has told [REDACTED] that Jaylin instructs him not to answer the phone when it rings, and to let the calls be picked up by the answering machine. On the other hand, she has told my clients on a number of occasions that they are simply not home to answer the telephone calls. The only time that Jaylin has returned a telephone call to my client is after you get involved.

[REDACTED] has also told [REDACTED] that [REDACTED] mother does not allow [REDACTED] to use the phone to call [REDACTED] because the phone is owned by [REDACTED] mother. 

I am writing this letter in lieu of a report at this time. It is my plan to submit this brief letter to the Court at the hearing on March 30, 1995. Further, for the reasons stated below, I will not submit a report to the Court until I have been permitted to visit with Peter Kema, Jr. in the family home and until I have been provided information as to other care givers for Peter.

I have made several attempts to visit Peter, Jr. both prior to this review hearing and prior to the last review hearing. Just this last week, I called and left a message requesting an arrangement for a visit at the Kema home. Jaylin returned my call. She indicated to me that her day, this last Friday, March 24th, was too full. She said that Peter Boy would be at preschool all day until at least 4 or 4:30 p.m. I had not been aware that he was in preschool. I asked for the name of the preschool. She said that it was the Puuloa Preschool. I indicated that I would go by the preschool.


After my conversation with Jaylin, I attempted to contact the preschool. My secretary and I both made several calls both to directory assistance and to the case worker on this issue. We were only able to discover that there is a Puula Congregational Church -- not a preschool -- in Nanawale Estates. We called the church several times without answer. I then left a message (on the machine) at the Kema home requesting immediate information on the school and a contact person. Jaylin called after hours and left a message on my machine that she must have been mistaken stating now that Peter was going to be at a sitter's house. She did not leave the sitter's name or other contact information. She said that I could call if I had questions.

When I came in the next morning, I called the Kema house but was only able to leave a message on their recorder. I asked that my call be returned and that information regarding the babysitter, telephone number and the like be provided immediately. I have not received a call either from Jaylin or from Peter.

I am most concerned and perturbed at what is very clearly a lie. In my conversation with Jaylin, I asked enough questions regarding the school and times when we might meet for her to have provided me with correct information. This situation leads me to believe that she intentionally misled me this last week and that she also set up a situation at the time of my attempts to visit to prevent my from visiting the home.

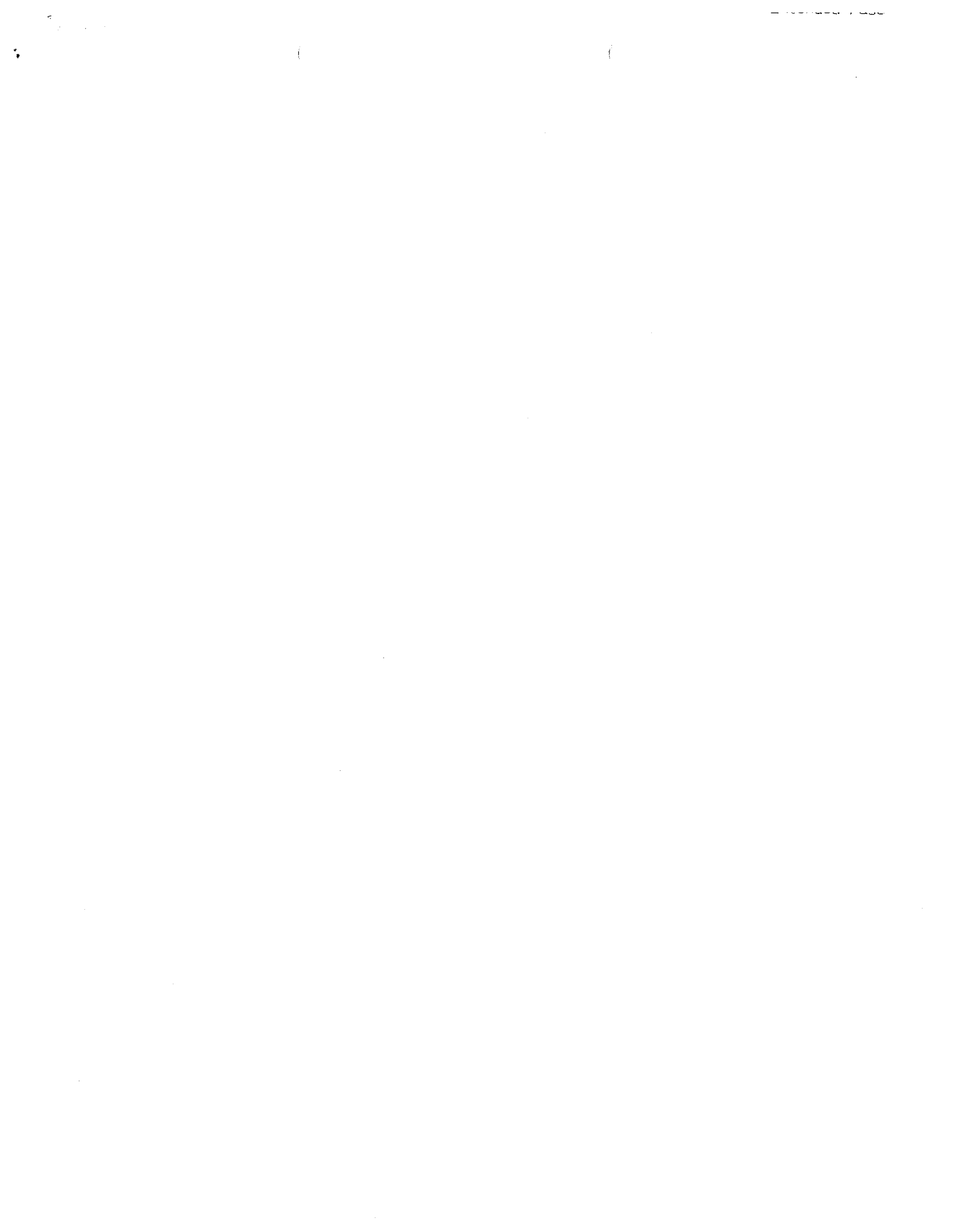

I am writing this letter in lieu of a report at this time. It is my plan to submit this brief letter to the Court at the hearing on March 30, 1995. Further, for the reasons stated below, I will not submit a report to the Court until I have been permitted to visit with Peter Kema, Jr. in the family home and until I have been provided information as to other care givers for Peter.

I have made several attempts to visit Peter, Jr. both prior to this review hearing and prior to the last review hearing. Just this last week, I called and left a message requesting an arrangement for a visit at the Kema home. Jaylin returned my call. She indicated to me that her day, this last Friday, March 24th, was too full. She said that Peter Boy would be at preschool all day until at least 4 or 4:30 p.m. I had not been aware that he was in preschool. I asked for the name of the preschool. She said that it was the Puuloa Preschool. I indicated that I would go by the preschool.


After my conversation with Jaylin, I attempted to contact the preschool. My secretary and I both made several calls both to directory assistance and to the case worker on this issue. We were only able to discover that there is a Puula Congregational Church -- not a preschool -- in Nanawale Estates. We called the church several times without answer. I then left a message (on the machine) at the Kema home requesting immediate information on the school and a contact person. Jaylin called after hours and left a message on my machine that she must have been mistaken stating now that Peter was going to be at a sitter's house. She did not leave the sitter's name or other contact information. She said that I could call if I had questions.

When I came in the next morning, I called the Kema house but was only able to leave a message on their recorder. I asked that my call be returned and that information regarding the babysitter, telephone number and the like be provided immediately. I have not received a call either from Jaylin or from Peter.

I am most concerned and perturbed at what is very clearly a lie. In my conversation with Jaylin, I asked enough questions regarding the school and times when we might meet for her to have provided me with correct information. This situation leads me to believe that she intentionally misled me this last week and that she also set up a situation at the time of my attempts to visit to prevent my from visiting the home.

I have had an opportunity to discuss this matter with Kris LaGuire and with [REDACTED]. Simply put, I will present this letter to Judge Gaddis and inform him that I am not able to submit a report because of the situation described hereinabove. I will not be able to submit a report until such time as Jaylin, or Peter, are willing to permit a visit. I would suggest that [REDACTED] might like to accompany me at that time.



As you know, I began working with Jaylin and Peter Kema and [REDACTED] back in January, providing "ohana"/family psychotherapy in order to assess and hopefully assist in the transition of [REDACTED] back to the Kema home. At this point, between early January and now, we have met together five times for a total of 11.25 hours. We are gradually making progress: everyone rates the sessions as worthwhile and as helpful in achieving more comfortable visitations and communications.

In your request for wrap-around funds, dated October 28, 1994, you asked for three months of therapy for a total of \$1440.00; your request was approved. Now the three months have elapsed. At this point, I plan to leave the island for a seven month absence in mid-May. This leaves about 8 weeks during which continued family therapy can occur.

I strongly recommend that we continue in the counseling mode, in order to maximize what we have accomplished. In order to provide optimum services, I would urge you to request additional wrap-around funds between now and mid-May (i. e., two months). Using the rate you requested previously, you would need to ask for an additional \$960.00.

Thank you for all of your help and support in this rather complicated, emotionally-laden situation.

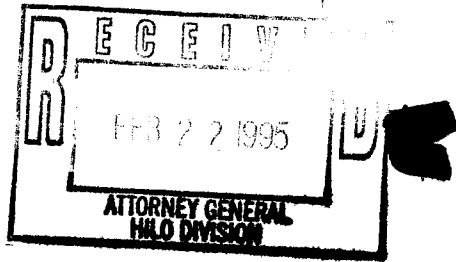





**JUSTIFICATION:**

[REDACTED] and Peter Jr. have lived outside of the family home for over three years. On July 25, 1994, Peter Jr. was removed from the home of his [REDACTED] and returned to the family home. At the point of Peter Jr.'s return to the family home, communication was to be maintained between the parents and [REDACTED] i.e., telephone calls, visitations, etc. in order to maintain the relationship between Peter Jr. and [REDACTED] as well as with [REDACTED] who remained in [REDACTED] home. At the same time, the parents engaged in services with Sonny Kinney with the intention of Ho'oponopono taking place between themselves and [REDACTED] prior to the planned return of [REDACTED] during the 1994 Christmas holidays. Communication has broken down and Mr. Kinney has not been available to work with the parents on a consistent basis.

The parents have counselled with Dr. Barthel for many years, and both they and Dr. Barthel are willing to work intensively during the months of November, December and January in order to restore communication between both families with the goal of transitioning [REDACTED] back into the family home at the earliest date feasible, hopefully semester break at the end of January, 1995. Dr. Barthel is available to provide these services only through the end of January, 1995. (Dr. Barthel will be out of the State of Hawaii from approximately February 1 through May 31, 1995) This social worker has contacted [REDACTED] attorney, Peter Kubota, and Mr. Kubota will facilitate the preparation of his clients for these "Extended Family Counselling Sessions."

These counselling sessions are meant to facilitate the transition and return of [REDACTED] to the family home; i.e., the needs of [REDACTED] rather than the apparent needs of the adults to perpetuate their own agendas based on past actions by the other party.


As you may have surmised, I have finished the therapy with [REDACTED] in light of their return to their mother's home. The last session was on 6 June. At that time, [REDACTED] were looking forward to the move, and they expressed excitement about the prospect of living with [REDACTED] brother. They were also pleased that they already had friends in the neighborhood. [REDACTED] were, as in the past, more circumspect about their thoughts and feelings about living with their mother and stepfather. Their reserve seemed to reflect, in part, their memories of past events and their continuing concerns about how they will be treated. As you know from past contacts, [REDACTED] are quite concerned about how anger is expressed in their family, and it is likely that they and their newly reconstituted family may benefit from help with this issue.

As you already know, [REDACTED] are strongly attached to their family in Kona, and my impression is that this attachment is a healthy and secure one. I believe that they perceive their relationships with their Kona family members as important to their sense of security and their sense of identity. For these reasons, I believe that it is clearly in the children's best interests that they be able to have regular visitations with their family in Kona. A disruption in the contact with [REDACTED] would be especially disruptive to their continued development of internal security, stability, and cohesiveness. I think that we already had an example of how [REDACTED] emotional developments were jeopardized when they did not have consistent contact with their brother; [REDACTED] felt the loss profoundly, and it seemed to shake their sense of security and trust in adults. Another such disruption in significant relationships would, I think, further instill in them a suspicion that adults are not very trustworthy or reliable, which could have a deleterious effect on their long-term

development. I hope that Mr. and Mrs. Kema and [REDACTED] are able to work out a way for visitations to occur so that [REDACTED] needs can be met and so that [REDACTED] can experience adults as being reliable and sensitive to their needs.

I hope this information is of some use to you as [REDACTED] and their families undergo this major transition. Please feel free to contact me should you have any questions.

At your request, I am writing to give an account of my contacts with Jaylin and Peter Kema since my last report (dated December 9, 1994) and of the joint sessions that have occurred with Jaylin and Peter and [REDACTED]. Since early December, I have seen the young Kemas on five occasions alone. On January 8, 1995, we began joint "ohana" meetings, the first two involving [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] the last two with [REDACTED] absent because of business conflicts.

As you know, I have been advocating joint family meetings for years in order to deal with interpersonal issues and to jointly develop visitation schedules. As the family counselor/facilitator in these endeavors over the past two months, I have come to realize that advocacy doesn't always translate into accomplished goals. 



I am writing to follow up on matters which were discussed with you by [REDACTED] regarding Jaylin and Peter Kema's refusal to allow Peter, Jr. to visit with [REDACTED]. I am informed that since Peter, Jr. was placed in the home of his parents in July, his parents have not allowed any contact with the [REDACTED]. According to my client, she has had to call numerous times to even elicit a return telephone call from Jaylin (they apparently screen their calls with an answering machine), and receive a myriad of excuses as to why Peter, Jr. cannot talk on the phone or visit with his family.

On a couple of occasions, my client has called Jaylin for days before a visit into Hilo to let Jaylin and Peter know that they will be bringing in [REDACTED] and would like to see Peter, Jr. Apparently, Jaylin still needs to get Peter's permission for any such contact, and says that she needs to call back. In every instance, Jaylin does not call back, and when my client follows through with her, there is some other excuse as to why the visit cannot take place. On one occasion, my clients wanted to drop off clothes and shoes for Peter Jr. On another occasion, my clients brought [REDACTED] to town for their great grandfather's 90th birthday and invited Jaylin and Peter to attend or to just visit with [REDACTED]. Again, Jaylin had to consult Peter, whose decision was no.

Jaylin has always been very quick to call [REDACTED] when she needs money or other help, or when she feels that [REDACTED] should be brought to Hilo for visitation with her. However, Jaylin and Peter's unwillingness to even maintain communication with [REDACTED], their apparent lack of interest in visiting with [REDACTED], and Jaylin's complete deferral to Peter, Sr. of all visitation decisions does not indicate much progress in this case. They apparently have little care for the feelings of [REDACTED] and for the desire of [REDACTED] to see and





I'm very disappointed and concerned about the decision that might be made for Peter Kema jr. to return to his mom and dad. Three years ago when little Peter was hurt very badly neither mom or dad would own up who the perpetrator was. While Peter jr. was in our care there was bad blood between me and Mr. Kema because he believed it was my fault that the little boy was left in our care. Now after three years being with Peter jr.'s [REDACTED] where he learned how to love and be loved back and always around [REDACTED], you would want to send him back to his parents alone! I don't understand because I feel one go home all should go home. For only the two days I do get to see Peter Boy (thursday nights and Friday nights) I cherish each moment I'm with him, we talk about Peter being a big boy and when he is with his mom and dad for him to kiss [REDACTED]. I know that Peter will be traumatized being sent back alone. I may sound like a selfish and jealous outsider but I know for a fact that I do love that little boy with all my heart. I also remember on several occasions [REDACTED] telling me that he is not my son. Well, the people who are responsible for bringing Peter jr. into this world did not act like parents three years ago. I've heard excuses from the mom why they can't go to Kona to visit [REDACTED]. It's either car trouble or no gas money but as soon as I get a chance to have him for one day (which I drove all the way to Konato pick him up) [REDACTED] says that in order for him to visit with me I have to let him go with his mom and dad over night, and because I didn't want to lose what precious time I do have with him I've always abided by her rules. Now for the record I hope you all make the right decision where Peter jr. is concerned because the perpetrator has not been found or punished and it seems to me that you folks are letting that part of this little boys life go bye. If you feel that I'm coming across very strong and you may even say it's none of my business but because I'm a concerned [REDACTED] who might come across another situation like this I'd sure like to know what to do. If Peter Jr. is returned home without you finding out who hurt him that will show that our system doesn't work and parents get away with hurting Peter jr.. The system had three years to find the person who hurt him. I always felt the person or persons that hurt a child as Peter jr. was should pay for the crime. It just seems to me you don't care who did it, you're going to forget the past sadly and go on from there. Well, I'm here to tell you It's wrong! Peter jr. was badly hurt worse off than [REDACTED] but he's going home alone! This is when I say your system SUCKS!!! I also want to say I guess being in the [REDACTED] we're the ones to make some changes in the system, for instance, before we become [REDACTED] there are some requirements that we have to make. For the parents of foster children just have minimum requirements. Some don't even abide or go through all of their requirements. The worst part of all is the system sends the child or children back to a broken home and both parents are still being taken care of by the state again. Well, I'm going to do my very best to bring this part out in the open. I feel one parent should go to work and get a real job and hold on to it at least for six months. Prove to the system that it's working and the meaning of the word HO"OPONOPONO means to make right with everybody that you feel did wrong to you. It's to forgive one another and make right for the sake of family and love ones. So Peter Sr. and Jaylin have themselves HO"OPONONO with [REDACTED] a [REDACTED] maybe be truthful

and do the right thing and say who hurt Peter jr. without this, there is no HO'OPONOPONO it's just something they say they want to do just to get Peter jr. back! Is anybody listening? Do you understand? Please help this little boy by making the right decision but first find out who did it? Even if writing this letter hurts my chances of even seeing Peter jr. again, he knows I love him and he will always love me too. So I can live with that if it ever comes to that so be it. I just felt I had to say something on Peter jr.'s behalf because someday he is going to find out what happened to him and he is going to wonder why no one helped him!!

At [REDACTED] request, I am writing an update of my psychotherapy contacts with Peter and Jaylin Kema and of my opinions concerning the timing of the placement of the [REDACTED] into the Kema home. As you know, many months have elapsed while reunification has been sought and worked for. In late July, Peter Jr. was returned to the Kemas and [REDACTED] Jaylin's children, visited for over a week in August.

In the meantime, Peter and Jaylin had moved to a home in Puna and were justifiably excited about having a place of their own with space and privacy, a vast contrast to the crowded conditions at their small, low income apartment in Hilo. They experienced some conflict with extended family concerning the care of Peter's half-brother but the issues were resolved to Peter and Jaylin's credit. Thus, in many respects, things have gone well and Peter and Jaylin have been showing mature behavior.

During the four months that have elapsed since the last hearing, however, some of the decisions made by Peter and Jaylin concerning [REDACTED] have not been thoughtful or very empathic of the needs of [REDACTED]. Little Peter Jr. has not been able to see his [REDACTED] in Kona, with whom he had lived for so many months, nor was he able to visit with his [REDACTED]. No visitations have taken place with [REDACTED]; telephone contacts have not been frequent or regular. As a result, the abrupt separation from his former caretakers was hard on Peter Jr. Likewise, [REDACTED] have been very puzzled by the lack of contact, coming to understandable but sadly wrong conclusions as to Peter and Jaylin's absence from their lives. According to their therapist, Terry Fujioka, Ph. D., [REDACTED] voice

considerable confusion. As might be expected, [REDACTED] thinks that the lack of communication is because of something that she has done wrong. [REDACTED] has expressed worries that Uncle Peter is hurting his mother and that he, [REDACTED] must protect his mother if and when he moves in with them. [REDACTED] have understandably spoken that maybe they should go live with their natural father, probably with the unspoken belief that they are no longer wanted by Jaylin and Peter.

These child-based worries and conclusions made by [REDACTED] and Peter Jr.'s initial anxieties about being separated from and not having follow-up visits with his [REDACTED] arise largely from Peter and Jaylin's inaction in initiating visitations. As I have noted in previous statements to CPS and to the Family Court, considerable conflict and unresolved feelings have occurred over the past three or four years between Jaylin and Peter and [REDACTED]. No specific, face-to-face counseling between these two sets of adults has ever taken place nor have joint work sessions aimed at developing a schedule of visitations ever occurred. It was hoped that Sonny Kinney would provide those services, but that did not happen. Finally, as the months went by, I attempted to have joint sessions in November and early December, but Jaylin had medical problems which prevented this from happening.

Since their move to Puna and their regaining custody of Peter Jr., Jaylin and Peter have become more irregular and removed from their sessions with me and have been difficult to communicate with, according to others I have heard from. Normally, I was seeing the Kemas on a once-every-two week basis. But, over the last four months, I have only seen each of them two times. They have clearly heard my advice, pleas, and assertive confrontative statements concerning their need to initiate visitations for the sake of [REDACTED]. Peter has been angry at the fact that the [REDACTED] are not with them and resents being told of what he should do. His depressive resentment is understandable given the years of frustration that he and Jaylin have experienced, but his feelings don't hold water when it comes to the needs of [REDACTED]. Jaylin also appears to feel resentment towards [REDACTED] and seems to act with a "tit for tat" attitude.

I am of the strong opinion that [REDACTED] need sound, ample transition before a final placement is made with Peter and Jaylin. This is generally needed after children have been in out-of-home placement for some time, but in this case situation it is more necessary because of the distorted views and feelings that have occurred in the [REDACTED] as the result of no transition visits over the past four months. To abruptly reunify the family, without transition experiences and follow-up assessments, would not be responsive to the comfort levels of [REDACTED] involved.

I do not believe that such an abrupt reunification would necessarily be traumatic or highly detrimental to the children, but it surely would be insensitive and risky. I do not believe that children should be subjected to those kind of experiences as long as it is not necessary. In this case, it does not seem necessary. Jaylin and Peter say that they want [REDACTED] to return forthwith. I do not believe that should occur until ample transition visitations occur, leading to a stronger sense of security and comfort for [REDACTED] involved. In addition, because of the important role [REDACTED] have played in the lives of Peter Jr. and the [REDACTED] visitations between [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] are very important and should be mandatory, if [REDACTED] well-being is the major concern.


I would hope that the Court would postpone placement and mandate the joint development of a schedule of visitations involving the [REDACTED] and Peter Jr. as well as implementation and monitoring of that schedule. That will take time: at least several months. Because of school schedules for the [REDACTED], if all goes well, final placement would make the most sense psychologically at the end of the second semester of school, in June.

I will be available to assist in joint session between now and late January, after which I will be leaving the islands for six months. If my involvement in this endeavor is to occur, all parties will have to hop to it and be willing to sacrifice personal feelings and priorities in favor of working together for the well being of [REDACTED]

This is the final report on the above named client. Since the Team's letter of January 19, 1994, the Kema's were seen once by the outreach worker, twice by the health educator and once by the nurse. There were a total of 10 cancelled appointments during this time.

During home visits, the Kemas have been responsive to and nurturing of [REDACTED]. Her health care needs have been met by regular visits to Dr. Wilson for well baby checks as well as for illness.

On March 29, 1994, the Denver Developmental Screening Test (DDST) was administered to [REDACTED] and there were no delays noted. During this visit the parent-child interaction was assessed using the Nursing Child Assessment Teaching Scale (NCATS) with Peter and [REDACTED]. The score was in the acceptable range with one exception. This was "Cognitive Growth Fostering". Peter did not show a good grasp of the need to teach his child. This is necessary so she can reach her full intellectual potential when she enters school. Peter was sensitive and responsive to [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] gives clear cues to her father and is responsive to him.



A United Way Agency

I would recommend a referral to the Public Health Nurse to continue monitoring the health care needs of this family. Peter and Jaylin should also be involved with parenting classes so they can learn about [REDACTED] needs as she grows older. Jaylin has spoken with the Healthy Start Program about their classes but they have not attended yet.

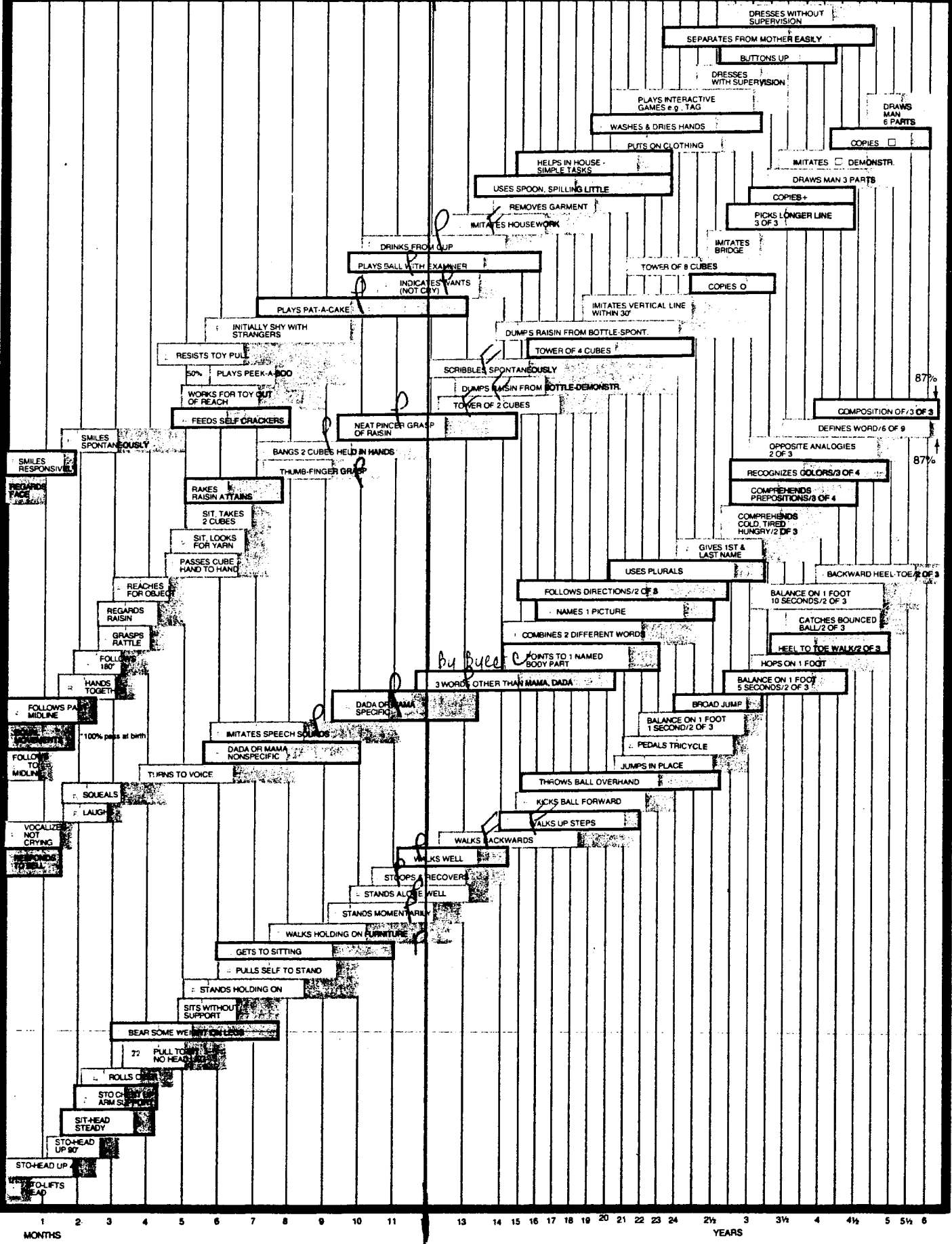
