
WELCOME TO PALO ALTO BATLEFIELD NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE!

On May 8, 1846, you would have heard the thunder of cannon and seen soldiers from the United States and Mexico fighting the first battle of the U.S.-Mexican War.

Today, instead of soldiers and cannon, you might hear a bird singing or see a coyote run across the prairie. These fields are preserved as the Palo Alto Battlefield National Historic Site. This park is truly a living monument to the soldiers who fought here so many years ago.




Texas belongs to the United States and its border is the Rio Grande. Mexico crossed this border and attacked the United States on our own territory.





Each picture in the **ARROWHEAD** represents the many wonders of National Parks.

BUFFALO = Animals live in National Parks.

LAKE = Water in parks is for animals, plants, and visitors to fish, swim, and go boating.

MOUNTAINS = National Parks are beautiful places to walk, hike, and visit.


