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On: MARCH 1 TEXAS CATTLE ON FEED UNCHANGED FROM LAST YEAR For Information Contact: Carol Pittman

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AUSTIN . . . Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.69 million head on March 1, unchanged from a year ago. According to the monthly report released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, the estimate was down 1 percent from the February 1 level. Producers placed 340,000 head in commercial feedlots during February, down 3 percent from a year ago, and 20 percent below the January 2005 total.

Texas commercial feeders marketed 360,000 head during February, down 14 percent from last year and down 9 percent from the January 2005 total.

On March 1, there were 2.24 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 83 percent of the state's total. The number on feed across the area was up 2 percent from last year, and down 1 percent from the February total.

February placements in the Northern High Plains totaled 279,000 head, down 20 percent from the January total. Marketings were down 7 percent from last month to 298,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States in feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 11.2 million head on March 1, 2005. This inventory was 2 percent above March 1, 2004.

Placements in feedlots during February totaled 1.52 million head, 6 percent below February 2004. February placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds totaled 277,000 head; 600-699 pounds totaled 308,000 head; 700-799 pounds totaled 526,000 head; 800 pounds and greater totaled 412,000 head. Marketings of fed cattle during February totaled 1.63 million head, 4 percent below 2004.
