On: TEXAS SPRING ONION PRODUCTION UP 31 PERCENT FROM LAST YEAR

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Austin . . . The 2005 spring onion production in South Texas is expected to total 4.69 million hundredweight (cwt), up 21 percent from last year.

Based on the April 1 survey conducted by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, yield is estimated at 335 cwt per acre, up 25 cwt from last year. Harvested acreage is estimated at 14,000 acres. Planted acreage is estimated at 15,500 acres, up 7 percent from the previous spring.

Producers in the Lower Rio Grande Valley expect to harvest 4.6 million cwt, up 25 percent from a year ago.

In the San Antonio-Winter Garden and Laredo areas, spring production is forecast at 1.24 million cwt, up 11 percent from the amount produced the previous spring.

United States producers expect to harvest this year's spring crop from 37,100 acres, up 4 percent from last year.
