AUSTIN . . . Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.63 million head on May 1, up 3 percent from a year ago. According to the monthly report released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, the estimate was up 10,000 head from the April 1 level. Producers placed 500,000 head in commercial feedlots during April, up 20 percent from a year ago, and up 4 percent from the

Texas commercial feeders marketed 480,000 head during April, unchanged from last year but down 11 percent from the March 2005 total.

On May 1, there were 2.19 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 83 percent of the state's total. The number on feed across the area was up 4 percent from last year, and up slightly from the April total.

April placements in the Northern High Plains totaled 415,000 head, down slightly from the March total. Marketings were down 15 percent from last month to 398,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States in feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 10.6 million head on May 1, 2005. This inventory was 3 percent above May 1, 2004.

Placements in feedlots during April totaled 1.66 million head, 4 percent above April 2004. April placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds totaled 340,000 head; 600-699 pounds totaled 225,000 head; 700-799 pounds totaled 500,000 head; 800 pounds and greater totaled 595,000 head. Marketings of fed cattle during April totaled 1.80 million head, 5 percent below 2004.
