(CJ 111 Survey of the philosophical and historical background, constitutional limitations, objectives, and processes in the enforcement of the law; and introduction to the nature and functions of public and private agencies responsible for enforcement. #### Montgomery College: General Information

Montgomery College first held classes on September 16, 1946 at a local high school with a student body of 186 men and women. By the fall of 1950, the College had acquired the buildings and seven acres previously occupied by the Bliss Electrical Society. This new home in Takoma Park became the first campus of Montgomery College. A second campus, the Rockville Campus, opened in September 1965. The Germantown Campus opened in September 1975 with classes held temporarily in Seneca Valley High School. Since the fall of 1978, the Germantown Campus has been located in permanent college facilities in Germantown, Maryland. Over the past half-century the College has grown to a multicampus institution with more than 20,000 credit students and 15,000 Continuing Education students.

Montgomery College offers a wide scope of academic opportunities more than 100 degree and certificate programs prepare students to earn an associate's degree, transfer to a four-year college or university, enter the job market, upgrade career skills, complete an apprenticeship, or enhance life through enrichment experience. from individual courses for skill building and personal interest to the first two years of traditional college degree programs.

Taking classes at-a-distance is a convenient way to study. Distance learning courses are delivered over the World Wide Web and this delivery mode gives students the flexibility of accessing lessons at times and places convenient to them. Credit courses cover the same objectives as face-to-face courses - it is only the delivery format that is different.
